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BRITISH PEACE POLICY.

London, Jan. 28.—The House of Commons last evening debated the amendment to the address in reply to the King's speech, assuring that the House will prepare to support all proper measures for the effective prosecution of the war.

Mr. Chamberlain, the Colonial Secretary, in the course of the debate, said that the assumption of Lord Roseberry in his recent speech at Chichester that the Boers could at any time have the terms that Lord Kitchener offered them, was a mistake.
