





The traffic over them is compelled to follow a narrow track which quickly becomes worn and full of ruts: of this the autumn gives abundant, we might say liquid, evidence.   - of any lands, tenements, buildings or any interest therein, or (c) Any other taxes under the St. John's Municipal Act,
