London, July 28.—The Macedonian question was raised in the House of Commons last night. Sir Edward Grey, Secretary of Foreign Affairs, said that the situation had changed suddenly and greatly in the last few days, if Turkey herself was going to improve the whole Government and the country to benefit Mussulmans and Christians alike. It was better, he said, that the Macedonian question should thus be settled by the Turks themselves than that partial reforms should be pressed upon reluctant and obstructive authorities.

"We ought for the present," added the secretary, "to preserve an expectant and sympathetic attitude toward these changes."

He deprecated the idea of intervention in Persia unless the Persian subjects became threatening.

Sir Edward took occasion to repudiate the idea that Great Britan must be fore to make agreements like those free to make agreements like those with Russia and France, in order to remove the causes of friction, such policy implied no emnity toward other powers. The foreign secretary's reference to Germany, which was drawn out by a discreet speech by Sir Charles Dilke, was rather unexpected and was much canvassed afterwards in the lobbies, where it was regarded by many as intended to counteract the bad impression likely to be produced in Germany by Lord Croker's speech in the House last Monday, when he declared that it was the first duty of the government to prepare for the European conflict, which probably would be forced upon Great Britain before many years.

Sir,—An item in this morning's Telegraph speaks of the purchase of a property at Spruce Lake with a frontage of 1,500 feet on the lake. Is it not about time that our "Water Works Commissioners" should take some notice of the condition of things at Spruce Lake? They seem to have forgotten the fact that West St. John is supplied with water from Spruce Lake. A visit to the lake will show them a great many houses, bungalows, shanties, barns, stables, closets, built on the very margin of the lake, into which all the sewerage, offal and nuisance of the cattle and people are emptied. Surely the board of health might find something to say about the matter if the water commission remain indifferent. The people of Fairville and West St. John have some right to consideration and protection in the quality of the water they are compelled to drink, and to use. The city council should at once take active measures to prevent any other building going up, the sewerage of which could find its way into the lake, and also to buy out the rights of those already built there. The purchase by city of the "Steeves" property would have been a step in the right direction.




