**BALFOUR SCORES ROSEBERY**  
Latter's Plan to Make Kitchener Minister of War Characterized as a Wild One.

**CO-OPERATION FOR WORLD'S PEACE**  
Britain's Hand Was Forced in the Venezuelan Affair Now Happily Ending.

Liverpool, Feb. 13.—Premier Balfour, in the course of a speech at a luncheon, given by the Conservative Club here to-day, declared the British government had no choice but to take action against Venezuela. The Ministers had shown no intention of agreeing for money and no humanity. The United States government had taken into the confidence of His Majesty's government at every stage of the proceedings. The Monroe Doctrine had no enemies in this country. It would be a great gain to civilization if the United States should more actively concern itself with arrangements to prevent the constantly recurring difficulties between the European powers and the South American governments by getting the latter to observe the principles of international courtesy.

**A Mare's Nest.**  
Continuing, the Premier said there was no ground for Lord Rosebery's criticism in respect to British relations with either the United States or Germany. Some arrangement with the latter for joint operations was the most reasonable step possible for enforcing their several claims. Mr. Balfour ridiculed the suggestion of assistance with Germany over Venezuela which was set at the time of Emperor William's visit to King Edward at Sandringham. He declared that the whole story was a mare's nest. International animosities, said the Premier, were a great source of international weakness. Great Britain was supposed to be greatly disliked on the continent, but no country was stronger for delinking Great Britain or showing animosity, nor would Great Britain be strengthened by harboring animosity. If the peace of Europe were to be preserved, and the cause of civilization go forward without fatal shocks, it must be by the increasing use of co-operation between the European powers. The Balkan States are now giving anxiety, and the question can only be solved by common action upon the part of the great civilized nations. European concert is clumsy, he said, but it is better than isolated action. Mr. Balfour hinted that all those who had any command over the source of public opinion to refrain from indulging in the easy game of comparing relations between nations, and creating jealousies, so easily formed and so difficult to undo.

**A Wild Scheme.**  
Referring to Lord Rosebery's proposal that Gen. Lord Kitchener should be invited to leave his post in India, and become War Minister, Mr. Balfour characterized it as the wildest which had ever been suggested. A man who had held and who doubtless was destined to again hold great administrative positions, and who could understand that Lord Rosebery's sole plan was to attain efficiency, but his suggestion was both opposed to the British constitution and absolutely impracticable. Lord Kitchener was a great soldier, but he was not trained for the work of a Cabinet Minister, who was required to defend the proposals of his government in parliament.

**Peace in Sight.**  
Speaking at a luncheon here this evening, Mr. Balfour announced that he had received a communication from Foreign Secretary Lloyd George, in which all the difficulties regarding the Venezuelan question had been removed, and that he had no objection to delay the final settlement any time.

**VENEZUELLA BLOCKADE RAISED**  
PROTOCOLS OF POWERS SIGNED

Washington, Feb. 13.—Herbert W. Bowen, Venezuela's representative in the Venezuelan peace negotiations at Washington tonight signed with each of the allied representatives here a protocol providing for the immediate raising of the Venezuelan blockade, and for the reference of the question of preferential treatment of the claims of the allies against Venezuela to The Hague Arbitration Tribunal. The final formalities occurred at the British Embassy. At 11:30 o'clock tonight Herbert Dering, First Secretary of the British Embassy, announced to the Associated Press that the British protocol had just been signed, and that the signature of the Italian and German protocols would follow in the order named.

**FIGHT WILL BE TO A FINISH**  
Subscribers to Markham-Pickering Independent Telephone Company Will Go to Law.

**BELL CO. WILLING TO SURRENDER**  
But a Large Issue Has Arisen and It Will Be Tested in the Courts.

Leicester Hill, Feb. 13.—(Special)—Considerable excitement has prevailed throughout this district all day concerning the development in the farmers' fight against the Bell Telephone. The publication in The World of the section of the Criminal Code which is violated by the exclusive contract of the railroads with the Bell Company, among provoked a serious comment. The opinion was generally expressed that if the law was so very clear it should be invoked at once for the purpose of abolishing the odious contract. To this end a number of the subscribers of the Markham and Pickering Independent Telephone Company met and decided to begin a criminal action Monday, based on the provision of the criminal code pointed out. The complaint will be filed with an adjournment of the action, the people of this section insist, will be backed by public sentiment as well as by the law.

