Household Notes.

A solution of common baking soda is very good for a bee sting.

Always spread an umbrella open to dry thoroughly before putting it away. Don't put it in the umbrella jar, tip downwards while it is wet. The dampness will rust the frame and make the silk tender.

Delicious tarts are made with currant jelly and fresh raspberries. When you are ready to serve the tarts put the jelly in first, then the fresh raspberries on top, sprinkling with a little powdered sugar.

The ice chest can be kept in good condition if washed thoroughly once a week with lukewarm water, in which washing soda has been dissolved. If anything is spilled in the ice chest it should be wiped up at once.

Tablecloths, when washed, should be soaked in cold water before they are put into the warm suds. The cold water will soak out the milk and coffee stains, which would be set and very difficult to wash out if put first in hot suds.

To cook macaroni perfectly, first break it in pieces two inches in length, wash it thoroughly, and drop it into boiling salted water. See that the macaroni does not stick and that the water does not boil away. When it is done drain it.

Whole boiled apples are quite as delicious as baked. Take a sharp knife and score the skin of the apple around its centre, take out the core, fill the hole with sugar, then place them in a covered vessel with just a little water and allow them to boil until they are tender.

When sweet corn is fresh the husks are a fresh crisp green, the silk is a lighter green and the grains full and juicy. There is no vegetable which suffers in marketing so much as sweet corn. It is most delicious when cooked ten minutes after it is pulled from the stalk.

It is much easier to remove the skin from new potatoes after they are boiled. Scrub the potatoes very clean, and after they are boiled the skin will peel off with the utmost ease and leave the potato whole and fluffy. Then let the potato stand on the back part of the stove for a few moments. If you wash dishes and care to have smooth hands, keep a cut lemon handy. After taking the hands from

top with the juice, forcing out all the air, then seal. When you are ready to use the tomatoes, lift them out, put them in a pan, heat and make the dressing.

Dried sweet corn is a most satisfactory way of keeping corn for winter use, and it is so simple. Order from your market man or gather from your own garden a little more each day than you need, boil it, and when it is cooled, cut the kernels from the cob with a sharp knife. Put a clean piece of white paper in the bottom of a baking pan and spread one layer of corn over the bottom of the pan, then put it in a cool oven, allowing the door to stand open. Don't dry it too quickly, but gradually, until each grain of corn is thoroughly hard and dry; then put it in a rather thin muslin bag and hang it in a perfectly dry place. Put each day's drying into a bag until it is full. When you cook it, take it from the bag, blow out the chaff, wash it and put it on to boil in cold water. One teacupful of dried corn will save six persons.

Cable News. Treaty Repudiation.

Special Evening Telegram. WASHINGTON, To-day. A determined fight is to be made in conference on Panama Canal Bill against granting free passage to American Foreign bound ships. The conference committee had its first meeting yesterday. It is believed from preliminary conference one measure that the free toll provision for American coastwise shipping will be retained. The British Government according to advices from State Department, has made no further representations to States regarding proposition to allow American vessels to use Canal free of toll since 8th of July last. It is now awaiting it is said enactment of legislation into law and adoption of regulations to put it in to effect in order to have sufficient basis for a more formal protest against which it regards as a clear breach of an existing treaty. In recognition of superior right of Britain to address the State Government on this subject by virtue of the existence of the Hay-Pauncefote treaty other European nations and even Japan refrained from approaching the state department notwithstanding that their interests equal that of Britain by reason of their right to claim equal treatment for their shipping under favoured nations clauses.

Officials of the Government, however, said they expect soon after the signature of Act by the President that the British Charge d'Affaires will be directed to submit to State Department a formal protest on behalf of their Government against what is regarded as discrimination against British shipping. This bill requires an equally formal reply, reciting the Act itself as a mandate by Congress which the Executive cannot disregard, supported by such argument as the Diplomatic Bureau can make to justify the action. As this will amount to a positive refusal of British request to treat British shipping on equality with American, the opinion of Government authorities is that the British Foreign Office will come forward with a proposition to submit issue to arbitration, calling attention to existing British-American Arbitration Treaty as basis of proposition, which move would bring matters to a real crisis should arbitration be adverse to American position, it would be necessary or State Department to find reasonable ground for the declination of British overture without laying itself open to the charges it had deliberately violated provisions of treaty, a charge lodged against it in connection with Hay-Pauncefote Treaty.

