



The Veto Bill.

The fight on the Parliament Bill is practically over. The Bill has passed the Committee Stage and has come out of it with some slight modification of the form in which it was introduced there, and in which it passed the House of Commons last fall. There still remains the report stage and the third reading. Whether or not there will be any general discussion on the third reading will be disclosed within a few days. Unlike our custom of taking the third reading as a matter of form, at times in the British Parliament there is debate at this stage, but it may be taken for granted the main fight ceased with the passage of the Bill out of Committee.

In a few days the course to be taken by the Opposition in the House of Lords will be apparent to the country.

It may be remembered that the Parliamentary Bill was sent to the House of Lords late last year, and that the Upper House determined to go on with a bill, then before the House, for the reform of the membership of that House, before taking up the consideration of the Government Bill, which curiously enough set forth in the Preamble an expression of opinion, which of course had then and has now for a second time been adopted by the House of Commons, setting forth the desirability of reform in the membership of the House of Lords. The latter, we repeat, determined to take up this question first. The Government, supported by the House of Commons, had taken up a curtailment of the legislative powers first. On this question of precedence, the Government and the Lords joined issue immediately, and the Government abruptly dissolved Parliament. Although the breach occurred apparently on a question of which reform should have precedence, there was a substantial issue between the parties. The Conservatives held that the electorate would be satisfied with the curtailment or may be the total excision of the hereditary character of the qualification by which a member is summoned to a seat in that House, and would leave the new Senate with the present powers the House of Lords at times exercises, or would at most be satisfied with a curtailment of the powers of the Senate in regard to Money Bills.

In respect to Money Bills the Government had obtained in January, 1910, a decision from the electorate in favour of the total excision of that veto.

In regard to the veto over other legislation, the Government had obtained no such direction. As the latter issue was the crux of most of the disputes between the two Houses for a generation back, particularly in 1893 in regard to the Home Rule Bill

of that year, and in regard to other legislation since 1906, the Government seized the opportunity afforded and went to the country on that issue, and the other issues involved in that legislation. The result of the referendum, which was practically a referendum on which the Government staked its life, overwhelmingly favoured the Government contentions and the Government Bill.

The House of Lords has now to discuss the bill with the full knowledge that the country has backed it. It will be interesting to watch tactics of the Lords.

The Government Selling Splits.

It will be interesting to the people of Broad Cove, Topsail, Torbay and other places to know that the present Government, known as the Picnic Party, led by the Premier, have started a new industry in competition with these fishermen. Recently the trees near the Colonial Building were cut down and are now being cut up by a man there and being turned into splits. They are advertised at 25 cts. per hundred and should go quickly. The “split” industry it is thought will replace to some extent the money which is being shovelled out of the Treasury for new jobs and to defray the cost of picnic trips abroad.

Died of Her Injuries.

The little girl, Bernadotte McDonald, daughter of Mr. James McDonald, engineer on the R. N. Co. train, died of her injuries at 1 o'clock this morning. The child, who is about 6 years of age, was playing in front of her home on Brien Street, shortly before six o'clock when a dray load of goods drawn by a draft horse from the railway station to the F. B. Wood candy factory ran into the child and inflicted the injuries that caused her death. There were no external marks on the child's body except two slight red wounds on each arm just above the elbow. The fatal injuries must have been internal. The child could move her arms all right after the accident and could speak so that her parents had great hope that she would live. Little Bernadotte was the father's favourite child, and Sunday and days off would always be seen accompanying him to church, and in the evenings to the Nickel. He is heart broken over the accident; Mrs. McDonald also is inconsolable. As far as we can learn no blame attaches to the driver as he had a heavy load and the horse was going slowly. He at once stopped when he heard the child's cries and picking her up in his arms took her to her mother. We sympathize with the parents in their affliction.

A Serious Accident.

MR. JNO. DAY FALLS 16 FEET AND IS BADLY HURT.

