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A Naval Court-Martial.

The recent court-martial at Portsmouth, which found Commander Leslie Charles Bott guilty of negligently or by default stranding H.M.S. Raleigh off the coast of Labrador, has drawn attention to the subject of court-martial generally, and Lieut-Commander H. L. Halewood explains the procedure as follows:

The court-martial was held at Portsmouth in the famous old Victory. In one of her cabins a number of senior officers assembled by order of the President of the Court.

A post-captain, himself a specialist in navigation, and well-known throughout the Navy for his expert knowledge, was appointed as the Prosecutor.

Another officer, also a specialist, took the role of what is known as "Prisoner's Friend."

His duties were to help and advise, with his expert knowledge, the prisoner in his defence.

Court-martial are still carried out with rigid and solemn ceremony, which betrays the gravity of the circumstances of their constitution.

On the night before the trial an officer calls upon the prospective prisoner to deliver up his sword, and on the assembly of the court on the following morning this sword may be seen, laid crossways, on the table immediately in front of the President.

At 8 a.m. on the following morning a gun is fired as a signal, from the ship on which the court is to assemble.

This is an old custom, and is known throughout the service as "the one gun salute."

The trial is carried out with strict justice and impartiality.

The Prosecutor presents his case and calls his witnesses, the prisoner, together with his "Friend," presents his witnesses for the defence.

Dramatic Scene.
The final scene is dramatic. The prisoner withdraws from the cabin while the verdict is being considered.

On being recalled, the prisoner knows before one word has been spoken whether the verdict is guilty or not guilty.

The position of the prisoner's sword, which up till now has been lying crossways in front of the President, has been altered.

If the prisoner has been found guilty, it has been placed so that as he enters he finds the point of the sword lying towards him; not guilty, with the hilt towards him.

In practice, however, there is generally very little doubt as to the verdict.

A ship has been stranded and lost, and the blame must almost inevitably fall on the navigating officer, and so it has been in the case quoted at the head of this article.

What of the officer himself?

He may have been over-confident of the position of the ship. He may have made some slight error in calculation. He may have been over-tired and relaxed for a moment the intense concentration that is necessary for perfect navigation.

Whatever the cause, his future career is ruined. The sentence of the court is that he shall be "dismissed his ship."

It is really a technical term which means that he is to be placed on half-pay.

Lost His Ship.
The second part of the sentence is that he should be "severely reprimanded."

The latter is of little consequence. He has lost a ship and under normal conditions he cannot reasonably hope for any good appointments in the future.

And finally one word concerning navigating officers in general.

A navigating officer to all intents and purposes has the entire responsibility for the safe passage of his ship. The extra pay (over and above that of the non-specialist officer) that he receives for this responsibility, which involves the safety of perhaps a thousand lives and the care of a ship worth perhaps some millions of pounds, is 4s. or 5s. a day, according to circumstances, but in any case a maximum of £21 5s. a year. They are not mercenary motives, therefore, that induce young officers to undertake such great responsibilities.

No, there is a far higher motive than that. It is love for their ship; love for their Navy; love for their Empire and a loyal willingness to serve all three to their utmost.

A Mysterious Malady.
While leprosy has long been regarded as incurable, a report recently published in London claimed that twenty patients had been discharged cured from the Territorial Hospital at Kailhi, in Honolulu. The cures were said to be due to chaulmoogra oil, and are among the most amazing achievements of medical science. It has been fighting leprosy for thousands of years, and hitherto without any success at all. Leprosy has remained the mystery of medical science.

The disease was known in China more than two thousand years ago, but did not reach Europe till the fifth century. By the sixth it had reached England, and in the Middle Ages, there were over one hundred leper hospitals in the island. King Robert Bruce of Scotland died of this awful disease.

Western Europe is now practically free of the disease, save in rare instances. But it exists all over Africa, from the Soudan to the West Coast, and even in healthy South Africa.

It has reached North America, but is very rare on that continent. It is common in Polynesia, India, and China.

The disease is a very mysterious one. Why it should disappear from one country and just as suddenly develop in another is not yet understood. It never attacks a child less

than three years old, and seldom anyone over forty. The usual age at which it appears is between twenty-five and thirty.

