Shanhaikwan, May 13.—The main force of the Japanese army is said to be concentrated near Port Arthur with siege guns, and their intention is believed to be to attempt a repetition of the strategy of the naval and military forces of the United States before Santiago, and to drive the Russian fleet out to battle.