About 9.45 this morning Mr. John Day, superintendent of linesmen with the electrical department of the Reid & Co. met with an accident on Rawlin's Cross which came very near being fatal and by which Mr. Day sustained serious injuries. He was looking after repairs to the line on Rawlin's Cross, just opposite Murdoch's drug store, and with him were Messrs. Joseph Ryall and Thos. Murphy. A raised platform is used for the work and is fixed to a derrick, the ascent to the platform being by means of a ladder. It stands fully 16 feet from the ground and on it Mr. Day was engaged at work. Mr. Day went up to inspect the work being done by Ryall, and when he reached the platform grasped a piece of loose wire on top of the car, which was used for putting “ears” on the wires, when suddenly it gave way and the fell backward to the street, striking it with great force. Believing that Mr. Day had been killed outright, and becoming excited, Ryall jumped from the platform to the ground and escaped unhurt, and with Murphy and others brought the man, who was in a semi-conscious state, into Dr. Macpherson's surgery across the way. Here every attention was given him by that physician, who after a careful examination found no bones broken though serious injuries had been sustained. Mr. Day was soon revived under the ministrations of the doctor. The muscles of the right shoulder and arm were badly wrenched and bruised, the hand was cut, serious injuries to the vertebrae and the ribs on the right side also severely affected. The legs were also affected and Mr. Day could not stand. He also suffered severely from shock. When he struck the ground his head escaped the edge of the curb by a few inches and he narrowly escaped being brained. Mr. Day was driven in the ambulance to his home, 16 York Street, where Dr. Macpherson again visited him during the forenoon. His escape from instant death was a miraculous one. Mr. Day is a sober, steady and reliable man and has been working 22 years at the electrical business eleven of which has been spent with the R. N. Co. About 16 years ago he fell from a pole opposite Pitt's, Water Street, and had his right arm broken.

U. S. Women Smoked

657,000,000 Cigarettes During the Past Year.

New York, April 18.—That the enormous total of 657,000,000 cigarettes, out of 8,500,000,000 sold in the U. S. in 1910, were consumed by 1,800,000 women, was the statement made to-day by the sales manager of one of the largest cigarette manufacturing in the world, having selling branches in all cities in the country.

According to this expert's figures, out of this total, 95,900 New York women smoked 34,675,000 cigarettes in 1910. Being asked to analyse his figures, he said that the beginning point in his calculation was that one adult woman in every ten smokes. “This may sound startling,” he continued, “but I believe that if any error exists it is on the side of conservatism.”

Find Palace of Herod the Great.

Vienna, April 26.—Prof. Ernest Sellin, Egyptologist, reports the discovery of the ancient palace of Herod the Great on the plain of the lower Jordan, near the road from Jerusalem to Jericho. The foundations are in a complete state of preservation, and Prof. Sellin says the palace might easily be reconstructed after the original plans. Herod, called “The Great,” was King of Judea from 40 to 47 B.C. He was noted for his excessive cruelty and also for his love of building cities, temples, and palaces.

What a Pencil Will Do

An English statistician was asked how many words could be written with an English lead pencil, and, being determined to answer it, he bought a lead pencil and Scott's Ivanhoe and proceeded to copy the latter word by word. He wrote 95,608 words and then was obliged to stop, for the pencil had become so short that he could not use it. A German statistician who heard of this experiment was dissatisfied with it because all the lead in the pencil was not used on the work, and therefore he bought a pencil and started to copy a long German novel. When the pencil was so short that he could not handle it with his fingers he attached a holder to it, and it is said that he wrote with this one pencil 400,000 words: Pos-

Porpoise With a Hump

“See that hump?” inquired the Andrews one night last week in lecturing to the members of the Biological section of the New York Academy of Sciences, and he was not referring to an accessory of woman's wardrobe, formerly so widely advertised, but reference was to the skeleton of a giant porpoise he caught last summer just off the northern coast of Japan, while on a whaling expedition. The porpoise, he said, varied to a remarkable degree from any hitherto recorded, in proof of which he showed the skeleton of an ordinary porpoise and its long, flat, blade-like extensions of each of the vertebrae, side by side with the newly discovered species, the vertebrae of which are longer and rounder. Externally it differed from other porpoises in having a hump on its back, well below the middle of the body. The porpoise weighed 100 pounds and was six feet long. The head curator of the biology department of the United States National Museum in Washington pronounced the porpoise a hitherto unknown species.

SAN FRANCISCO, May 2.
The recent meeting on Antarctic shores, of Amundsen, the Norwegian explorer, and Capt. Scott, head of the British expedition, was no surprise to either, according to a message received from Amundsen by the Norwegian Consul. It stated that Amundsen had notified his rival from Maderia of his plans. The meeting took place at White Bay, in the Ross Sea, and was short. Scott paid a visit to Amundsen on the latter's vessel, the Fram. On the following day the call was returned aboard the Terra Nova. Scott learned that eight of the Fram's crew were establishing winter quarters two miles inland. Amundsen informed the British officer that he hoped to reach the Pole by the way of the Beadmore glacier. He had 126 dogs and enough sleighs and skis to work the dogs in two shifts. Amundsen was to have his supplies landed and his winter quarters ready a few days after the Terra Nova left for New Zealand. As soon as he had settled his shore camp, he intended to dispatch the Fram to Buenos Ayres, while he remained with nine men to make the dash farthest south. The vessel will return in December or January to bring the expedition back. There are now three expeditions in the Antarctic waters, British, Norwegian and Japanese.

