The Daily News will to-morrow publish a despatch from Salonica confirming the re-port of the unseasing military preparations that are being made by the Turks. The officials in Salonica, Macedonia and Kass-andra are selzing for the use of the army all the horses and mules belonging to the Christians in these places. They have re-ceived orders from Constantinople to col-lect next year's taxes in advance.
