It is rumoured in England that Lord Monck will not rourn to Canada, and that he will be succeeded by Lord Naas, at present trish Secretary.

The list of English subscriptions to the Quebec Relief Fund is published, and exhibits a noble generosity to praise which would be to gild refined gold. The sum total of the subscriptions amounts to \$111,600!

The direct trade between this country and France is yearly increasing. The number of vessels entered inwards at the Port of Quebec for 1866 was 22, tonnage 5222, and cleared from Quebec 22 vessels, 9232 tons. In the list of Canadian exports to France are 7 vessels of 3,227 tons, amounting to \$131,880.

Tenders for the deepening of the Grenville and Carillon canal were opened on the 15th just, in the Public Works Department, Ottawa. The deepening of the canal is deemed of such importance by lumbermen and saw mill owners on the Ottawa, that they have guaranteed upwards of thirty thousand dollars to the Department of Public Works to enable the work to be commenced at once in anticipation of a 1-y | grant 'rom l'arliament.

Manufactories on Lachine Canal.

The London Railway News and Joint Stock Journal states that the Canadian Delegates have settled all points at issue with the N. B. and N. S. Delegates on the one hard, and with the Imperial government on the other, regarding the Confederation of these Provinces, and that a bill on the accepted basis will be introduced at the opening of next session, to confirm the arrangement. It also says that the Imperial guarantee of £3,000,000 for the Intercolonial Rullway will be increased to £4,000,000 if necessary, and that the line can be completed in two years, to connect the Grand Trunk with Halifux.

Mr. A. Michel, the well known mining engineer attached to the Canada Geological Commission, and on whose statements reliance mur be placed, writes that although he was not permitted to make in the Richardson gold mine near Madoc, the works required for a thorough investigation of the discovery, he saw enough and assayed a sufficient quantity of earthy matter and rock to be persuaded of the existence in the Township of Madoc "of an auriferous deposit as extraordinary for its wealth as for the conditions of its existence"

A nugget of gold, weighing forty ounces, worth about seven hundred dollars, was found a few weeks since at a depth of 32 feet, on the DeLery property in the Chaudiere distric'; and in the same place was found a few days previously a smaller nugget weighing eight ounces.

The advance which has taken place in the London Stock Market in Canadian Government securities is very gratifying, resulting as it does without doubt from the harmonious manner in which the Confederation delegates have arranged the details of the scheme The following is a comparison of the quotations in London at the 1st of October and in December 28th :-

The Wool Growers' Association of Illinois recently held a meeting at Springfield in that State, at which speeches were made and resolutions adopted in favour of high duties on wool, and they pledged themselves without distinction of party hereafter not to support any person for either state or national office who was opposed to the protection of American industry.

It is proposed to establish an universal green back currency in the United States, the national Bank notes to be replaced by \$300,000,000 legal tenders. The supporters of this scheme claim that by retiring 6 per cent. bonds to that amount, a saving of \$18,0:0,000 per aunum to the country would be effected. The immediate effect would probably be an advance in the premium on gold.

EXPORT TRADE OF MONTREAL.

WE publish elsowhere a tabular statement of the exports of Montreal by sea and rall for the years 1865 and 1866. In goods not the produce of Canada there is a decrease of \$839,416, but on the other hand. of the productions of Canada \$1,925,594 worth more have been exported from this port in 1803.

The following are the totals:-

This increase has taken place chieffs in the items of Barley, Oats, Oatmeal, Peas, Flour, Butter and Cheese, the shipments of Oats being nearly a million bushels in excess of 1865.

If the trade of Montreal is to be taken as any index to that of the whole Province, a very great increase in every respect may be looked for. The shipments of lumber in 1866 we know to have been very heavy, and also of horses and cattle from various parts of the country, and there is no reason to apprehend any talling off in other articles.

LACHINE HYDRAULIC SCHEME.