**CHALLENGE NOT ACCEPTED.**  
This challenge for a square trial of the case was not accepted by the Bell, however, for Mr. Stringer hurried to Toronto with his report and returned to this part of the county again tonight. Unofficially, it is announced that Mr. Stringer now has authority from the Bell Company to offer the independent line here access to the Leicester Hill station of the C.P.R., as well as the connection with the Bell lines at Markham. He is expected to make these terms known to the subscribers here to-morrow. It is known absolutely that the Bell company has agreed upon by the Bell, and it is believed to have been the conclusion rather hurriedly arrived at by the Bell company in The World of the criminal feature of the case.

**Not Doing Business.**  
They are anxious to get a connection with the station here, and will put their phone in within an hour after permission comes from Sir Thomas Strickland, but they are not doing business with the Bell. They repudiate the right of the Bell Company to say on what terms the new wires may run into the depot here. In fact, the members of the Co-operative Company assert positively that they will not prosecute the case to please the Bell, even if the C.P.R. grants them the use of the depot.

The authorities of the C.P.R. had left the impression up to that time that they were not to be welcomed here by the railroad people, since it was clearly a great convenience to have a source of revenue in the form of a telephone line...

IS RESPONSIBLE GOVERNMENT AT AN END? ...There is something ominous in the formation of a union of municipalities for the protection of municipal and public rights. The union is prompted by the best of motives, but the more necessary it is, the worse is the situation with which we have to deal.

Again, also a community may pay taxes for police and fire protection, it must not leave these duties to the authorities. Volunteer fire brigades and vigilance committees must be organized. Lynch law must take the place of the neglected law of the land.

Are things to be allowed to drift in this way until we arrive at lynch law and anarchy, or is responsible government to be restored while we still have its form and semblance to guide us? We regard responsible government, not as a mere catchword, but as the name of a sound principle, guaranteeing efficient administration and strong safeguards for the rights of the public.

The principle of responsibility applies to the dominant party as well as to the Ministers. In fact, responsibility is the salt of partyism, without which it speedily becomes rotten and offensive. A party under our system is armed with great power. It controls legislation, it controls administration by its power of setting up and pulling down administrations.

CITY'S FIGHT MUST GO ON. Toronto is heart and soul in the movement that aims at common action on the part of Ontario municipalities to obtain power to generate and distribute Niagara Falls power. Corporate influence is so strong in the government and in the legislature that the municipalities must act together if they are to make their influence felt.

EDUCATIONAL IDEALS. Among all the educational and other ideals that are now being floated, we hear very little of one—the gospel of good, honest and hard work. We hear that in this country too much attention is paid to the material and commercial side of education to the neglect of higher things.

London Report: It is all very well for Lord Strathcona to urge the contrary, but an analysis of Canadian imports during the fiscal year which ended in June, 1902, shows how the Canadian tariff, also reduced in our favor by one-third, operates to the great disadvantage of the manufacturer, of which our exports almost entirely consist, were heavily taxed to protect Canadian industry.

It will be seen that while our exports of dutiable goods to Canada were more than half of those of the United States, our exports under the free list were only one-fourth as great. In other words, the Canadian tariff favors the class of goods which the United States produces in abundance.

That is a small part of their true function. The greater and more important part is the administration of the public domain—a term including not merely the land and its wealth, but all natural powers and potentialities—in the interests of the many instead of the few. This is not state socialism, nor single tax, nor any other fid. GOVERNMENT OWNERSHIP. Markham Economist: It seems to us the only way to effectually put a stop to the Bell Telephone monopoly of the government is to take over and run the telephone lines themselves. The telegraph and telephone lines should be owned and operated by the Dominion government in conjunction with the postoffice. The Problem of the Age is Power. Not the kind of power that Napoleon longed for, sought for, and fought for. But power to revolve the wheels of commerce, to run the street cars, to rush the trains to lift the elevators of the land and make our factories busy. How much for how little. That's the problem in these days of sharp profits and quick returns. Speaking of the prominent position power plays in the commerce of the nation, it is well to note that Toronto and Montreal capitalists are going to spend \$7,000,000 in bringing it from the Falls. The three companies doing business there will generate 770,000 horse-power if necessary. This means much to the manufacturer. In this connection it is interesting to note the visit to Toronto of Mr. E. R. Simpson, mechanical engineer for the Chapman Double Ball Bearing Company. Mr. Simpson's home is in Boston and his visit to Canada is significant. He is on his way to the East with the completed plans for the fitting out of the Intercolonial train with the Chapman Double Ball Bearing. The Intercolonial Railroad is a government road, and realizing the need for the conservation of power, the Minister of Railways ordered that the train be fitted up. This will be the first train in the world to run on the Chapman Double Ball Bearing. It is the forerunner, as it were, of the day when they will all use the bearing. When this I. C. R. train runs it will glide like a feather on rollers. A street car which has run on the outskirts of Boston for two years, equipped with these bearings, shows a saving of 60 per cent. in power with no wear on the journals. They have also been in use on shafting in factories, wagons, buggies, automobiles, motors, steam turbines, showing wonderful results. The power problem is a great one, but can be solved by the use of this bearing, which by its application will increase the power of the country in its various lines from 30 per cent. to 50 per cent. Soe Mills to Open. Montreal, Feb. 13.—The Montreal representatives of the Clergue syndicate stated to-day that the mill at the "Soe" will re-open just as soon as the blowing engines are received.