British and U.S. Flags Entwined

And Premier Asquith and Ex-Premier Balfour Speak At Great Peace Meeting at London To-Day.

London, April 28.—The Guild Hall witnessed to-day a meeting of the nation in the support of Anglo-American cordial arbitration.

The Lord Mayor of London held the reins of the stage. On his right was the Prime Minister, on his left former Premier Balfour, while massed close the Mayor were the Archbishop of Canterbury, the Archbishop of Westminster, Lord Loreburn, the Lord High Chancellor, Lord Strathcona, Premier Ward of New Zealand, and other notables. Over their heads the Union Jack and Stars and Stripes floated.

Mr. Asquith and Mr. Balfour spoke in support of the treaty, declaring that it would make a new era in civilization, but both pointedly distinguished a peace pact between Great Britain and the U. S. provided for the settlement of all differences to arbitration would mean an alliance between the two countries.

Pussy's Germs.

Cat Blamed for Spreading Disease of Diphtheria in Buffalo.

Buffalo, April 25.—Health Commissioner Francezak was yesterday informed by City Bacteriologist Blisset that the cat whose throat was cultured last Saturday, following the development of two cases of diphtheria in the family in which it was a house pet, is suffering from the disease in a most malignant form.

The attention of the health department was brought to the cat when two children in a Front Avenue family were stricken with diphtheria after playing with it. The family put then went to a house in Jersey Street and there infected another child. It returned to its own home and again carried the germs to a third child.

Health Commissioner Francezak became certain that the cat was at the seat of the trouble and ordered a culture of its throat taken, to remove the possibility of doubt as to the cause of the disease.

SENT TO HOSPITAL.—A young woman named McCormack was yesterday afternoon removed to hospital from her residence, South Side, suffering from appendicitis.

Made Good in St. John

Editor Evening Telegram.

Dear Sir.—One of the most interesting civic elections that ever took place in the Loyalist City of St. John, New Brunswick, was held Tuesday, April 18th. Besides the voting for the Board of seventeen Aldermen, the citizens were called upon to decide by poll whether the city should be governed in future by a Commission or by the present plan of Aldermanic control. The Commission plan was carried by a large majority, consequently a new charter will be drawn up, and next April the new form of government will be inaugurated. The citizens also voted to spend \$300,000 towards building a bridge across the harbor.

The Commission plan of government, in brief, is as follows: Five Commissioners will be chosen by the citizens at large. The citizens will first vote for the primaries. Any person who can procure 25 names on his nominating paper is eligible to be a candidate for the primary contest. The highest eight men selected for Commissioners and the highest two men selected for Mayor, will again be submitted to the people, and the highest four will be declared the Commissioners, and highest one in Mayor's contest will be declared Mayor. The Mayor and Commissioners will hold office for two years. They will give all their time to civic matters, and each Commissioner will be head of a department. The Commissioners will probably be paid \$3,000 each per annum, and the Mayor, \$4,000. In the plan also is a "recall," that is to say, if any of the Commissioners or Mayor proves themselves incapable they can be unseated by 25 per cent. of the voters signing a petition to that effect. The unseated official, however, is eligible for re-election. There is also a "referendum" in the Commission plan whereby the people can be called to vote upon any big project. Among the Aldermen elected in the election was H. C. Codner, of the Globe staff. It was a three-cornered contest in which a lawyer and funeral director were Mr. Codner's opponents. The lawyer held the seat last year. The contest was a brisk one and every effort was made by each candidate and their workers to get the voters to the polls. A large vote polled. Voting closed at 4 p.m., but the last returns were not given out until after 12 at night. The returns showed Mr. Codner had won, having over 400 votes over the funeral director and 112 in excess of the lawyer.

Mr. H. C. Codner is a native of St. John's, Nfld., but for many years made his home in Canada.

500 Pound Woman Dead

Part of Her House Had to Be Torn Away to Permit Body's Removal.

Saville, L. I., April 24.—In order to bury the body of Hannah Rose, who weighed 500 pounds, and who died at her home on South Main St., Saturday night, a portion of her home had to be torn down.

Her estimated weight has been five hundred pounds. She always resented even a friendly suggestion that she could command popular attention on the stage. Her physical proportions, however, did not handicap her in moving about, and her life has been spent in useful employment. By the will of her foster father she was allowed to occupy a portion of the Rose household during her life time.