THE great project originated by enterprising citizens of Montreel of dominion the Landing of Montreal of damming the Lachine Rapids, is attracting considerable attention from the press of the Province and from private individuals. One leading Western Journal speaks of it as a work of " tremendous magnitude and transcendant importance," whilst many others commend the public spirit and enterprise which prompt the efforts about to be made to realize it. Had it not been for the astonishing advancement the world has made of late years in carrying out great undertakings, the idea of placing a dam across the north shore of the St. Lawrence at the Lachine Rapids might well have been scouted as impracticable. But the skill of man is becoming omnipotent Our Victoria Bridge, the Atlantic Cable, and half a dozen other i nportant undertakings, fully attest this, and this new project, so creditable to the enterprise of our principal citizens, and so necessary to the mannfacturing progress of the city is by no means impracticable. Heron Island and the other smaller ones above it, can, without doubt, be connected by a dam to the shore-not, of course, without a large expenditure of time and money. But in ludging of the propricty of entering into the work, its great importance and utility must be considered. Fifteen years ago it was probably unnecessary. The manufactures of Montreal were then but small compared with what they are now. In no particular has the city advanced more rapidly during that period than in the number and extent of its manufactories, the benefits of which are too well known and appreciated to require to be pointed out by us. The Lachino Canal does not now afford sufficient water-power, and unless some means were found of increasing it, it would not be long until our industrial progress received a check. If the Lachine rapids are successfully dammed across at Heron Island-not to speak of the contemplated canal-the motive force obtained will be enormous. It will completely settle the water supply for Montreal for many years, and when the canal is finished, we will literally be able to say that we have "enough and to spare." The great importance of this gigantic undertaking to Montreal, and indeed to the entire Province, can hardly be over-estimated. There are many reasons why this city should become the chief manufacturing district in this country. To begin with, we have cheaper labour probably than any other place; this fact, added to our unequalled water-power, give this city an advantage over many other localities, and when to these advantages is added the superior market which Montreal affords, we have said enough to show why it ought to become the chief manufacturing place in the country. The project of the St. Louis Hydraulic Com, any, if successfully carried out, will | satisfactory. do much to ensure the manufacturing supremacy of this city. Two million of dollars is undoubtedly a large sum to contemplate spending on any single privato enterprise. But when we considered the immense advantages which that expenditure may produce—the mills and factories it may set in motion-and the workmen to which they will give employment, we believe it will be money well and profitably spent. The same journal to which we have already alluded, gives its opinion that this great undertaking-adding as it will so I amen ely to the water-power of Montreal will every section of the country.

cause it to double its population in ten years! This may appear to some rather an extravagant estimate, but we should not be the least surprised if it were realized. One thing at least we may be certain of-it will greatly augment the already rapid progress of this city, and served to render it more than ever-the commercial metropolis of Canada.

TRADE AND FINANCE.

SOME Interesting particulars regarding the Trade and Finances of Canada have recently been published. On both of these points, very entisfactory statements are given by our government officials-showing, as they do, that this country continues to enjoy a large share of prosperity.

During the last fiscal year, the balance of trade, for the first time in many years, was in our favour. The total returns of our trade foot up to no less than \$110,130,690, of which we experted articles to the value of \$56,328,330, and imported from other countries to the extent of \$58,802,319. This is a large trade for a young country like Canada, and it is gratifying to know that it has been as profitable as it has been extensivo. Of our imports, we bought most largely from Great Britain, the amount being \$28.984,530. Before the late civil war across the lines, the United States held the foremost place in this respect; but during last year they sold us only to the value of \$20,424,685. The difference now in favour of the mother country is thus over \$8,500,00 -a fact which shows how injuriously the high taxation and prices in the States have effected their foreign trade Of our exports, on the other hand, our American neighbours took most; we sold them to the value of \$34,770,201 whilst we only took from them articles worth \$12,951, 641. Striking a balance between the amounts we sold the Americans and they sold us, we find that the balance of trade is in our favour to the large extent of \$14.315,576! This is a very significant circumstance when viewed by the light of the abrogution of the reciprocity treaty, and may serve to give brother Jonathan a little light on the question -who pays the duties he has so senselessly imposed.