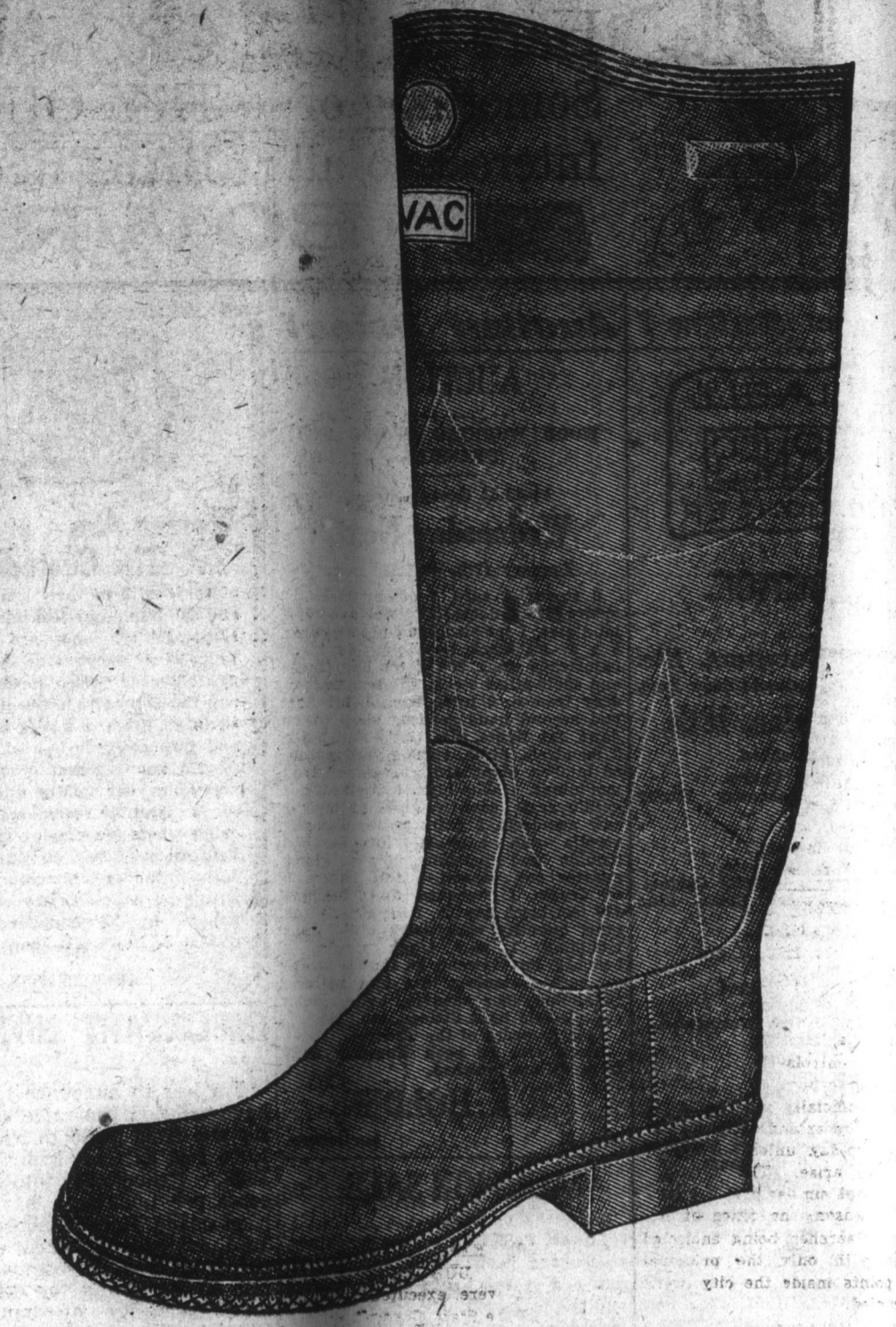

Royal Engagement
Has Been Announced.

Lady Elizabeth Bowes-Lyon to be Bride of Duke of York -- France Occupies Practically Whole of Ruhr -- First Armed Clash at Bochum -- Night of Terror in Dublin.

DUKE OF YORK ENGAGED.
LONDON, Jan. 14. The engagement of Prince Albert, Duke of York, second son of King George and Queen Mary, to Lady Elizabeth Bowes-Lyon, was announced in a court circular today. Lady Elizabeth is 22 and is a daughter of the Earl of Strathmore, whose peerage dates to 1668. She is a dark haired, athletic and is extremely popular in "British" society. Duke of York is 27.

FRENCH EXTEND ZONE OF OCCUPATION.
ESSEN, Jan. 14. The zone of occupation as extended by the French to-day comprises the Ruhr basin with the exception of the industrial city of Dortmund. France controls the output, the transport and export of coal in the Ruhr. It is officially announced that the zone will not be extended beyond the limits fixed to-day unless unforeseen circumstances arise. The operation was carried out similarly to the first zone in Essen, the cities of Bochum and Gelsenkirchen being encircled zones with only the principal strategic points inside the city limits occupied.