TO BE CHILDLESS A CRIME.

Selfish Persons Denounced by President Roosevelt in a Letter.

New York, Feb. 13.—President Roosevelt again has sounded the tocsin as to the peril of the nation from childless marriages and from celibacy. He reiterates the protest of the authors of "The Woman Who Tolls" that love of luxury and frivolity is exhausting the vitality of the race. The book will be published on Saturday by a New York house, the authors being Mrs. John Van Vorst and Miss Marie Van Vorst, who temporarily became factory girls to get their message.

ROOSEVELT SEES RACE SUICIDE.

Mr. Roosevelt, after reading the third chapter, wrote the following letter, which is used as a preface: "White House, Washington, D.C., Oct. 18, 1902.—Dear Mrs. Van Vorst: I must write you a line to say how much I have appreciated your article, 'The Woman Who Tolls.' But to me there is a most redundant side to it when you touch upon what is fundamentally infinitely more important than any other question in this country—that is, the question of race suicide, complete or partial.

"An easy, good natured kindness and a desire to be independent—that is, to live one's life purely according to one's own desires—are in no sense substitutes for the fundamental virtues for the practice of the strong racial qualities without which there can be no strong race—the qualities of courage and resolution in both men and women, of scorn of what is mean, base and selfish, of eager desire to work, to fight, or suffer, as the case may be, provided the end to be attained is great enough, and the contemptuous putting aside of mere ease, mere rapid pleasure, mere avoidance of toil and worry.

ONLY THINGS WORTH HAVING.

"I do not know whether I must pity or most despise the foolish and selfish man or woman who does not understand that the only things really worth having in life are those the acquirement of which normally means cost and effort. If a man or woman, thru no fault of his or hers, goes thru life denied those highest of all joys which spring only from home life, from the having and bringing up of many healthy children, I feel for them deep and respectful sympathy—the sympathy one extends to the gallant fellow killed at the beginning of the campaign, or the man who toils hard and is brought to ruin by the fault of others.

"But the man or woman who deliberately avoids marriage and has a heart so cold as to know no passion, and a brain so shallow and selfish as to dislike having children, is in effect a criminal against the race and should be an object of contemptuous adherence by all healthy people. "There is no physical trouble among us Americans. The trouble with the situation you set forth is one of character, and therefore we can conquer it if we only will. Very sincerely yours, "Theodore Roosevelt."

AMATEUR DESPERADOS.

Two Sent to Central Prison for Eighteen Months.

Amateur desperados had better beware. Two men of this class, D'Arcy Fahy and Martin Judge, appeared in the Police Court yesterday, and will spend the next eighteen months of their lives behind the bars at the Central Prison. It will be remembered that a couple of Saturdays ago, two Chinese laundries were "hold up" at the point of a revolver and small sums of money taken. Fahy and Judge were arrested as the guilty parties, and yesterday Gee Lee and Hong Chong, the Celestials concerned, told their stories. Several witnesses of the occurrence at Hong Chong's place gave positive identification, and Magistrate Denison observed that had there been previous convictions against the men they would have been given a five-year term. He put them in the same class with the "Dalton Imitators" who stirred the city up a few years ago. Ben Cohen and Chas. Lewis, alleged theft of street car fare boxes, were remanded until the 20th. James Dyke admitted stealing a quantity of tobacco and will do 30 days. Catherine Fletcher and Elizabeth Brown are said to have committed severe assault upon John Craig. They will appear next Friday.