The Auditor General has recently published an official statement of the receipts and expenditures of Canada during the six months ending the 31-t December, which is the first half of the fiscal year 1896-67. This statement must also be very gracitying to the people of Canada for it shows that our revenue has been more than sufficient to meet the government expenditures, and that there is a handsome surplus over. The figures are as follows:-

A balance in favour of the Province on the six month's transactions of \$723.259, must be considered quite satisfactory. Had a surplus been a common feature of our financial management, there would not have been such cause for comment on the present eccasion; but it is well known that we have suffered from a long series of deticits, which have added largely to our public debt, and done not a little injury to the credit of the country. We hail this large surplus as a harbinger of better financial management, and we trust we have seen the last of delicits in our Provincial revenue for some years to come. Another fact bearing on this point also deserves to be mentioned. We refer to the fact that during the period for which the above returns are given, the government has been put to a larger expenditure than usual, on account of the arming and equipping the volunteers, and putting down the Fenian raid. That the greater portion of this outlay should have already been paid, renders the fact of the above balance in our favour all the more

Whilst touching on this topic, we may also mention that a statement regarding the Provincial notes in circulation, is made every month. Up to the 2nd Jan. last, the notes in circulation were \$1,975,307, the amount payable at Montreal being \$1,146,693, and at Toronto \$825,614. The amount of specie held in Montreal to redeem these notes was \$438,000, and at Toronto \$292,000. Three millions of Debentures are held by the Receiver General under the Provincial Note Act., These notes are now to be found in almost

BANKING IN THE UNITED STATES.

HE banking interest in the United States is in a peculiar position. Ever since the New York banks, at the beginning of the war agreed to loan the government fifty millions to carry on operations, they have been so involved with it, that under all circumstances they must sink or swim with it. bankers here and in other parts of the world, the discounts of the banks are comparatively small, -in many cases not amounting even to their capital. This all confirms what has been so often said during the last few years, that the credit of the government in various aid, were the rule, and credit the exception, consequently discountable paper was restricted to very narrow limits, compared with the amount formerly current. Cash payments, however, were really only credit payments in another form, the actual truth being that instead of so many millions being found in the books of traders as due from one to another, or found in the bill cases of bankers as discounted for such traders, the whole mass has been agglomerated into a debt of the government to all and sundry, who. ever may be the holders of their boads or bills for the time being. The fact that a vast portion of the cash current in the country is that of national banks does not affect the question at all, for the notes of these banks rest on Government securities. The vastness of cash current in the country is therefore only an evidence of the indebtedness of the Government. This consideration will enable us to understand how it is that the leans and discounts of the banks are so low. Instead of private individuals owing one another, Government owes them all, and thus, instead of the banks holding bills representing private indebtedness, they have the larger pa t of their funds employed in bonds and securities representing the indebtedness of the Government. We have before us a printed statement of the condition of the National Bank of Commerce. New York, the bank of the largest capital, and probably the largest business on the American Continent. This bank has always maintained a highly conservative character, and taken the lead amongst the banks of the United States. When its adhesion was secured to the loan of fifty millions before referred to. the Secretary of the Treasury felt secure.

As a matter of interesting comparison, we have placed the statement of this bank and that of our largest institution side by side. The points of agreement and of contrast are worthy of note, as affording an index not only to the course of business pursued by the two institutions, but of the condition of business in the places where it is carried on.

An experienced eye on looking over these figures will at once interpret their meaning. On a capital of \$6,000,000. the Bank of Montreal discounts \$11,2:0,000. while the Bank of Commerce, with \$10,000,000 of capital, discounts only \$7,200,000. But while the Bank of Montreal has lent the government only \$3,300,000, or little more than a third of its capital, the Bank of Commerce has lent in the same manner \$12,100,000, or its whole capital and one-fitth more. The very existence of the Bank therefore rests on the strength of the government. The volume of the daily transactions of a bank may be estimated by the amount of other bank notes and cheques it holds from day to day. The amount held by the Bank of Commerce is eight times that of the Bank of Montreal, and as the whole of its business is done in one office, while the statements of the Montreal Bank includes notes held at its numerous

branches, we may form a conception of the enormous volume of the days' transactions in a great New York bank. To judge by this statement, and from other sources of information we should say there must be some \$10,000,000 passing over the counter, in receipts and payments every day. This, of course is in the depreciated currency of the United States. The Bank of Commerce it will be observed owes a large sum to other banks. These are banks for whom it acts as agents, and whose balances are held at call, the item therefore, does not, as in the case of banks here, indicate a drawing on foreign credits.