POOR COMFORT.
BERLIN, Jan. 15. Government headquarters and the army generally, are apparently obtaining considerable comfort from the coal and gas supply. The coal and gas supply, however, is not extended beyond the limits fixed to-day unless unforeseen circumstances arise. The operation was carried out similarly to the first zone in Essen, the cities of Bochum and Gelsenkirchen being encircled zones with only the principal strategic points inside the city limits occupied.

A FOOLHARDY POLICY.
LONDON, Jan. 15. The opinion was expressed in some quarters tonight that the Berlin Government is pursuing a blundering foolhardy policy in forbidding coal deliveries to Belgium and France, as it is considered that the policy will give support to the French extremist views and probably lead to further occupation of the Ruhr and more drastic administration of it.

GERMAN DEMONSTRATORS AND FRENCH TROOPS CLASH.
BERLIN, Jan. 14. A clash between demonstrators and French troops occurred at the railway station at Bochum this evening. The demonstrators, who were French and French fired, killing one, and wounding several. The incident followed political demonstration on a scale. Several thousand collected in front of the Town Hall where the French General had his headquarters. They then marched through the streets. A number of young Communists made a counter demonstration, during the Third Internationale and the French Communist League. The demonstrators were unable to handle the situation and towards evening French troops were obliged to intervene and fired about eight o'clock.

GLOOMY WORD FROM LAUSANNE.
LAUSANNE, Jan. 15. A gloomy statement concerning the prospects of the Near East Conference and the prospects for a satisfactory settlement of many of the important questions before the Conference was made to-day by the chairman for the British Delegation. After two months of heavy work, he pointed out, agreement seems distant on several matters of importance. The statement gave the impression that the British, at least, are keeping public opinion for a possible breakdown of the Conference. The Riches of The Ruhr.

(By H. G. CARDOZO in Daily Mail.)
The Ruhr basin, which the French Government now occupies as a guarantee that Germany shall at last make some real attempt to meet her reparations debt, is, curiously enough, a coalfield, the discovery and the working of which was originally due to British money and brains. One thousand square miles in extent, the Ruhr basin has a present population of over 3,700,000, and its factories and coal mines turn out enough raw and finished material to supply 180 million tons of freight per year from its wonderful network for railways and canals.

When the British-Scottish and Irish engineers played a predominant part in the early development of the Ruhr—first came to the region Essen was a small provincial town of 50,000 inhabitants; its population now amounts to almost half a million. The immense richness of the Ruhr coal deposits was discovered soon after 1871, and the Germans themselves attribute the main pride of this discovery to an Irishman named Mulvaney, who sank some of the most valuable shafts, which now, half a century afterwards, are producing a rich income for their new German owners.

New Scotland, Erin, and Hibernia are the names of some of the most famous mines, and they were so named by their original Scottish and Irish discoverers and owners. It was only after a great financial crisis which swept over Europe in the eighties that the German magnates—Thyssen, Haniel, Krupp, and Kirdoff—secured their hold on the great majority of the mines and factories of this huge industrial region. Coal and steel form, of course, the two great riches of this much-discussed territory. It is estimated that the coal, which lies to a depth of 5,000 feet, could be hewed and brought up at the rate of 100 million tons per

year for 764 years before the mines are exhausted. If the pits were sunk deeper than 5,000 feet—and there are many mines which run much deeper—it is estimated that the same rate of production could be continued for another 674 years. The figures of steel production available are not very recent owing to the fact that the German industrialists, for reasons best known to themselves, have, since the armistice been careful to hide them in a maze of errors and falsifications. The last reliable figures are those for 1918, when 10 million tons of steel were turned out, or rather more than 90 per cent of the entire German production. In addition, the foundries of the region produced 40 million tons of crude or half-worked iron. The factories engaged in working up this steel and iron into engines, machinery, tools, rails, and plates, employ just under 1,000,000 h.p. There are 1,000,000 men, 15,000 foremen, and 8,000 engineers engaged in the factories and foundries of the Ruhr. The smartest afternoon slipper is of bronze, with a Spanish heel and a buckle.

ATTRACTS TWICE AS MANY PEOPLE AS DIME NOVELS IN LIBRARY.