WANTED IN ST. THOMAS.

St. Thomas, Feb. 13.—A man called George A. Taylor is wanted by the police. He acted as quarantine officer at the Columbia Hotel, stole an overcoat, secured loans and left the city.

Russell Sage on Trusts.

New York, Feb. 13.—In a conversation the subject of anti-trust legislation Russell Sage is quoted as saying: "The trust proposition has not reached a stage where the people have presented themselves plainly, and in a definite form. Legislation at this time will only work harmful results, for no one can put his finger on the danger spots."

Want of Men.

Every day new witnesses are found to testify to the dearth of labor. Aubrey White, Deputy Commissioner of Crown Lands, is in receipt of a letter stating that the output of logs in the Rainy River district is being hampered by want of men. Forty-five dollars a month is being offered.

Senate Opened With Prayer.

Washington, Feb. 13.—General William Booth of the Salvation Army delivered the prayer at the opening of to-day's session of the Senate.

BROKE UP ONE LABOR UNION

Woodworkers Complain That Piano Polishers Withdrew and Committee Will Investigate.

ALDERMEN TO BE KEPT IN LINE.

Trades Council Object to Power Being Given Fire Chief to Break Up any Union.

Almost an hour was spent Thursday night at the meeting of the District Trades and Labor Council, discussing the advisability of investigating the troubles between the Piano Polishers and the Woodworkers. The piano polishers belonged to the Woodworkers' Union until they felt that as a separate industry they should have a separate union. The formation of the piano polishers' union took away from the woodworkers a large membership, and these latter last night demanded the appointment of a committee to investigate the methods pursued in breaking up their union. The following were appointed on the committee: Messrs. Douglas, Armstrong, March, Robert Glicking and John Tweed.

The Trades Council advised in its report that other quarters be sought for the place of meeting. Vice-president Simpson objected to smoking during the meetings, as it prevented the attendance of lady delegates, and henceforth smoking will be done outside the Council room. The Organization Committee reported on the Firemen's Union and protested against the same being given to the Chief, or to any person, to close up a union. It was recommended that the firemen be voted into the power should be kept in line. President Cox remarked that some people played in the boxes. He thought Chief Thompson was playing to the pit and boxes.

A letter from the Cutlers' and Trimmers' Union was read, asking for moral support, and the purchase by union men of blue label goods. Several delegates thought the strikers should have notified the Council of their intention before striking. A motion to give \$10 to the Single Tax Association for Sunday afternoon lectures was lost by the president's casting vote. The Marble Workers' Union last night, for Sunday afternoon lectures, President W. Davy; vice-president, A. Bailey; recording secretary, C. Burton; financial secretary, F. Poles; treasurer, J. Crockett; Tyler, R. Bradley; delegates to District Trades and Labor Council, Messrs. Bailey, Fraser, Woodhouse; delegates to Building Trades Council, Messrs. Davy, McMartin and McIntyre. The Tobacco Workers' Local Union are about to start an active label agitation thru the city. Charles Lawler was appointed label agitator and organizer for Canada at the meeting last night, and he will start immediately to carry out a campaign thru Ontario and Quebec. Four candidates were nominated.

DUNLOP IN RENEW.

Chosen to Contest the By-election for the Conservatives.

Pembroke, Feb. 13.—A large gathering of Conservatives of North Renfrew assembled here today for the purpose of selecting a candidate to contest the riding in the interest of the party. Edward A. Dunlop, of the firm of Dunlop & Co., hardware merchant of Pembroke, was the unanimous choice of the convention. Lengthy addresses were made by the Hon. Charles Lawler, Whitney of Merisburg, Col. Matheson, Hon. Peter White, Sr., Peter White, Jr., George Smith, Conservative organizer, Mattawa, and others. The following officers were elected: President, Gildon Dalbey; vice-presidents, Stuart, Samuel Sunstrum; secretary, H. W. Parrett.

Saw Inspector of Hospitals.

Ambrose Kent yesterday led a deputation to see Dr. Chamberlain, Inspector of Hospitals, to refute statements made by a man named Elliott about the Home for Incurables. The charge was made that the food supplied was of poor quality, and that the management of the institution was inefficient. The charges were shown to be without foundation. At present there are 132 inmates, of whom more than half are bedridden. During the past year the Board of Management has had to draw on capital account, the revenue being insufficient for running expenses.