The respective strength of the two institutions is an interesting subject of comparison. The Bank of Montreal has in available means about 42 per cent, of its liabilities, the Bank of Commerce about 41 per cent. The last of course is inclusive of government securities, which, in the case of the New York institution, are as available as any other of its assets, from the fact that they can be sold in Wall street at any hour.

INAUGURATION OF THE BLUE LINE.

IMIE completion of the third rail of the Great Western trailway, whereby passengers and freight can be carried from the Atlantic to the Missouri without change of cars, is an event of great importance indirectly to Canada-directly to the States lying to the East and to the West of her. The benefit, however, of this new line of uniform guage will be chiefly to the great North-West, for the carrying of freight to and from which it will be mainly used.

The completion of the undertaking was duly celebrated at Hamilton last week, when a number of gentlemen from Chicago and Detroit were hospitably received and entertained by the officers of the Great Western Railway and the Hamilton Board of Trade. An address of welcome from that Board was read, and speeches were made and toasts drank in honor of the guests, of the Great Western, and its manager, Mr. Swinyard, &c., &c Everything passed off very pleasantly and cordially, good wishes being treely interchanged between the Hemiltonians and their guests from the West.

We trust the "Blue Line" will prove a great success, and that the Great Western Railway Company may reap all the benefits they deserve for their enterprise and energy in planning and carrying to a successful termi nation so important an undertaking.

PRODUCE.-The quantity of Potatoes afloat is very large, and the demand is not active. Prices are very low (viz., 20c. to 30c per bushel for Prince Edward Island) and holders must loose considerable. Oats: the market is well supplied and the demand maderate, and sales are freely made at 44c, to 47c, per bushel. We do not anticipate any decline. Butter dull; stock on hand very large. Holders will have to submit to lower prices in order to effect sales.

WEST INDIA PRODUCE.-We have no material change to note. Molasses quiet, at 50c. for Cienfuegos (in bond). The stock in market is not large, but fullly ample for all our requirements until the new crop arrives. Sugar dull. Rum in moderate request.

Stock in warehouse, Jan. 1st 1867 .- 1,909 puncheons 141 tierces 64 barrels Molasses; 2,367 hhds 91 tierces 815 barrels 99 boxes Sugar; 610 puncheons 18 hlids 84 barrels Rum.

Provisions,-Pork dull and declining, and difficult to effect sales, at \$19 for American Mess. Beef quiet, with no enquiry. We look for a decline in Provisions generally.

The stringency in the money market which has prevailed so long, we hope has ceased with the year, and we now look for a favourable change in our monetary nffairs.

FREIGHTS .- Shipping business has been very dull during the past month, but we look for some activity next week.

ST. JOHN TRADE REPORT.

St. Joun, N.B., Jan. 12th, 1867.

THE business of the city since our last report has been, as is usual at this season of the year, very quiet, and there is little change to report in any of the various departments of trade. Shipbuilding continues in a very depressed condition; but there seems to be every reason to believe that the general trade of the Province is in a sound and healthy state, and that the past year, if not marked by any very brilliant results, has still found us advancing on the road of progress and improvement.

The Post-office authorities have announced a welcome change in the mail arrangements, by means of which a "closed mail" will be forwarded every evening to Montreal e. Calais and Bangor during the winter mouths This arrangement will be of the greatest service to the mercantille community and has given much satisfaction. Few things show more clearly the increase of business between Canada and the Maritime Provinces, than the amount of correspondence passing between them, in comparison with even only a year since. The shipping arrivals since the 3rd have been very limited. one vessel from Great Britain, the Ida E , from Bristol with coals, being reported; there has been one arrival from New York with a general cargo; and two from Portland with flour, the remainder were in ballast. Sunday, the 6th, brought us the first 1 -avy enow storm of the reason-snow fell on an average about 12 inches The winter roads throughout the Province at ynow in splendld order, and lumbering operations are being pushed forward with unusual vigor and suc-

