QUESTION XII.—What are the arrangements for the examination of Candidates for the Ministry in the course of study?

INSTRUCTIONS TO EXAMINERS.

Resolved,—That the time allowed for a single paper in the Candidates course shall not exceed one hour.

N.B.—(1) Papers are to be marked according to an estimate of the value of the answers required; but the aggregate must reach 100, viz: 90 for matter, and 10 for writing, spelling, grammar and style.

(2) Questions are to be prepared in sections (excepting Greek); two questions in each section of equal value, only one of which shall be an-

swered, thus giving the probationer a choice of questions.

That each examiner mark the time required by his paper.

(4) Five copies of the questions shall be prepared by each examiner (one copy for each district) and sent to Rev. Jabez Hill, by the 31st of December, 1897.

(5) All subjects omitted by probationers, must be taken up before

ordination.

(6) All papers when examined shall be returned to the Secretary,

(7) That a report of marks received be given to each probationer or Rev. Jabez Hill. candidate, signed by the Secretary of Committee, which shall be regarded as a certificate of his standing.

(8) That two copies of the marks given by the examiner, shall be prepared and sent, one to the chairman of each district, and the other to

the Secretary of Examining Board.

(9) That the Secretary arrange centres wherever practicable for the examination of Candidates and Probationers; such examinations to commence on the first Monday in the month of May.

SPIRITUAL STATE REPORT.

It is especially gratifying to note that notwithstanding many discouraging circumstances and the ebb and flow of religious life, we are able to report an advance on nearly every line of our work. On our membership we report an increase, while our Sunday Schools, Epworth Leagues and Bands of Hope are still going forward.

Much attention has been given to the children on many of our Circuits and Missions, but your Committee is of the opinion that very much more might be done in this direction and would recommend that special and definite efforts be put forth to teach and train our children and young people in the truths and Holy Scriptures and the doctrines of the Methodist Church. Our Catechism should be in every school and our Sunday School Papers in every house. Our Band of Hope should be encouraged and our Epworth Leagues developed, while our Sabbath Schools should be more than ever encouraged and utilized.

We recommend that all our ministers pay special attention to the important work of visiting their people as often as possible. The visit of the minister, a few words of spiritual conversation, a portion of God's word read, a short earnest prayer cannot fail to be owned of God to the sanctification of the home life of our people. "Cast thy bread upon the waters and it shall be found after many days."

We reaffirm our conviction that wherever possible special conventions should be held for the promotion of Scripture holiness and for the edification of Christian believers in the truth as it is in Jesus.

SABBATH SCHOOL REPORT.

Your Committee are glad to be able to report very gratifying success in almost all departments of our Sunday School work. Two hundred and one schools have been in operation during the year being an increase of 17. We have a grand staff of 1562 officers and teachers being an increase of 101 and a grand total of 12,885 scholars, being an increase of 402. Our Sunday School workers have not laboured in vain and 757 scholars have united with the church during the year.

The committee note with regret however that 40 schools have not been kept open the whole year and would earnestly urge that wherever possible the schools be kept up during the winter months.

We regret that there is a considerable decrease in the number of Book Room periodicals taken by our Schools. We would urge upon our people the desirability of having all our schools supplied with the helps by our own Publishing House, and suggest that an effort be made to get our church papers, the Wesleyan or Christian Guardian into the houses of all our people, and recommend that someone in connection with each Sunday School be appointed to canvass for said papers.

We also recommend that efforts be made to get our church members old and young, to attend our Sunday Schools, and that they be formed into classes for the study of the word of God. We urge also that a quarterly service in connection with each Sunday School be held in the church whenever possible and also that teacher's meetings be held weekly for the study of the Lesson.

The Methodist Church has been hitherto, and we trust will always continue to be, in the vanguard of the fight in the cause of Temperance and we are pleased to be able to report that the year has been one of strenuous effort, and a forward move has been made in the direction of Total Prohibition of the sale of intoxicants. We are also thankful that in the matter of obtaining Signatures to the petition in favor of this question, our people came so nobly to the front.

I.—We recommend that every Minister in charge of a Circuit or Mission be urged to preach Temperance Sermons, and that the third Sunday in December be observed as Temperance Sunday, also that due notice be given our people of the same.

2.—This Committee deprecates the failure to obtain a plebiscite on the question of the Total Prohibition of the sale of intoxicating liquors, and would emphatically re-affirm the position that the traffic in strong drink cannot be legalized without sin on the part of Legislature and people.

3.—Believing that the use of Tobacco is injurious to the youth of our country, we recommend that an effort be made to secure the introduction of a bill, prohibiting the sale of tobacco in any form, such as cigars, cig-

arettes, etc., to youths under 17 years of age.