Her casket was especially built and of extra size. The pall bearers were increased to twice the usual number. It was found that the casket was too large to pass through the doorway and a carpenter was employed to tear down a portion of the side of the house.

Framing the Treaty.

Special Evening Telegram. WASHINGTON, To-Day. The President said it might be weeks before the Treaty of Peace would be submitted to the Senate or to Great Britain for ratification. Some difficulties in the framing of the Treaty had disappeared. The objection raised by English newspapers that in the States the Senate must be consulted before any dispute could be arbitrated was hardly valid, the President thought. The Treaty would probably be of a general character. It will provide, according to the present intention that when disputes arise between the States and Britain, they shall be submitted to an Arbitral Court for settlement. In the opinion of the President and his advisers, it is perfectly natural that the Senate here or the British Parliament or the British Foreign Office should be concerned arranging the details for the settlement of each dispute. So far no agreement has been reached among the framers of the Treaty here, as to how the proposed Arbitral Court shall be constituted. One proposal is that any questions in issue shall be submitted as they arise to the Hague Tribunal; another that as each question comes up a court be constituted by agreement by both Governments to settle that question alone. The President is of opinion that Great Britain will not frame separate propositions, but will await the submission of the one being drawn up here. The President did not know how long the Treaty would run.

The Last Kick.

Special to Evening Telegram. LONDON, To-Day. Before the vote was taken on Clause two of the Parliament Bill, the Home Secretary, Mr. Winston Churchill, said the adoption of the Clause was imperative, because there has come about a complete paralysis of the working constitution and a denial of all form of redress to those who did not belong to the Conservative party. The safeguards which the Clause left the House of Lords for delay to obtain revision, would still place Liberals under great disabilities, compared to Conservatives, and that was the reason why the reform of the membership of the Upper House should follow as a complement to the Parliament Bill. Mr. Balfour, the leader of the Opposition, declared that the real purpose of the bill was not the improvement of the Constitution, but the carrying out of Home Rule. The Government had succumbed to the threats and the cajoleries of the Nationalists and the Laborites. The House adjourned after the Committee had rejected the proposed new clauses, thus disposing of the Committee Stage of the whole Bill.

The Famine in China.

Special to Evening Telegram. SHANGHAI, To-Day. A correspondent of the Canadian press, who has returned from the famine stricken district of Northern China, found the condition improved as a result of relief work, but it is still very bad. The number of deaths daily has decreased from several thousand in March to a few hundred.

Newfoundland Poultry Association.

The regular monthly meeting of the Newfoundland Poultry Association was held last night in the Department of Mines and Agriculture. A considerable amount of business was disposed of, after which Mr. A. C. Bennett read a paper on the rearing of chickens, describing at length the proper method of breeding, feeding, etc. The address being the result of practical experience, was favourably commented upon by those present, and considered helpful and instructive. Mr. J. E. Butler then read a paper on the Poultry Industry, which gave figures and statistics showing the enormous production it has reached in America, where in 1908 it was greater in value than all the wheat produced in that country, larger than the Oat crop, nine times the value of the Tobacco crop of the United States, and twice that of the world, and greater than the farm value of all the sheep and swine in the United States in 1909. According to Hon. Sydney Fisher the Poultry Industry of America was greater than the products last year of all the farms and ranches in the Dominion of Canada, including all the live stock, field crops and everything that was produced on the farm of Canada. The papers were discussed in a general way by those present, and further valuable information was obtained. The Secretary announced that Mr. Geo. Gushue would be the speaker at the next meeting, when it was hoped the Association would have its own rooms to meet in.

Education.

This word has become largely a synonym for a method of mental discipline extending over the early and formative part of life to the end that intellectual success may attend the efforts of pupils when they leave the school and the graduates when they pass from the college lecture rooms out into the battle of life. The shortsightedness and fallacy of an interpretation that would so limit the meaning and scope of one of the most suggestive and far-reaching words in human language is evidenced— to take one illustration— from many that might be chosen—by the deplorable fact that not a few of the young men who have won prizes at school or college, in after life bring shame and sorrow to their relatives and become a burden to their country. No! There is a moral quality; a fabric of strong, compelling power; a bulwark against temptation, and a persistent, and, in the main, victorious opponent of evil in every form that must be cultivated encouraged and matured in season and out of season, along with the training of the intellect. This paramount factor in life may be called Christian character. What are our schools and colleges doing for the upbuilding of Christian character in the youth of our Land?—Canadian Churchman.

To Succeed Sir Eldon Gorst in Egypt. London, April 28.—The Jewish Chronicle states that it is rumored that Sir Mathews Nathan will succeed Sir Eldon Gorst as British resident in Egypt.