LUMBER.—The movements of Lumber since our last report have been considerable, and in the West India trade particularly there has been an active business doing The clearances since the 3rd comprise six vessels with deals for ports in Great Britain, thirteen for ports in the West Indies, and two for the United States. The shipments to the West Indies consist for the most part of sugar shooks, but it is worthy of remark that many of the vessels took more or less assorted cargoes, with a view of testing the practicability of opening up a trade in other commodities besides lumber. Among these vessels may be mentioned the schooner "Trojan," for Barbadoes, her cargo consisting of lumber, oats, compressed hay, dry goods, nails and potatoes. Another vessel, the "Ambro," for the same island, took a cargo of lumber, fish, potatoes, and farm produce generally. She was loaded by G Bent, Esq., of St. John, who accompanies the vessel with a view of examining for himself regarding the practicability of extending our trade in that direction. Great care was taken in the preparation of the "Ambro's" cargo, and in the selection of articles of good quality. A third vessel, the "Mary J. Goddard." took a similar cargo for Mataras. We are glad to record these instances of enterprise, and trust that they will prove remunerative and help to lay the foundation of a largely increased trade.

& Kuees 31,805 FLOUR.—The heavy importations of the last two months have produced the results anticipated, and for some time past there has been no margin whatever, after paying freight, between prices in Montreal and St. John-indeed, in many instances it has been the other way. There is reason to believe, however, that the lowest point has been touched, and we have to-day to report a slight advance, and a firmer market than has existed for some time. This is not to be attributed to any increase in the demand, which is still very

limited, but rather to a determination on the part of large holders not to sell below certain rates. We quote Strong Superfine, \$8.00 to \$8.25; Superfine, 87.75 to \$7.90.

Return of Flour inspected at the Port of St. John for the fortnight ending Jan. 11th:-

Provisions, &c .- There is no material change to report in this department, and the remarks of the past three weeks are quite applicable to the circumstances of the present one.

The bark "Honduras," Capt. Meadows, sailed from this port for Swansea on the 11th Dec. with a cargo of deals, when three days out, sprung a leak during a galo of wind, and, on the 10th day, became water logged, when the crew took to the maintop for safety where they remained for three days, and were ultimately taken off by the ship "Abby Ryerson," which carried them into New York, where they arrived on the 4th inst. One man (the cook) who refused to go into the maintop, was drowned. The "II." belonged to Southampton, and was 8 years old. She was originally bound to Quebec with a cargo of coals, but after an unusually long passage, despairing of reaching her destination, bore up for this port.

The Beacon Light House at the entrance of the harbour, caught fire on the morning of the 7th, and in spite of all the efforts made to save it, was burned to the waters edge. The Steam Fire engine was taken down on board the ferry boat, but the salt water caused the boiler to feam so much that it was found to be useless. A large quantity of Albertine oil was stored in the cellar, and fears were entertained of an explosion, but none took place. It is feared that it will not be possible to rebuild the light house until the spring, and "notices to mariners" have been issued accordingly,

From a statement furnished to the Morning Telegraph by Mr. Munro of Lloyd's office, we learn that the whole tonnage of vessels now in course of construction at St. John and its vicinity amounts to 15,070 tons. Of this about 13,500 tons are classed at Lloyds, and the remainder in the office of the "French Veritas." At Miramichi and northern ports the total tonnago now building is 6580, the whole of which is classed at Lloyd's. In the eastern section of the province, and in Albert county there are also a number of small vessels building, which will make the total tennage now in course of construction throughout the province about 30,000 tons.

The St. Stephen Branch Railway was opened through to the St. Andrew's line on Wednesday, Jan. 2nd.

FLOUR.-Receipts continue liberal, and with a restricted consumptive demand, stocks go on accumulating, making an increase of rather over 5000 bbls. during the opening half of January. The higher grades have almost run out of stock, and the small sales made are at high and irregular prices. Little variation in the prices of Superfine can be noted, as those hitherto buying on speculation have continued to absorb a large proportion of the receipts, the balance being needed for local use. Competition has however abated in some measure, and an easier feeling was manifested toward the close. In the lower grades little has been done, and rates quoted are mostly nominal, latterly however, these grades have been more inquired after, and a better demand is now looked for. Bag Flour.—The supply from all sources has been fair and prices have been barely maintained, \$3.55 being now the extreme figure for best samples.

OATMEAL .-- A fair demand continues, and all desirable samples sell freely at about \$5.

