ABERDEEN'S ARRIVAL

Our New Governor-General is Now on Canadian Soil.
HE IS SWORN IN AT QUEBEC.

Brings a Large Staff to Help Him Govern the Country.—The New Viceroy Regal Party Welcomed by a Number of Front-line Canadian.

QUEBEC, Sept. 18.—The Allan line steamship *Sardinian*, with Lord and Lady Aberdeen on board, arrived at Quebec at 9 o'clock yesterday morning and moored at Princess Louise embankment. The weather, which has been so far so good, was continued to be cold and rainy, so that at nine o'clock there were very few onlookers to witness the Aberdeen's official landing on Canadian soil.

There was a busy scene on the docks of the Sardinian. His Excellency's people were getting luggage of all kinds ready to be landed, whilst gangs of laborers were piling under shelter on the pier the passenger's baggage.

At a quarter to nine o'clock a company of the Queen's Own Canadian Hussars, under command of Lieut. Baldwin, arrived from the United States. They were met by the Lord and Lady Aberdeen, who were accompanied by the Hon. J. F. Snyder, who had just returned from his tour of inspection in the West.

The new City Hall at Spokane, Wash., was destroyed by fire Wednesday afternoon. Three tinners were at work on the building, and they are reported to have been burned to death.

The home of Milton Myers, near Milwaukee, Wis., was burned Thursday night, and three of his children were killed. His wife jumped from a window with an infant in her arms, and both were seriously injured.

MISCELLANEOUS.
It is announced that work on the Panama Canal will be resumed in November. Lord Aberdeen will be asked to open the Canada Central Fair at Ottawa next week.

Excelsior Lodge, No. 6287, Manchester, has decided to secede from that order and join the L.O.O.F.

The Town of Villa Cana, in Toledo Province, Spain, has been devastated by floods, and about 400 lives have been lost.

Town sites and lots, the property of the Texas Central Railroad, were sold at auction yesterday, aggregating nearly \$50,000.

THE FIRE KING.