Canada Will Join in Protest.

Special to Evening Telegram. OTTAWA, To-day. Canada will in all probability join in the international protest against the Panama Canal Bill passed by States. Premier Borden, during his visit to London, it is understood, conferred with the British authorities or matter with support of Home Government. Any steps decided upon in diplomatic opinion of official circles here is that the whole question is one which will have to be referred to the Hague in view of the fact that the States Senate has acted in face of high constitutional opinion in its own country.

Four Liners for Panama Route.

Editor Evening Telegram. LONDON, To-day. The Royal Mail Packet Company has given orders for four new passenger liners for Panama Canal traffic to meet anticipated German competition. Layton, an official of the company, in an interview expressed the opinion that there was no occasion to be disturbed by the action of the American Senate in passing the Panama Canal bill. He did not believe the American Government seriously would entertain a step calculated to deprive the Canal of a considerable source of revenue.

Train Notes.

The west bound express left Bishop's Falls on time. The eastward express left Port au Basques at 8.15 a.m. to-day.

Died From Injuries.

A letter has just been received from Oporto announcing the death of Thomas Rice, who passed away in the Hospital there after a lingering illness. Deceased left here seven months ago in the barq. Galatea, on which vessel he was a cook. While en route to Oporto one night a kerosene lamp exploded in the galley. Rice's clothing caught on fire and his body was fearfully burned. When the vessel reached Oporto the injured man was conveyed to the Hospital where he finally succumbed. Deceased was 37 years old, a native of Devon, England, and leaves a wife and two children to mourn in St. John's.

Infuriated Seaman TRIES TO DO HIMSELF INJURY.

The schr. Blanche Currie sailed this morn with a cargo of salt for Dominio and Grady, Labrador. Just as the vessel was about to pull out in the stream this morning the captain was apprised that one of his crew had escaped and gone ashore. The pilce were put on the trail of the deserter and quickly rounded him up in a saloon. After being put on board the sailor, becoming half crazed from the overdose of alcohol that he had taken, became desperate and scared the rest of the crew. He threw himself cross the deck of the ship and dashed his head against an iron stanchion, causing deep wounds to be inflicted. With blood oozing freely from the upper portion of his body the infuriated seaman went to the side of the vessel intending to jump overboard, and would have succeeded only he was restrained by the captain and bosun, he was then brought to his bunk and the vessel got under way.




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Hr. Grace Notes.

Mr. Selfridge, the big Chicago merchant, planned his commercial invasion of England, the merchants of London had one good hearty laugh. There was evidently no limit to the nerve of those blooming Americans.

Then, like a man who has set himself gracefully to catch a little poppy, and finds his baseball suddenly converted in dynamics to the velocity and the violence of a cannonball, their laughter froze into consternation and they were bowled over before they were hit.

The General Manager and the Advertising Manager of the largest London Store came galloping across the water on the biggest, fastest greyhound to find out where they were at.

On his visit to the writer, the Advertising Manager of this London concern came straight to the point.

"What is it you American stores have," he asked "that we English stores do not have."

The only thing in which your English stores are perfectly frank with the public is concerning the amount of business you do. And that is the only thing we American stores keep to ourselves. It may be interesting to know that Mr. Selfridge had been in London but a very short time, when he was offered a cool million dollars profit to "put on his hat and go home."

Dr. Alfred Mjoeen maintained that injurious effects of alcohol depended on the dilution. The latest investigations showed that alcohol over a certain percentage was injurious to the quality of the offspring, not only where the mother drank but also where the father alone was a drinker. He suggested the division of alcoholic liquors into classes according to the amount of alcohol they contained, duty being paid according to the strength. For instance, in the case of beer there would be three classes—1, under 2 1/2 per cent; 11, 2 1/2 to 3 1/2 per cent; 111, 3 1/2 to 5 per cent. Beer above 5 per cent. would be prohibited. Such a system, he said, had been adopted by the Norwegian Parliament in the last two weeks.

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

Jammed On an Iceberg.

One of the Most Curious Arctic Experiences on Record.