4.—That we regret the laxity of the authorities in many instances in dealing with offenders against the "Local Option Act" in those Districts where it is in force, and express the earnest desire of Conference, that the Magistrates of our land, faithfully and impartially, enforce all the provisions and penalties of this law.

5.—In view of the approaching elections we recommend our people to bear in mind the importance of Prohibition, and to use all proper means in securing the influence of Candidates in favor of a plebiscite on the Temperance question.

6.—We strongly recommend that lessons on the injurious effects of the use of alchohol and tobacco, be given in our Day Schools, and request our School Boards to give special attention to this matter.

7.—Recognizing the great influence of Women in Temperance Reforms, and the noble work being done by "The Woman's Christian Temperance Union," we would urge upon the women of our church the importance of banding together for the furtherance of the cause we all have so much at heart.

EPWORTH LEAGUE.

The Epworth League Committee beg to report an increase of 2 in the number of Senior Epworth Leagues, a decrease of 1 in Epworth League of Christian Endeavour; a decrease of 2 in Affiliated Young People's Societies and an increase of 1 in Junior Epworth Leagues; the total number of Societies being the same as last year.

As to membership, there has been an increase of 183 in Senior Epworth Leagues; a decrease of 128 in Epworth Leagues of Christian Endeavour; a decrease of 52 in Affiliated Young People's Societies; an increase of 50 in Junior Leagues and a general increase of 53.

The financial work of the Leagues shows \$304.26 raised for League purposes; \$21.58 for General Epworth League Board; \$11.09 for Supernumerary Fund and \$38.23 for all other purposes, making a grand total of

\$411.91 or an increase of \$254.72.

METHODIST COLLEGE-ST. JOHN'S.

Report of the Executive Board of Governors for the year ending June 30th, 1897.

In our review of the past year it will not be necessary to refer in detail to the result of the various examinations in which the college has participated as these have been already given and widely circulated in the "Collegian." It is however very gratifying to be able to state that the successful work of our students alluded to in last year's report has been maintained and even exceeded during the past year.

In the London Matriculation out of eight who took this examination seven were successful; in the Associate Grade (C. of H. Education) we sent forward seven, all of whom passed creditably; and in the Senior Grade we had thirty passes out of thirty-four. This is a better showing than that of any other institution and proves beyond question that the Methodist College continues to lead in the Higher Education of this country. Mr. Holloway and Miss Allison and their assistants are to be congratulated on this very satisfactory result of their arduous labors. The Principal says: "All our successful London undergraduates are either continuing their studies at London Universities or doing useful work in this island.

Some changes have occurred in the staff of teachers. Mr. Hillyard has taken the place vacated by Mr. W. Cowperthwaite; Miss Badcock has succeeded Miss Barnes in charge of the Primary Department, and Misses Tuck and Dove have charge of the Kindergarten and are doing good work

The Laboratory has been made more practical and is become of much importance to the country in general. A superior X Ray has been added by the kindness of Mr. Pitts and other friends.

The Ladies' College Aid Society has given very substantial aid in levelling and improving the play ground in front of the college; in employing a drill-master and in purchasing appliances for the Gymnasium, thus enabling the physical part of our educational system to receive more attention than at any previous time. The Society has also effected an improvement in the sanitary arrangements of the hall.

The total number of pupils on the roll is about 300.

The Collegian has somewhat widened its scope so as to help outport teachers more. It supplies all educational information as quickly as possible and by advice, examination papers, etc., tries to keep those teachers who are in remote parts of the island up to date.

The Home continues to flourish under the management of the Rev. Mark Fenwick. The average number of boarders has been as follows:—One teacher. Twelve pupil teachers. Ten minister's children. Others twenty-one. Total forty-four. There has been only one case of contagious sickness during the year. Mr. Fenwick in his report compliments the boarders upon their general decorum and attention to the discipline of the Home, and for the honers won by them in the senior examinations,

The Treasurer reports an expenditure for the year of \$9,216.21 and a revenue of \$9,376.61 leaving a balance of \$160.00 to credit of current account. The Debt as reported last year was \$46,675.47, it now amounts to \$47,507.28 being an increase of \$831.81. This increase is chiefly in consequence of some balances of accounts not previously paid. The surplus earnings of the Home that have hitherto been applied to furnishing and improvements will in future go to the payment of interest, insurance and other expenses which up to this time have been charged to the general account and form a portion of our indebtedness. We may therefore reasonably expect that henceforth the ordinary earnings of the College and an earnest effort to obtain subscriptions will enable us to report an annual reduction of the debt.