Three exhibits at the New York Public Library have served to establish that Bibles are more popular than baseball or dime novels, says Victor Hugo Fallista, chief of the American history division, keeper of manuscripts and just now in charge of an exhibit of "Bibles or ancient and modern times in various languages." It should be possible to extract a bit of cheer from this—at least for those who believe the world is getting better and better, and who hope the improvement will continue. Mr. Fallista has charge of an exhibit of dime novels at the library, and also of the A. G. Spalding baseball exhibit. He says the Bible exhibit is attracting about twice as many persons as did the baseball show or the dime novels. "About 800 persons a day come in here to look at the Bible exhibit," he said, "and they are persons of various religions and races. I notice they really study the exhibit and remain longer than did those who looked at the dime novel and baseball exhibits. With the exception of the Roosevelt exhibit, when Col. Roosevelt's uniforms, books, letters, etc., were shown here, the Bible exhibit is the most popular we have ever had." There are Bibles two feet tall and six inches thick, and there is one Bible exhibited under a microscope.

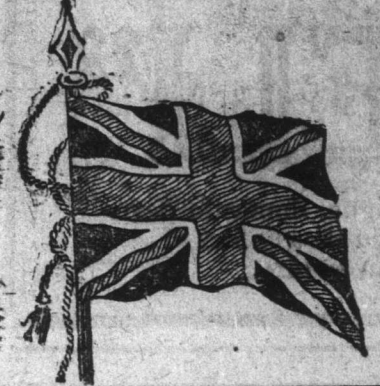

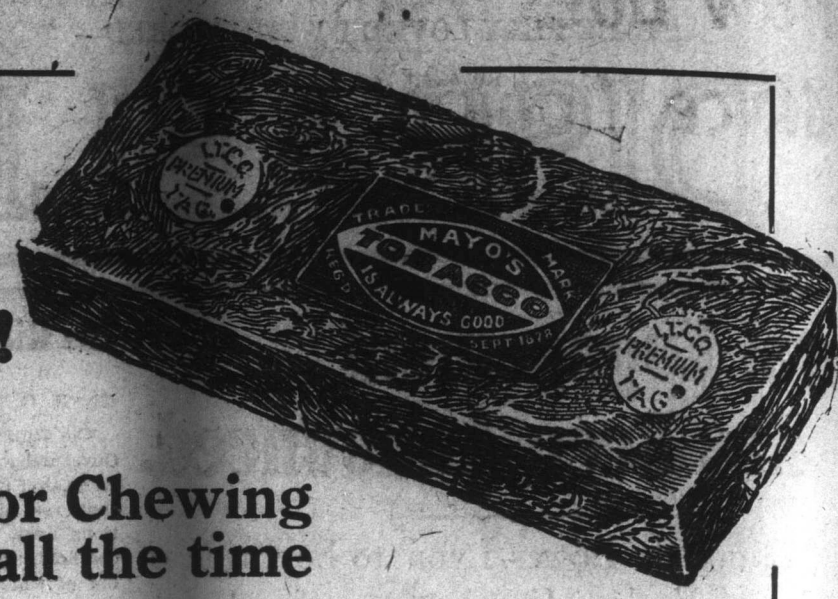

Girl Guide Movement.

Large Gathering Hear Splendid Addresses at College Hall.

A large gathering of citizens interested in the welfare and advancement of the Girl Guide movement was held in the Methodist College Hall last night. His Excellency the Governor presided. On arrival his Excellency and Lady Allardye were escorted by a Guard of Honor from the 2nd and 3rd St. John's, and the Caribon Troop of Girl Guides. The platform were a number of distinguished citizens representative of church and State. In the audience were many prominent citizens and members of the different Girl Guide Companies. Opening the evening his Excellency said he had expressed regret at the unavoidable absence of Rev. Dr. Greene, Colonel S.A. and Hon. J. R. Bennett, owing to the business of the day. His Excellency stated that some time he was not positively in favor of the Girl Guide movement. In fact, he was rather lukewarm, but had been converted by a girl who was not a very prepossessing girl. She was a Scotch lass and had come to his office one day and said she was Captain of the Guides and wanted to challenge him to a signalling contest. The match was arranged accordingly and an officer of a gunnery company was asked to judge. The boys had had a naval signaller instructor and could signal very well, and his Excellency felt sure that he would win and he went out to the girls' beat. To his surprise the girls beat the boys, and he was particularly surprised, his Excellency was astonished and quickly went up to the Captain and shook her hand congratulating her on her victory. Thus he was converted to the Girl Guide movement. He began to see visions of hundreds of girls being benefited by the movement and in consequence the years went on his Excellency was convinced that the vision was true one, and he was sure that the Girl Guides are going to bring about a bloodless one, and a greater and better citizenship. The Girl Guide movement is great that no country could do without it. The boys and girls of our day are those who will have to take up our duties when we pass on. They are the ones who will have to make our Newfoundland better and happier. His Excellency called upon Lady Allardye to preside at the meeting.