WHEAT .- There is little offered in the hands of agents, the receipts being mostly direct to millers. There has been less enquiry latterly, and quotations are obtained with difficulty.

PEAS—Sell as offered at from 80c. to 82c. per 60 lbs., or about 90c. per 66 lbs., and same rates are offered for future delivery.

OATS-A few cars are daily selling, mostly at 82c. from car or store. The demand is good, and prices likely to be well sustained.

PORK.—The demand is entirely nominal, and in anticipation of lower prices, dealers prefer awaiting the actual and pressing requirements of their trade to buying a single barrel ahead—the local demand is supplied by hogs in the carcass, which come in at lower prices than holders would be willing to sell packed pork for. Dressed Hogs-Arrivals during the veek have been largely in excess of the capabilities of this market either for consumption or packing. Prices consequently continue to decline, and sales even, of choice heavy weights are difficult to effect: most of the packers have partly from necessity retired from the market as the packing houses are fully stocked with work for several weeks yet to come. It seems likely therefore that prices will remain during the remainder of the season at a lower point than have been lately ruling.

BUTTER-Presents no new feature to vary the reiterated accounts of duliness both here and in all the other markets of the world-no outlet at present appears to offer itself, and holders have no resource but to continue holding until some purchaser comes forward to clear the market. Stocks are not heavy, receipts having been light for some time past, and several parcels continuing to be shipped to Britain on Upper Canada account; so that a moderate export demand would now absorb all the stock on hand.

Ashes.-Pots have fluctuated violently during the week, rising or falling day by day according to the presence or absence of speculators, the whole of the stock is now in their hands, and prices depend in a very great measure on their ideas of probable value and demand. Pearls quiet and unchanged.

OMMISSION MERCHANTS. 448 Commissioners Street, Montreal, are regu larly receiving and selling on Commission all kinds of country produce-such as Flour, Grain, Butter, Cheese, Pork, Pot and Pearl Ashes, Leather, Wool, Clover, and Timothy and Flax Seeds; also purchasing on country account, Dry Goods, Groceries, Hardware, and General Merchandise.

FLOUR.—We have heard of no large sales during the week. The Market is steady, and holders feel a confidence that prices will not be lower for some time.

BUTTER.-The Market is very bare of the finer qualities, which would readily sell for 16c to 17c per pound in silver for local trade. We might state that owing to our being situated in the principal thoroughfare of the city for the provision trade, and having command of a large local business, we are always enabled to work off to good advantage any choice lots that arrive,

We have heard of sales being made of inferior and medium as low as 11c to 12c per pound. We, as yet, returned no sales as low as the above. We might refer to a custom which is very prevalent and very injurious to the trade—to none more so than country merchants themselves;-that is, of sending their butter to parties not engaged in the trade. It is not an unusual occurrence to have a representative from a Dry Goods, Grocery, Hardware, and Boot and Shoe establishments trying to effect sales of, or asking what we would give for a lot of butter-all in one day! Now we can assure our friends in the country that none of our regular traders are likely to pay within one to two cents a pound of what they would otherwise pay if they were buying from those in the trade. It is always observed when the regular buyers cease going through the country, very often on account of the high prices asked-higher than any market they could send it to would warrant them in paying—that it is sent, as we already referred to into so many different hands, that the price cannot be maintained as it otherwise would, if it was kept within the limits of the trade. We would advise parties holding good parcels to send early to market.

DRESSED Hogs.-The arrivals are large, and, with a full Market, prices have somewhat given way. \$5.40 to \$5.60 per 100 lbs. are the nominal quotations for the past few days. Prices are likely to be still lower here. If a thaw should set in soon, which is very likely, prices will materially decline.

CLOVER SEED-Is not likely to prove so short in supply as was once anticipated from the unfavourable season, there is as yet but little coming forward. Hence there is no established price fixed. 10c per lb. would be about the outside figure good quality would bring at present.

ASHES-Per 100 lbs.-Pots are lower. Firsts sold at \$6.22\frac{1}{2}\$ and \$6.15; \$6.00 to \$6.07 offered at the close. Seconds, nominal \$4.75 to \$4.80 nett. Thirds, \$3.95 to \$4.00 nett. Pearls \$7.10 to \$7.15.

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
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