The collection taken in the Sunday schools will be seen in the Minutes of Conference. We would respectfully urge upon our Ministers the need of a more general response to the appeal made to the Circuits and Sunday Schools on this behalf. Even where the amount subscribed is small, the effort to raise it brings the College before our people and awakens an interest in it that might not otherwise be felt.

In March last a memorial signed by the President and Secretary of the Conference, and by the members of this Executive, was forwarded to the executors of the late H. A. Massey of Toronto, in which the claims of this College and its great financial need were pointed out, with the prayer that these might be favorably considered by the executors in the apportionment of the residue of the Estate to educational institutions according to the terms of the will. The reply to this memorial as recorded in our Minutes inspires the hope that at some future time substantial aid may come to the College from this source. In bringing our case before the executors we are largely indebted to the kind offices of Dr. Potts whose visit to our shores will long be remembered by those who had the pleasure of meeting him or listening to his eloquent words. We have in him a valued friend and a powerful advocate of education. His presence here has been a stimulus to all engaged in this work and his help we feel assured will not be wanting whenever and wherever it may be in his power to advance the interests of our College work in Newfoundland.

The success given to our united efforts in the past has tended to ship. confirm yet more fully a conviction that we do not need to depart from the modes of working so long familiar to Methodism. The faithful preaching of Christ crucified; the universal offer of a free, full and present salvation through faith in His blood, still has its ancient and mighty power. He who was lifted up upon the cross for our sins, can still draw the hearts of men unto Himself; and it is the paramount duty, as it should be the supreme joy, of all who love the Lord Jesus, in sincerity, to cry "Behold! the Lamb."

We are glad also to report that our Sabbath Schools are answering their design as nurseries of the Church. We cannot commend too highly the patience and self-denying efforts of our noble army of Sabbath School Workers. Our Epworth Leagues are being more than ever appreciated by our young people as affording spheres of toil in which to serve Christ.

One young brother who left the old land last year to labour in this colony, after a few months of arduous, happy toil, has been called away from labour to reward. His ministry which opened with so much promise was quickly closed by Him to whom we all must give account. Two other young men, having completed an honourable probation, have been received into full connexion and ordained to the work of the Ministry.

It is with pleasure that we point to the steady progress along educational lines, in connection with our Day Schools and College. The results of the Higher Council Examinations, as well as the London University Matriculation Examination, give evidence that our young people are alive to their privileges and when opportunity is given, do credit to themselves and honour to the denomination to which they belong. Gratitude is due to God for having given us the services of Dr. Milligan, as Superintendent of Methodist Schools, to whose efforts the splendid advancement is largely due, and who for 22 years, with arduous and self-denying toil has laboured to promote the best interests of the Methodist youth of this Colony.

This year will be memorable throughout the world as being the Diamond Jubilee of our beloved Queen. Loyal Britons everywhere will live with each other in doing honour to the Queenliest of women. Not a whit behind any of them in loyal devotion to the throne are the Methodists of this most ancient colony, Newfoundland. Fund within at least ten years. We are thankful to see that this Fund has a powerful claim upon your liberality, which is recognized to some extent, though not as fully as it should be, and while we raise in this country the sum of about seven thousand dollars for missions, we receive from the Missionary Fund about double this amount. At the same time it should be kept in mind that your Ministers are receiving salaries that are less than half the amounts received by those filling subordinate positions in many of our business houses. We feel sure that we have but to bring to your notice that the giving up of that which is to say the least, an evil habit, the use of tobacco, to secure your abstinence from the use of it, so that a large portion of the amount now spent in this way may be devoted to Christian Missions or to the better support of your own missionaries and thus relieve the Fund of the large grants that are annually made to this Conference.

In this year you will also have an opportunity of exercising your privilege of voting for representatives to the House of Assembly. Let those for whom you vote be men of moral worth; do not follow blindly a party, but select men of principle, who will, if moral issues arise, leave

party rather than sacrifice principle.

The total prohibition of the sale, manufacture and importation of intoxicating liquor is still a live question; and in order that you may have the voice of the General Conference, the highest court of our church, on the matter, we quote the following from the Journal: "The candidate of no political party who refuses to commit himself publicly to the destruction of the liquor traffic at the earliest possible moment, should have the support of christian electors." (p. 101.)

The following declaration of principles was also adopted by the Conference:

1st. "That the liquor traffic cannot be legalized without sin."

2nd. "That it is the duty of the civil government to prohibit the trade in intoxicating drinks." (p. 296.)

Questions relating to Sabbath observance will need to be asked and pledges given relating thereto. Since the government has secured control of the railway from St. John's to Harbor Grace it should be easy to prohibit the running of Sunday trains. The Methodist Church has ever been in the van of all reforms looking towards the spread of that "right-eousness that exalteth nations" and cannot afford on these questions to be silent.