Lady Allardye opened her remarks by saying that his Excellency had wondered why he was asked to preside at a meeting concerning Girl Guides. It was because it was thought he would draw a crowd. The Commissioners and officers of the Girl Guides were at Government House talking of what they wished me to do to help their organization and we wondered what to do to get the people to help us. It is much easier to talk to a large audience than to several drawing room meetings and you have a better chance to tell people what you want. You are going to help us, said Lady Allardye, because the Girl Guide movement is the best of any organization. This is fully realized because all other previous similar associations had affiliated with the Girl Guides and big organizations have come in line to help. The Boy Scouts started out in a small way and assumed tremendous proportions. The girls did not want to be left out and General Baden-Powell's sister helped to give some assistance to the girls' movement. It copied the Boy Scouts very closely and some people did not like the idea, as they thought it was inclined to make tomboys of the girls. They were afraid to lay stress on the real reason of the Girl Guides' movement. The war gave them more courage and women are not afraid to stand up and say they want to make good women of the girls in body, heart and soul. To-day there are 400,000 Girl Guides and thousands are joining daily. We want more women to help us as officers, etc. In New South Wales Sir Walter and Lady Davidson have done wonderful work in connection with the movement. Dame Margaret, as Lady Davidson prefers to be called, is Commissioner there and she has appointed 14 new Commissioners to assist her, so that the young Captains will have more time to spend with the girls. After this meeting, I shall tell Dame Margaret, when I write her, that Newfoundland is doing something in the movement, and that we are waiting for a message from her. I shall ask her for some of her magic which will enable me to get the people to work and get good results. There are so many new careers for women that it is sometimes forgotten that the greatest career is that of womanhood in the home. We want women in our homes with loftiest ideals and with intelligence, who will help their husbands and children. (Applause.) We want them to be able to go steadily on training our children so that they may be able to take up the work they have to do when they reach womanhood. Many women with the biggest hearts have never had children of their own and they want to help some one. This movement gives an outlet for that motherly instinct. We have at headquarters in London, an Executive Council elected every year, which consists of nine members. Each member represents one distinct branch, a Colonial and Imperial Council and an International Council. The International Council consists of 37 members. This means that there are 37 different countries interested in the movement. The Girl Guide promises to honor God and her country and to help others. This means that when the women live for God and country, promising to help others, justice and cruelty will die out. By this movement spreading throughout the world, boys will grow up with

the same ideals and girls will develop into true women. We in Newfoundland should be more strongly organized. Lady Horwood is Chief Commissioner and she has three assistants, Miss Furlong, Miss Hayward and Miss Macpherson. Miss Macpherson is now in England and it is hoped she will be able to attend the annual conference. There are four Companies here. I am told that the first was Bishop Spencer College, then the Caribon, then the Girls Friendly Society and the Methodist College. There is a great deal to be done for these girls and, as at home, the movement has spread so that officers are needed. At a recent headmistress' conference all spoke highly of the good accomplished since the introduction of the movement. One headmistress told me that she studied the movement carefully before introducing it to her girls and she was glad to introduce it because it gave the girls a high ideal to live up to. The uniform enables every girl from H.E.H. Princess Mary, the poorest girl to look alike and does away with the envy of another girl's rich frock and so forth. If any uniform has been designed for our girls, it should be one which is inexpensive. I know every woman will come forward and thus be doing better work for the country. I have received a report from the Child Welfare Association. One petition is made that young girls be trained to help their mothers. I promised that we would help them and what we teach the children will go back to the home. We often hear Prime Ministers promising to erect institutions of a certain kind. We want to help children and teach them thereby preventing sin and thus making such institutions unnecessary. In the years to come sin and sorrow will be much less and we will not have to attend so many committee meetings and life will be better. We are all searching for the same thing—happiness in life. There are so many sorrowing women to-day that it makes one heavy-hearted till one almost dares not think of joy. If we give the boys and girls healthy things to do, they will grow up strong and self-reliant. We want every little girl in this island to know something of nursing and thereby she will know how to keep her body and consequently her mind clean. I have heard something of the outports, as a nurse crossed the ocean with me and she told me that in the lonely outports the girls have very little occupation at the nets. We could form Girl Guide Companies and send out instructors to those girls. It does not matter what Church a girl goes to, let us all get together and work for the three Guide promises—to God, Country and one another. So will you come forward as helpers or send me your names? You will find it easy to be a member of the Association and we can do a great deal of good. Of course we shall need some funds and if we pay a fee of one dollar per year this will make it easier. We could have a number of Vice Presidents who would pay say \$5 yearly. We would also want an Honorary Auditor, as where money is handled the accounts would have to be audited and everything kept straight. We would have to start an Officers' Training Corps and a Cadet Corps so that we would have sufficient officers to handle the troops. Nothing can be started without a little money and we cannot ask the Government for any. I would ask the business men to help us to get headquarters. We want a central meeting place to discuss questions and receive lectures. In Tasmania the business men gave us the first year of headquarters and then offered a second one. Please send the names and addresses to me at Government House, of any people who can help us in any way.