At 5.30 p.m. yesterday two outdoor men fought several fierce rounds at the foot of Queen's Street, and when arrested the police had a hard time with them. Fireman Mike Codner of the Western Station gave the police valuable assistance in handcuffing them and getting them to the lock-up.

If it were a choice of being King or refusing to be kissed by the Archbishop and the House of Lords, this writer would make the great refusal. And probably with the assent of the others. Kissing is the most unpopular among English-speaking people. That is the official, the family kiss. There is another for which Latin gives the third name, and the lover's kiss endures. But only high potentates can be persuaded to exchange the official kiss (The Registrar-General is not to be kissed by the census enumerators). The British boy has quite given up being kissed by his sister and his aunt only by compulsion. In the general life we have eliminated the kiss of the officials and the kiss of the family, much to our content. But, of course, when a King is crowned we must "put him through it!"—London Chronicle.

Motor Boat to Cross Atlantic.

To Start From New York and to Call at Halifax. Capt. John Weller, a seaman and boatbuilder, of Carlstadt, New Jersey, is to attempt to cross the Atlantic in a 50 feet raised cabin motor boat cruiser which he has been constructing for the past several months. The little vessel is 50 feet long, with a beam of 12 feet, and a draft of three feet. She is driven by a 37 h.p. gasoline engine, which is expected to give a steady speed of a little over ten miles an hour. The deck is perfectly clear, except for a 3-by-4 ft. pilot house rising 14in. above it. The trip will be started from New York about July 15, and the run will be along the coast to Boston, thence to Halifax, N.S., and St. John's, Nfld. The actual trip across the Atlantic starts from St. John's, the course being between the two trans-Atlantic routes from Quebec and New York, the contemplated landing being Galway Bay, Ireland. Capt. Weller expects to make the run of 1,677 miles from land to land in eight days. He will take a crew of six or seven men with him, and sufficient provisions for two months. The fuel tanks, installed in the bow and sides of the boat, will be filled with 1,500 gallons of gasoline, about twice as much as Captain Weller expects to use.—Popular Mechanics.

Tenders for Ships.

OTTAWA, May 2.

Tenders for the construction of four Cruisers and six Destroyers, for the Canadian Navy within six years, have been received by the Government. The names of the tendering firms have not been announced, but they are mostly British. As the contracts stipulate that the vessels must be built in Canada, this will necessitate the construction of yards and dry docks. One yard is likely to be located in the St. Lawrence, and one on the Atlantic seaboard.

Cardinia Wrecked.

Mr. H. W. LeMessurier, Assistant Collector of Customs, received the following message yesterday from Lamaline: "Schr. Cardinia, Capt. Carroll, struck off here this morning in a dense fog. Captain and crew landed safely in boats; vessel will be a total wreck." The vessel was being coming here from Harbor Breton when the accident occurred. She was a fine schooner of 100 tons, built at Lunenburg in 1903 and was owned by Job Bros. & Co. Going to Halifax last year with herring she met terrible weather, and coming back to Harbor Breton also had a hard experience, when Capt. Carroll had his leg broken by being thrown against the bulwarks.

Trout Joke May Prove a Boomerang





Rare Mexican

Shark Killed.

A rare specimen of man-eating shark was brought to San Francisco last week by the Pacific Mail Steamer Peru, from Central America and Mexican ports. It was killed by native swimmers in sight of the passengers, while the craft was at San Jose, Mex. The shark is 11 feet long, the biggest ever reported along that coast. It will be given to the Golden Gate Park Museum. It was killed by two men, who, with hardwood sticks, shapened at each end, in their hands and knives between their teeth, plunged into the water. They came to the surface many times, only to dive again. After fifteen minutes the men came up smiling. Soon the dead shark rose to the surface. Its jaws were held apart by the stick.



BOYS PLAY BURNING AT STAKE.

Boston, Mass., April 28.—Bound and tied to a stake, while his little playmates executed a mimic Indian war dance about him and "tortured" him with a lighted candle, Max Tatlebaum, aged 5 years, of Roxbury, turned play into a reality and was "burned at the stake" when his clothing caught fire from the candle, causing injuries which resulted in the boy's death at the hospital last night. The Tatlebaum boy's companions ran away in terror when they saw the boy's clothing flaming up, and he was released from the stake by two little girls, who carried him home.

BEAVER DESTROYING TIMBER IN WEST.

Regina, Sask., April 26.—Beaver have become so numerous and are destroying so much fine timber around Orxow that settlers are appealing to the Government to exterminate them.
