


PARIS, March 8. Information received here from Sluis, Holland, indicates a renewal passed eastward through Roulers.

ALLIES FORCING THE FIGHTING. Horn.

PARIS, March 8. Another strong offensive movement has begun by the allies along the whole line. In the official despatches the operations of the Germans in every sphere are spoken of as counter attacks. Another desperate struggle has developed in the Vosges mountains in the Pass of Bon Homme and not far from Hartmannswiler Kopf. Fighting in that region extends over a ten mile front with heavy infantry and artillery engaged. Advices from Belfort say that the French operations in the Vosges are uniformly successful; the Germans being outbered have been compelled to give ground despite their stubborn resistance.