The Lord Bishop of Newfoundland was the next speaker. Although his Lordship professed to know nothing about the Girl Guide Movement he had a clear idea of what Scout life was doing for the boys and he felt that if the Guide movement did anything like that for the girls it was well worth support. His Lordship assured his Excellency and Lady Allardye that when they visited the outports they would receive a tremendous welcome. His Lordship spoke of life in the outports and recommended the Girl Guide movement for the good work it would do. Dr. V. P. Burke, representing his Grace the Archbishop, said that anything pertaining to the welfare of

the young girls of our country would have the heartiest support of his Grace. The Girl Guide movement was teaching girls to be charitable and Christian and was a movement deserving of every help and assistance. Sir Richard Squires, Prime Minister, on this the first occasion he had the privilege of standing on the same platform with their Excellencies, extended a hearty welcome to the Governor and Lady Allardye. All had heard the din of "Rights," Labor Rights, Capitalist Rights, etc., but the only world that rang true in "Duty." In the pursuit of Rights, Duty was often lost sight of. The Girl Guide movement placed Duty before all and in the practise of the Guide laws the call of Duty to men and women was paramount in the minds of the young girls.

Mr. W. J. Higgins joined with the Prime Minister in the welcome to their Excellencies. As one who had always been interested in athletics he knew the value of training such as the Guide movement gave. He referred to the promises taught by each Guide and felt that by keeping them the girls were benefitted to a high degree. He felt sure that no trouble would be experienced in getting the Vice Presidents. He assured Lady Allardye that interest in the movement would continue and the value would be seen in years to come. Miss Cherrington, headmistress of Bishop Spencer College, spoke of the assistance the Girl Guide movement was to teachers. The girls were in fact with ideals which no amount of teaching could bring home to them properly. The girls of to-day in many cases read novels, go to movies, and plays which present an undesirable side of life and do more harm than good. The best way to counteract evil is to impress the joy of work well done, to exhilarate the spirits and caring for the weak and suffering. Our educational system is one-sided. We develop the literary and mathematical side of life and neglect the social and womanly side. The Guide movement develops this side by means of its different proficiency tests and the girls become learned in the essentials which make up a true woman. Miss Cherrington referred to the different badges and closed her remarks by saying that employers when asking for a girl's school record if they ask "Is she a good Guide" and are told "yes" then they may be sure they are getting a good girl.

A vote of thanks was proposed by Sir P. T. McGrath seconded by Mayor Cook, and on being passed by acclamation, was tendered his Excellency by Chief Justice Horwood. The meeting was brought to a close by the singing of the National Anthem.

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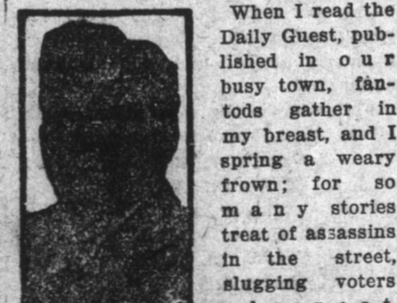

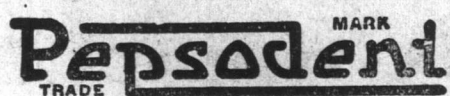

Glace Bay Parties Going to Labrador.

SCHOONER WANTED TO TAKE EXPEDITION LEAVING SYDNEY IN FEBRUARY FOR NEW GOLD FIELDS.

SYDNEY, N.S., Jan. 8.—Negotiations for a schooner to take an expedition to the Labrador gold fields early in February are being conducted here by an agent acting on behalf of a company of Glace Bay adventurers who for the present are keeping their identities a secret.

They are determined to try their fortunes in the new Eldorado and their vessel, with a crew of 20 men will sail from Louisburg probably about a month after the departure from Halifax, on January 20, of two steam trawlers which are taking a party of Ottawa prospectors to the Stag Bay district.

Experienced skippers here do not look with much favor upon making the trip north so early in the year. They say it is now possible to reach Stag Bay with less danger from drift ice than later in the season, but on the other hand the new arrivals will find the streams frozen over and the difficulties of working the placer gold deposits well nigh insurmountable.

