That we shall have a Central Examining Board for the purpose of examining all candidates for license to practice medicine in the Province of Ontario. That such Board shall consist of the Council, with optional power either to examine the candidates, or appoint one or more persons to do so under their superintendence. That powers be conferred on the Council to make provision by By-law for the election of its members.

Dr. McGill spoke strongly in favour of the first clause, for establishing a Central Board. The different colleges were jogging along in the old way, and the height of their ambition, in some cases, seemed to be which would make the most money. He felt sorry that the efforts and ambition of the colleges should not be directed to a higher object, namely, to raise the standard of education. A Central Board is the only means of attaining the object in view It would interfere in no way with the colleges, but it would in time bave the effect of raising the standard of education. It would no doubt be humiliating if the students of any particular College were rejected by this Board. But if this occurred once, it is not likely it wou'd occur again, for the standard would be raised wherever it was found too low, and would be made respectable and uniform.

Dr. Clarke coincided in the opinions so ably expressed by Dr. McGill with regard to establishing a Central Board. He referred to the defects in the Medical Act, more particularly that portion referring to matriculation. A student could pass his matriculation examination, get his degree, and then go to the Registrar to get his name registered, and that officer had to do so without asking whether the applicant had passed the matriculation examination appointed by the Cor cill or not.

MILITARY NEWS.—The Globe's Ottawa correspondent says: It is intended to auth-orize the concentration of all the rural battalions which are detached for field brigades at the respective battalion headbattalions which are detached for field brigades at the respective battalion head-quarters for the purpose of performing the annual drill. The city battalions detailed for the field brigades will be authorized to perform six drills out of the sixteen drills of the ensuing year, with the same object. In addition to the battalions, a few will be concentrated at the most exposed points, such as Windsor, Sai ia and the Eastern frontier to the south of Montreal. I believe it is intended to concentrate the frontier battalions in a few days. The other steps indicated may likewise be expected to take place almost immediately. It is reported here that the Minister of Militia has made the concessions demanded by Adjutant-General MacDougell, and that his resignation will not take place in October as was announced some time ago. The Civil Service Commission has been appointed by the Government, and consists of C. S. Ross of Kingston, Thos. Reynolds, of the St. Lawrence and Ottawa Railway, and Messrs. Langton, Smith, Bouchette and Griffin, deputy heads of departments.—The Commission is to assemble at once, and take evidence as to the requirements of each department.
