PIGS IN QUARANTINE Hog Cholera Symptoms in Carleton County-Experts Are In-

vestigating. Ottawa, Sept. 10.-Dr. A. E. James, Dom Ottawa, Sept. 10.—Dr. A. E. James, Dominion Veterinary Inspector, has placed five piggeries in Carleton County under quarantine, as there is very strong evidence that hogs in all of them are affected by hog cholera. Inspector Hornidge of the city markets discovered four hogs on the market some days ago, and suspecting they were diseased took steps to have the matter investigated. That his suspicions were correct is evidenced by the fact that two of the hogs have since died. Dr. James inspected the piggeries, which he has since quarantined, and found symptoms that made him believe the animals were affected by genuine hog cholera. On Thursday he had Professor Baker of McGill University come to Ottawa, and with the Professor the made to Ottawa, and with the Professor he made a careful examination of one of the hogs a careful examination of one of the loss which was slaughtered. The professor was satisfied that the case was one of hog cholera, but to remove all possibility of doubt, it was decided to have an examination made by a bacteriologist. This examination is now being made at McGill University, Montreal. The piggeries quarantined contain from 5 to 20 hogs each.