In addition there is the danger from the ferric spring freshets which when the snow begins to melt under the warm summer sun, annually pour down the brooks to the sea sweeping all before them. It was these freshets which brought the gold into Stag Bay and its feeding rivers, geologists claim.

Sydney men are also planning trips to Stag Bay, but they have no intention of setting out for the rock-ribbed coast before Dominion Day.

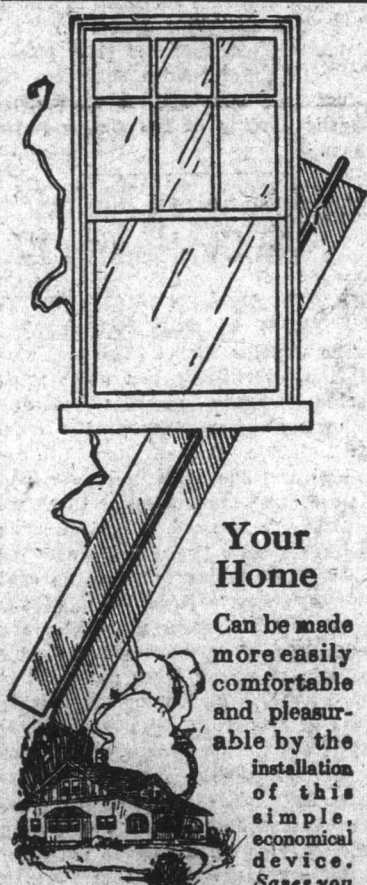


Loss of Schooner

It follows:—

- 1.—Women's Rights. Constitutional reforms to secure civil and political equality.
 - 2.—Social Mission of Cuban Womanhood. Action through public speaking and the press.
 - 3.—Women's Work. Protective legislation for feminine workers and expectant mothers who also are bread winners.
 - 4.—Protection for the Cuban home. Reformation of legislation affecting property rights of wives and children.
 - 5.—Moral and Physical Welfare of the Race. Campaigns against social evils and diseases, lewd books, white slave trade and habit forming drugs.
 - 6.—Child Welfare. Assistance in fighting infant mortality and improving the moral and physical standards of Cuba's youth.
 - 7.—Social Welfare. Study of arts and sciences, summer colonies, instruction in civil rights.
 - 8.—Woman suffrage. Constitutional reforms.
 - 9.—Women in Business. Their actual status and means of improving it.
 - 10.—Women on the Farm. Farm classes for women and means of installing a love for flowers and the beautifying of homes.
- The executive committee for the congress is made up of Mrs. Pilar Merlen de Menendez, president; and eight vice-presidents: Mrs. Manuela Berria de Valdes, secretary, and five assistant secretaries; and Miss Hortensia Lamar, treasurer.

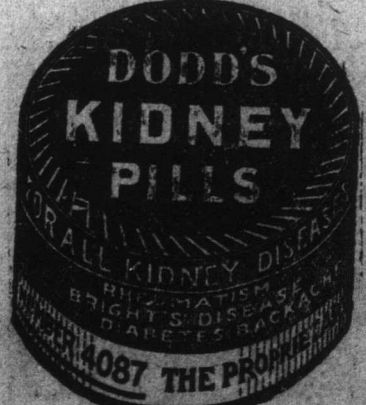

French Finances.

THE BUDGET DOES NOT BALANCE.

France are indebted to one of our friends in the city for the article, which appeared in the "Argus" of Cape Town, on November 7th, 1922. It may be of some interest to the general public.

Some of the somewhat disquieting cables about the "weakness" of the franc and the "critical" French finances. It may be interesting to quote from the latest issue of the French Minister of Finance's annual report.

fortune to be the theatre of the world's war and suffered accordingly; 2nd, instead of exacting from Germany the fulfillment of the Treaty obligations, the Allies seem, so far as results are concerned, to have stiffened and bolstered Germany's resistance, thus leaving to France the choice of either advancing for Germany the cost of reparations, or remaining indefinitely crippled.

The following official figures will enable one to understand how France has succeeded in balancing her budget, after these most critical three years, and they ought to dispel the vague, but still existent, belief abroad that France is recklessly borrowing and spending more and more each year.

In 1919, 31 billions francs; in 1920, 42 billions francs; in 1921, 51 billions francs; and will borrow in 1922, 20 billions francs.

