London, May 21—Athens report that the town of Maidos on Gallipoli Peninsula has been captured by the allies, that the town of Dardanelles has been destroyed by the Anglo-French fleets, and that a large part of the town of Gallipoli has been wrecked by bombs from the allies' aviators.

London, May 21—Athens reports fierce fighting near the neck of the Gallipoli Peninsula. The big guns of the Queen Elizabeth are being fired from the Gulf of Saros, assisting in the allies' attack.

The Turks are being supported by the guns of the Sultan Selim, from the Sea of Marmora.

CERMANS IS CHECKED

Russians, Too, Have Crushed Left

Wing of Enemy and Exposed Army on San to Double Attack

London, May 21—The Times Petrograd correspondent telegraphs:—
"The victorious advance of the Austro-German army from the line of the Dunajec at length has been checked. The Rusian armies had fallen back to the defences of the San, and for ten miles to the north of Jaroslau the enemy

had forced their way to the western bank.

"Meanwhile the left wing of the invading army, operating to the north of the Upper Vistula, has been crushed by the Russians at Opatow and has exposed the Austro-German army on the San, to an attack from the north as well as from the east.





A THRILLING STORY

There are passages in some of the letters from soldiers at the front that stirt the pulse and make every Canadian feel something of the enthusiam and the fighting spirit of the splendid fellows who are making history and covering themselves with glory in the great struggle in Europe. Note this thrilling extract from a letter written by Private C. B. Forward, of the Canadian Scottish (16th Battalion) which lost thirty out of forty eight men in one battle in the battle of Langemarck:

A THRILLING STORY

There are passages in some of the letter comforts which are also hailed with delight by the men who are fighting our battles for us and shedding their blood for Home and Empire.





George Wilson Recovering, But Says **Germans Could Not Have Done** Much More to Him

A letter received by his mother, Mrs. Charles Wilson, of 26 St. Andrew street, from her son, George, serving with the 1st Royal Montreal Regiment in the first contingent told of his having received wounds in the battle of Ypres. "I am getting along fine, now," he said, "but I had five shrapnel wounds in the left arm besides a bullet through my right leg. 

Shocking Story of Berlin And Ruhleben Concentration

BRITISH NEARLY STARVED

Barvarous Punishment Meted Out For Slight Infractions of Rules -Some Prisoners Slain, Says a Prominent Londoner

One Bowl of Soup in 34 Hours.

"On Nov. 18," he said, "some dozens of us were marched through the town to the railroad station and sent to Berlin, a journey of about thirty-four hours. We had only one bowl of soup each on the way. Attempts to buy food on the platforms of the stations were insolently repressed. Throughout the journey we were insulted by soldiers.

"On Nov. 15 we arrived at the Ploetzensee jail in Berlin, after marching through a drizzling rain from the Charlottenberg station. The exhaustion caused by this journey and the bad conditions, together with a lack of food, undoubtedly caused the death of Morrison Cleator, acting consul general at Mannheim."



Germany must gain its revival from its exports. It must produce for other nations and pay its debts in manufactured products. The "Made in Germany" label is not popular in Canada at the present time. How long will that sentiment last? What is the usual course in analogous cases?

A brutal criminal is not popular. He might be in danger of lynch law were indigment citizens able to lay hands on him. After his trial and conviction, however, our tenderly sympathetic people send comforts and luxuries to his cell and sign petitions for a commutation of his sentence, while the less emotional members of the community simply forget. This kindly human spirit that occasionaly is misdirected denotes a tendency that it is well to note.

A favorite trick of some salemen is to insult a prospective customer and then abjectly ask his pardon. In the fulness of his forgiveness, and to demonstrate that there is no ill-will, the unsuspect-

ing prospect signs the dotted line on the order blank. 'Made in Germany' will not continue to be unpopular. The danger is that it may become too popular; that our sympathy for

the "poor Germans" may affect our better judgment and our sense of justice towards the Canadian manufacturers, who have been ever true and faithful to British interests.

It is well to face frankly the peculiarities of popular sentiment. In fact, it is essential that this should be done by those who depend upon public approval for the sale of their goods. It requires only a slight knowledge of human nature to anticipate the indifference that will follow the present outburst of patriotic fervor.