"This is the most remarkable escape from imminent danger in the whole annals of arctic adventure," said Sir Clements Markham, the explorer, in describing a lecture on icebergs before the Royal Society club. "It concerned," he said, "their steam tender, the Intrepid, commanded by Lieutenant J. B. Caton. A vast floe drove her against a berg with a frightful crash. Destruction seemed certain when the little vessel was seen to rise to the pressure. She was forced forty feet up the side of the iceberg, masses of ice from the floating floe running ten feet above the hullwork, then the piled up mass from the floe sank down, leaving the ship suspended on the side of the berg, her only supports to keep her stationary in this dangerous position being two small wedge pieces, one at the stern post and the other at the bow. She was in imminent danger of falling over on her broadside from that height.

The boats had been got out, but they were smashed to pieces by the ice. Three times the ice floes pressed against the berg, and, with the boats gone, the loss of the ship would have entailed that of all on board. Suddenly the pressure eased off, and the Intrepid was launched into the sea from her lofty position without injury. Lieutenant Caton and others had walked under her keel while she was thus suspended on the side of the iceberg."—London Chronicle.

Bride's Father Blown to Pieces.

Fireworks He Had to Set Off Outside the Church Exploded, Injured Bride Also.

Milan, Aug. 3.—A distressing incident marred a pretty Neapolitan wedding, and threw families into mourning.

Signor Meninno, a rich country squire, living at Melito Valle Bontio, near Avellino, started out for the parish church for the purpose of marrying off his only daughter, a pretty maiden of 19.

Instead of rice, Meninno, in pursuance of an old custom prevalent in the Neapolitan provinces, had filled his pockets with fireworks, and carried in his hands three big handkerchiefs full of bombs, which he intended to explode at the church door on the exit of the bridal party.

While he was at the head of the merry procession of boys and girls, decked out for the occasion in all manner of fantastic costumes, the bombs suddenly exploded with terrific force. Meninno himself was blown to pieces, the bridegroom and many others who had been bidden to the wedding feast were flung to the ground and fearfully mangled, and the adjacent dwellings were shaken to their foundations as by an earthquake.

It is estimated that there are more than 30,000 steamships and sailing vessels of 100 tons and upwards in the lace making industry in Belgium. They produce about \$4,825,000 worth of lace a year. They get for their work from 20 cents to 30 cents a day.

Items of Interest.

Miss Mabel Boardman, of the Red Cross, is working for the erection of a building in Washington to commemorate the services and sacrifices of the women of the Civil war. The present plan is to have this building cost about \$600,000.

At the village of Braidwood, Scotland, a woman has died as a result of accidentally swallowing her false teeth. The woman was taking tea in a friend's house at Wishaw, when the teeth slipped over her throat. Efforts were made to extract the teeth, but without avail. The woman, Jesse Forrest, or Frame, aged about 40, was removed to her home at Braidwood, where Dr. Bradford attended her and found that the teeth had become fixed in the gullet, just above the breast bone.

Carnegie Favors Tax on Wealth.

London Aug. 8.—Andrew Carnegie, in unveiling a statue of Robert Burns at Montrée yesterday, said:—

"In one department the Motherland is ahead of the dominions and the United States. She has established the law, first proclaimed by Adam Smith, that every subject should contribute to the support of the Government in proportion to the income he enjoys under the protection of the state.

"This just taxation the millionaires of the Dominions and the United States have so far escaped, but their day is coming. The hoards of millionaires should be so treated, and not as a punishment, but for their good, because it is just, and justice alone insures general contentment."

Lord Beresford's Violent Attack on Churchill.

London, August 8.—Lord Charles Beresford, speaking at Evesham last night, had many unkind things to say of Mr. Churchill, whom he characterized as the most eccentric individual ever entrusted with the naval executive.

"He's occupied the position eight months, and has proved a miserable failure," said the old warrior. "He sneaks of looking at things with a modern eye, but the first necessity is to see straight. With unaccountable insolence, Churchill took charge of the recent Spithead naval manoeuvres, which resulted in a chaotic disorganization. The German menace, in this youngster's opinion, was so serious that he withdrew the whole fleet to protect the heart of the Empire, leaving one armoured cruiser alone responsible for the Mediterranean. We can't fight at present," added Lord Charles, "and we shan't be ready for some time to come."

In vigorously opposing any naval alliance with any foreign country, he urged that the Empire should defend its own with its own ships. "The only alliance we should desire," he declared, "is one with our Overseas Dominions."

England, he declared, doesn't fear invasion, but starvation. He would always bow to the countries that supplied the granaries of the Motherland, and would have the closest possible trade relations on preference lines with them.