No doubt 20 billion francs is still too much, far too much. But again it must not be forgotten that over three-quarters of this loan is to be applied to the devastated regions, whose reconstruction cannot be interrupted or delayed. Note also that practically the whole of these special loans, amounting within the 1922

loan to almost one hundred billions, has been raised in France, and that the bonds (Credit National Bonds) are now quoted above the price of emission. Furthermore, one can see the end of this special expenditure more swiftly and surely than if it was a question of unemployment dole. Also reconstruction will mean more taxpayers and more producers, particularly bearing in mind that the devastated regions and will be again the industrial and wealthiest area in France.

Increased Taxation.

The yearly amount collected in taxation of all kind was in 1914 about 5 billions francs. It has been, in 1919, 11 billions, 586 millions francs; in 1920, 19 billions, 821 millions francs; in 1921, 21 billions, 543 millions francs; and will be in 1922, 24 billions, more or less. This seems effectually to answer the often lightly repeated accusations either that the French are not being taxed enough, or that the administration is too slack regarding evasions of taxation.

Lessened Expenditure.

1. Military expenses: These amounted in 1919 to 18 billions, 185 million francs; 1920, 7 billions 612 million francs; 1921, 5 billions 612 million francs; 1922, 4 billions, 910 million francs. From the above figures, it may be deduced that, even speaking in gold terms, France spent less in 1922 than before the war, to ensure her national security. Moreover, we are apt to forget that the French pro-war army has been reduced by 200,000 men and that the time of military service has been reduced from three years to two years (in practice 18 months). Meanwhile, our Japanese Allies, for instance, have increased their per-war military expenses by 70 per cent. Still the French are freely accused of militarism and imperialism.

2. Civil expenses: These have been in 1920, 11 billions, 877 millions; in 1921, 9 billions, 838 millions, and will be in 1922, 7 billions, 625 millions. Another significant fact, the French Parliament has voted the suppression of 40,000 functionaries. This injunction has so far been carried out to the extent of 28,000 and the axe will finish its work before the year is over.

Favourable Indications.

To sum up, the French Government will spend about seven billion francs less this year than last year, and will recover in taxes nearly three billions more. This alleviation, by about ten billion francs, of the financial situation, will increase next year and every following year, as has been the case during the last three years. Other indications, also cited by M. de Lasteyrie, tend to put into light the magnificent effort made by France. The commercial balance of the nation showed in 1919 a deficit of 24 billion francs, while in 1922 this deficit has been brought down to two billions, out of which the proportion of raw material necessary to industry is increasing monthly.

In spite of the generally bad economic conditions, French railways show a surplus of over one billion francs. The unemployed who receive government doles number an average of 2,000, instead of hundreds of thousands elsewhere. The Savings Banks show an important increase in their deposits, and Government stocks are slowly but steadily rising, even if the franc has lately depreciated a few points abroad. By the way, it may be safely inferred from the figures quoted that this depreciation, which does not affect prices in France, is principally due to speculation, possibly, also, to a smaller extent, to the exaggerated, sometimes wilful, rumours of the supposed entanglement of the franc with the mark. That the franc is tied up with the mark, nobody believes in France. Apart from the vast difference between the two exchanges, the French intend to stick to the franc, while the German magnates have long ago renounced the mark, since they found out that they could follow with profit the practice of keeping their accounts in foreign currency and since the printing press has proved such an easy way of swindling the world of hundreds of millions. (The amount invested in marks by the U.S. of America and England alone is computed to be about 410 million pounds sterling, worth at the present rate about thirteen millions). This point has already been made clear enough in the S. A. Press.

The interesting fact is that the whole of France is hard at work recuperating, and is succeeding very satisfactorily. This result has been accomplished despite the crippled state of her richest area, during three years of the most serious of general crisis and economic depression, just out of a war which had bled her almost white, and in an atmosphere of international insecurity which is not yet at an end. The unique source of France's actual financial difficulties is in Germany's failure to comply with her obligations. No Frenchman is underrating these difficulties, but every Frenchman is confident that the task is not above their strength and the loyal co-operation of their Allies. He is confident that, even apart of reparations, each year will reap France in a better financial standing.

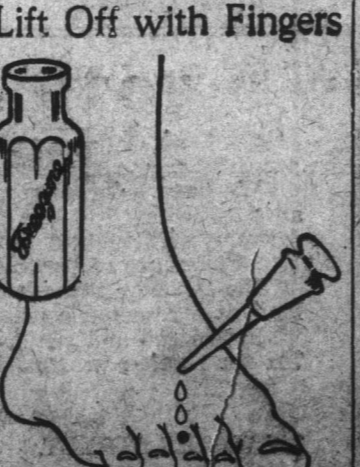