Now is the time, when imports are discontinued, to get the Canadian people to acquire the habit of asking for Canadian brands; not because they are Canadian, but because the goods are right and the prices fair. Undue emphasis on the Canadian-made feature is apt to be ephemeral in its appeal. The present passionate patriotism is too intense to be abiding; but an acquired habit is more than second nature—it IS nature. On the other hand, when the Empire is no longer in danger we will return to our old thoughtless ways. We will resume our criticisms of the tariff. We will do our best as individuals to buy in the cheapest market and sell in the dearest.

Now is the time to prepare and to give Canadian business an impetus that will carry it through the period of reaction, and overcome the sentimentalism of newly-awakened sympathies. A brand thoroughly established in public esteem on its merits and by its publicity is proof against the ebb and flow of the tide of impulsiveness or the stagnation of indifference.

Now is the time to entrench a business against the possibility of successful assault. Now is the time to prepare for more war, a war of aggressive competition, that will be quite as vital to our commercial interests as is the clash of arms in Europe.



HON. H. A. MCKEOWN IN ADDRESS TO CREDIT

How modern commerce depends for its firm credit system on old English its firm credit system on old English statutes going back to the times of Charles II. and Queen Elizabeth and to the decisions of judges rather than direct legislation, was shown by His Honor Judge McKeown in an address before the maritime division of the Canadian Cerditmen's Association last night. He took the stand that all trade and business today was based on credit and showed how the Babylonian clay tablets in the British Museum proved that the whole system of legal forms for trade existed then in a highly developed state. In the legislative records were many articles of beauty to the trained eye that exactly carried out to perfection the objects for which they were created. language was spoken. It formed the basis of dominion and provincial commercial law as well as the laws of the United States.

"This is the blossom and the flower of the intellect of man in commercial iaw," declared the judge. Then there was the Statute of Elizabeth's time, so well known that it had no other name. Those two statutes lay like the sills of a house unseen but built on and forming the very foundation of the super-structure of business law.

Judge McKeown then went on to show how all the great volume of what was known as common law was unwritten but was the sum of all the good sense of business in the past. No one could define common law was unwritten but was not. He instanced the law of the stoppage of goods in transit in the case of a debtor bein— unsatisfactory. There was no written law on the matter but it was one of the fundamentals of Canadian law today. It had grown out of the ruling of judges in accordance with good sense and public opinion. Another point was that of the right of a workman to hold goods upon which he had worked until paid for them. That could not be found on the statutes of any land yet was well known and acted upon.

His honor's idea, he said, in the address was to show that while legislation of trade could not be made and it was the conditions of trade, credit especially, that made modern commerce so different from primitive barter.

"It is to the wise legislation and the stern sense of the judiciary of days gone by that we owe today the conditions under which commerce can flourish."







FAMOUS CHAMPION NOW A WAR



As the fly season is just about due, ttention is again called to the great im-ortance of ridding our communities of this filthy, death-dealing pest. It is now so well known that files are largely responsible for the dissemination of such diseases as tuberculosis, typhoid fever and infantile diarrhoea, that indifference to their presence in the home and neigh-borhood would seem to merit the verdic corhood would seem to merit the verdict of criminal negligence. While the trapping and swatting of flies is a useful and sane procedure, it must not be forgotten that the most rational way of attaining freedom from them is to prevent them from breeding. This is to be accomplished by destroying or properly screening their breeding places. It is particularly in manure garbage and decomposing refuse that flies breed, so particular attention should be given to the frequent and thorough emptying of all receptacles against the entrance of flies. Keep all stable manure in vault or pix screened, or sprinkled with lime, oil or other cheap preparations such as are

All refuse which tends in any way to fermentation, such as bedding straw, pa-per, waste and vegetable matter, should be disposed of or covered with lime or

If there is no dirt and filth there will be no flies.

See that your sewerage system is in good order; that it does not leak, is up-to-date, and not exposed to flies.

Pour kerosene into the drains.

Screen all windows and doors, especial-

Screen all windows and doors, especially in the kitchen and dining room.

Keep the files away from the sick, especially those il with contagious disease.
Kill every fly that strays into the sick room. His body is covered with disease germs.

Screen all food, whether in the house or exposed for sale.

Do not patronize grocery shops and markets that harbor and feed flies. Insist upon screens.