"We've reduced our fleet, we've reduced our army, while other nations are forging ahead by leaps and bounds. I say stop fooling the people and tell them the truth."

Belated Apology.

A certain candidate was announced to speak in a large town, when he heard from a friend that the son of the landlady where he had taken rooms was stating that he was not worth going to hear. The candidate went home and called the landlady and said:—

"Madam, you would not like me to leave your rooms and in the next town I went to tell my friends that were likely to visit you that your rooms were bad. Well, your little son has made a statement that I am no good as a speaker, and I should like you to take him to task for it. Please don't hit him, but speak to him sternly and severely."

The landlady waited until the boy's father came home from work and told him about it. The father gave the boy a sound thrashing and sent him to bed. At night he went to the hall to hear the candidate speak, then returned home, woke the boy up, and apologized to him.

A Third.

A census of the books read at some of the big public schools has shown that Mr. Rudyard Kipling is the most popular author amongst the school-boys.

Mr. Kipling, by the way, was dining with a number of other literary men one evening when one of the guests started a discussion on the spelling and pronunciation of various words in the English language.

"Have you ever noticed, Mr. Kipling," he said, "that in the whole of the English language there are only two words beginning with 'su' that are pronounced as though beginning with 'shu'? I have made an exhaustive study of the subject, and you may take it from me that this is so."

The man was rather a bore, but Mr. Kipling asked politely: "What are the two words?"

"They are 'sunch' and 'sugar,'" replied the other.

"Ah!" commented Mr. Kipling, his face absolutely expressionless. "Are you sure?"

The Largest Water Tank.

The water supply system of Calcutta includes the largest water tank in the world. It covers an area of two and one-third acres, and the total weight when it is full of water is 72,000 tons. There are thirty-two miles of steel joints in the vertical columns and bracing, and in the foundations twenty miles of steel joints and tie bars.

The capacity of the tank is 9,900,000 gallons of water. The tank acts as a balancer and to assist the pumps when they cannot send sufficient water into the mains to meet the demand. During the night hours, when the pumps provide more water than is required, the excess quantity goes into the tank; when the demand is greater the water from the tank flows automatically into the mains.

Cricket Feats.

The cricketer who, in throwing the ball in a Folkestone match, hit and killed a swallow in full flight equalled the feat attributed to "Hughie" Trumble, the Australian, while bowling in a match some years ago.

"Syd" Gregory is credited with having made a lightning-like grab at something that whizzed past him whilst he was fielding at "cover," only to find in his hand not the cricket-ball, but a struggling sparrow! 

Inter Brigade Football.

C. C. C. CUP HOLDERS AFTER A HARD STRUGGLE.

The much talked of Guards-Cadets football match for the Brigade Cup was pulled off on St. George's Field last evening and resulted in the C.C.C. carrying off the championship honors, although the announcement of "full time" by the referee barely saved a draw and gave the Cadets the victory, as the Methodist lads gave a better exhibition.

Long before the game commenced the fence and grand stand surrounding the arena was thronged with people. The gate proceeds amounted to \$90 which shows that the attendance was the largest for the season. During the evening excitement and enthusiasm vied with each among the onlookers, especially among Brigade supporters.

At 6.45 the teams were called together and a few moments later the battle began. At the outset the Guards seemed to gain mastery of the situation and their forward line controlled the ball well, but the defence of the Cadet back division prevented them from reaching the goal. Play became very lively and Murphy, Rawlins and Caul got in some pretty combination for the C. C. C. The latter had possession of the ball and centred across the mouth of the goal, a scrimmage followed and a corner was conceded the Cadets. The leather was nicely placed, Halley had a try for goal and came within an ace of scoring. When the ball was again driven to mid-field Coultas, of the Guards, controlled it and made a pretty dash up the left wing; he passed to Bastow who lost to Walsh. The C. C. C.'s put on a spurt and just before the half time whistle sounded scored their one and only goal through Caul.

SECOND HALF.

