

The rapid strides in naval progress by Japan is regarded in the United Kingdom with alarm and misgiving. In three years the Japanese navy will possess a strength almost equal to that of Britain's fleet, and there is an admission by naval critics that it will be better equipped from the point of view of fighting efficiency. The causes of super-activity in naval construction by the United States and Japan have been previously discussed, but the fear at home is that both these nations may ultimately outdistance Britain, which will thus be faced with loss of supremacy on the seas. The testimony of Mr. Daniels, Secretary of the Navy for the United States, given before the House Affairs Committee a few days ago, contained a declaration that the time was now ripe for a limitation of nauntil to-morrow, Friday, at 11 a.m. val armaments, and a suggestion that President Harding might call and hold an International Disarmament Committee meeting subsequent to his inauguration. 


