UNIONTOWN, March 14.—The jury ac-
quitted Duke of the murder of Nutt.

When the jury announced the verdict
the Duke's trial, Judge Wilson looked amazed

and said: "Gentlemen, I suppose your ver-
dict is one that you thought you should

give dissatisfaction to the court, because
you thought the evidence sufficient to justify

the verdict. If you have committed an
error it is one we cannot avoid, but on only
one day. The prisoner is discharged." Duke

Wilson said, "is a trial of the century."

Gen. Butler Views a Bill that Statutes the
Reserve of the Legislature.

BOSTON, March 14.—A session was
called in the legislature to-day by a mes-

sage from Gov. Butler vetoing a bill making
appropriations to the amount of \$47,000

for the expenses of charitable institutions.
The governor says the bill contains appro-

priations, some of which are objectionable
in their nature, and is a continuation of the

policy of appropriating to one bill differ-
ent appropriations for diverse objects. The

governor estimates the appropriations in
the bill for salaries at 60 per cent of the

total amount to be expended for maintenance
of the institutions. He declares the com-

missionary and other officers and agents

THE PROPERTY BIOGRAPHY.

A Sketch of the Life of Dr. E. Stone
Wiggins.

From the Ottawa Free Press.

Prof. Wiggins of this city, whose name
has been within the past six months spread

far and wide in connection with his prophe-
cy, was born in the county of Queens, N.
B., in 1839, and is a direct descendant of

Thomas Wiggins, who was in 1830 by
Lord James and Brooks as governor of the
then American plantations, and whose fam-

ily name is still to be seen upon the home
government of the day of the colonists. We

learn from Wm. Callen Bryant's history of
the United States that Capt. Wiggins' father

of Thomas, was one of the first to protest
against the tyrannical authority of the colo-

nia, who was at the head of the military
governor in 1765. In 1815 Robert
Mason, who was at the head of the military

governor in 1815, attempted to
bring the plaintiff on to the city of
New Hampshire of the preceding year,

on the ground that his father had
been a member of the military govern-

ment of New Hampshire in 1765. Mr. Wiggins,
son of Captain T. Wiggins, was one of
those who loudly complained against the

master of arts in 1858, subsequently becoming

doctor of medicine in 1862, and doctor of
divinity in 1865. He was a member of the

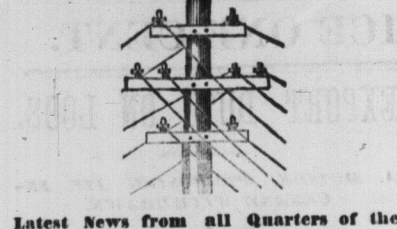

By the treaty now in force, British subjects are allowed to travel for pleasure or business in all parts of the interior of China.

While desiring to encourage in every possible way the development of the mining resources of the country, it is as well as it should be to encourage speculators to be of the bona fide of any concern before investing their money. As proof of the necessity of this warning we quote the following from a *Post* reporter:

THE TRIAL OF THE POLICE INFORMERS. The trial of the police informers Gordon and Tilley at the police court yesterday revealed a most unhealthy state of things. In the first place it appears outrageous that men should be given money to encourage the breaking of the law, and that as Mr. Dexter puts it, "it is well as it were that they should be offered a reward, worse than they should be offered."