After a brief rest the game was resumed at a pretty fast pace. The Methodist boys had the wind in their favor in this half and gave promise of doing good work. For the first ten minutes they kept bombarding the Cadet goal and it looked as if victory would be theirs. Phelan, the C. C. C. goal keeper, saved several splendid shots and certainly saved his team from defeat. Ayre, Coultas and Barrett played a grand game for the Guards and worked hard to equalize the score. About twenty yards from the goal "hands" was given against Walsh. This elicited cheering from the onlookers as the Cadet goal was in danger. Ayre placed the ball which barely shaved the goal post. Soon after the C. C. C. lads put vim and determination into their work and went west. Kent, Murphy and Ceul each had a try but did not succeed in adding to their score. At this juncture Quick received a kick in the face and play was discontinued. On resuming a thick fog set in with a rain shower making it almost impossible for the players to see the ball, while a great many spectators left the field. The Guards kept play on their opponents' territory. Coultas sent two shots in quick succession to Phelan who was invulnerable, and cleared. The Methodist lads continued the attack until the close of the game but it was not to be that they were to score and they went down to defeat to the C. C. C. Boys, the score being:—

Cadets, 1 goal; Guards, 6.

NOTES.

The exhibition was by no means clever and perhaps not half as good as have been witnessed between these two teams.

For the winners the goal keeper deserves most of the credit.

For the losers Coultas played a rattling game.

The C. C. C. are to be congratulated, however, as they have not lost a match for the season. They are now the absolute owners of the Cup, having won it three years in succession.

SEASON'S RECEIPTS.

The interest in football is waning is evident from the following. The aggregate amount taken from both the Brigade and Senior matches shows a shortage of \$300 compared with last year—each league is \$150 short.

The proceeds of the Senior League matches this year are \$450.09 against \$600 last year.

City of Sydney Grounds in Fog at Low Piont

Mishap Caused no Excitement and all Passengers Except Those for Sydney Refused to be Transferred to Douglas H. Thomas. — Ship Will Sail on To-Day's High Tide.

The Black Diamond liner "City of Sydney," Capt. Fraser, en route from St. John's to Sydney and Montreal grounded at Low Point this morning about nine o'clock in a dense fog, and owing to lowering tide will not get off until this afternoon.

The steamer reached the entrance to the harbour about seven o'clock, but owing to the thick fog was running very slowly when she went ashore. The Douglas H. Thomas was alongside about an hour after she grounded and offered to take the passengers on board, but with the exception of the Sydney passengers they all decided to remain on board until the afternoon.

The steamer had 84 saloon and ten steerage passengers, practically all of whom are going to Montreal. The Company have arranged with the Sydney and King George Hotels to serve luncheon to the passengers on their arrival on shore.

The Douglas H. Thomas reached Sydney about eleven o'clock with Sydney passengers and returned to the steamer with the mail for passengers on board. It is expected that the steamer will be pulled off at high tide about five or six o'clock this evening, when she will bunker at International pier before proceeding to Montreal.

The company have arranged that when she is taken off, an expert diver will descend and make an examination of the hull of the steamer. The steamer has sustained no damage as she has grounded in soft mud, yet they wish to take every precaution before sending her to sea.

In his many years experience in the coastal service, this is Capt. Fraser's first accident. It was due entirely to dense fog which prevailed on the sea this morning.

The steamer was twelve hours behind her scheduled sailing, the delay being caused at St. John's, where the Regatta this week interfered with the steamer securing stevedores to unload her freight cargo. — Sydney Post, Aug. 10.

Swim For Your High Notes, Advises singer.

Noted Baritone Finds Exercise Good For Voice.

"Every singer should be a swimmer," declared Charles W. Clark, the well-known American baritone, recently, when asked his opinions on the value of athletics to the singer, a considerably mooted subject. Though not prepared to lay down a set of rules for exercising singers' muscles, of one thing Mr. Clark felt certain: the advantage of swimming to the singer's lungs.

"The arm movements required in propelling the body through the water compel the lungs to fill and exhaust themselves completely. Breathing in the water is slightly difficult, but it is an excellent practice for developing that sustaining power of the vocal artist necessary for high notes and legato passages.

"Most men singers are expert swimmers, though, strange to say, there is a noticeable inability and lack of enthusiasm in this direction on the part of women singers. The latter habitually use extreme care in the protection of their throats and a majority of them take needless precautions which render them susceptible to climatic changes.

"In answer to the inquiry whether athletics benefits a singer, I can only answer that that which improves one man impedes another and that the safest rule to follow is moderation. Under ordinary conditions light, regular exercise is even more necessary to the singer than to other individuals."—American Musical News Service.