And now, beloved suffer the word of exhortation. Study to live by faith upon the Son of God. Be sure to have evidences clear for eternity, and watch against everything that has a tendency to cloud the same. Walk in love: study to maintain the faith of the love of God, as it shines forth brightly in Christ Jesus, and this will beget love to God, and to all that belong to Him. Endeavour to adorn the doctrine of God in all things—to be a honour to the profession you have made. Press more and more after a life of communion with God through the Son and by the

Spirit; and after more of conformity to His holy law and image both in heart and life.

The most efficient support which members of the Church can give to her advancement is by their own personal religion. This is literally manifesting the tree by its fruit, and is an epistle of Christ to be read of all men. If, therefore, you truly desire the prosperity of the Church, labour, and strive, and pray, that you may imbibe the spirit of her

doctrines, and that you may manifest the purity of her discipline.

We would urge you to a full surrender of yourselves to Christ, and we would none the less urge it upon ourselves "that we may be filled with the fullness of God." Mr. Wesley speaking of the grand doctrine of christian perfection says: "It is the grand depositum which God has given to the people called Methodists and chiefly to propagate this it appears God raised them up; their mission was to spread holiness over the land." This is the mission of Methodism in this land; and inasmuch as every member, every leader, every Sabbath school teacher, and every minister, seeks, and obtains the possession and enjoyment of the blessing of "perfect love" will true revival times be experienced and Zion flourish. "Christ also loved the Church and gave himself for it; that He might sanctify and cleanse it with the washing of water by the word; that He might present it to Himself a glorious Church, not having spot or wrinkle or any such thing; but that it should be holy and without blemish."

We would also urge upon you the paramount importance of Family The influences of the Family Altar are in many instances among the most precious associations of youth and childhood; and many a servant entering a godly home has received deep and lasting impressions in the sacred ordinance of domestic worship. "The promise is unto you and to your children"-dedicate them to the Lord in baptism, and lead them to Him daily at the Throne of Grace. Take care, that you are remembered when your day of opportunity has ended, as persons, who like Abraham of old, commanded their households after them that they keep the charge of the Lord.

Never neglect private prayer. Have some spot consecrated to the worship of God. Have set times for it, with which nothing must be allowed to interfere. You can do nothing well, without God's blessing, and you cannot expect His blessing without asking for it. Everything will go wrong when you begin the day without prayer: and if you come to neglect it altogether, soon your feet will be caught in the "snare of the fowler." As ministers it has been our custom in Conference, to pledge ourselves, to each other in prayer, at noon on every Friday, and to this fellowship, we cordially invite you, that the Lord of Hosts may "make His face to shine upon us," and that through us "His saving health may be known to all nations."

Prize highly the social means of grace, such as the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper. "This do," said Christ, "in remembrance of me." least by your regular attendance thereon. Hold to the Class Meeting: Be not among those who think it unfashionable to meet in class, for as a true means of grace: as a channel through which Christian character is developed when rightly used, the Class Meeting cannot be surpassed.

Cultivate a love for and study of the word of God. Read good books, but do not forget the best of all books. There is more true philosophy in the Bible than in every work of every sceptic that ever wrote. Read therefore God's Word as though you heard Him speak to you in the sacred page. Test your views of truth by the Bible. Strive to "be sound in the faith." Inquire what are your views of sin, of man's responsibility, of the justice of God's government in punishing rebellion, of the Deity of Christ, and of the Holy Ghost, of the atonement, of the doctrine of justification by faith, of the spiritual life in Christ Jesus, and test these views by the Bible.

It will also be your duty to provide reading matter for your family. This is a reading age: Our young people will read, it is therefore incumbent upon the parents to provide good wholesome literature for family use, as much their duty to do this as to provide clothes and food. This is an easy thing to do in these days, owing to the multiplication of books, magazines and papers. As a family newspaper suitable for Sunday reading as well as the spare moments of the week, our own Christian Guardian, published at \$1 a year stands second to none. In addition to this we have the Wesleyan, and the Methodist Monthly Greeting which is welcomed by so many Methodist families, and should certainly be in every Methodist family in the Colony, for it is published at a price of 40 cents a year that should be within the reach of all.

Then we have the *Methodist Magazine* and other publications from our own Book Rooms such as *Onward*, *Sunbeam* and *Happy Days*, all containing good wholesome literature that is calculated to instruct, and build up and to be antidote to much that is trashy and poisonous.

In turning to face the duties of another connexional year we are admonished to "work while it is day." "Whatever thy hand findeth to do, do it with thy might, for there is no work, nor device, nor knowledge, nor wisdom in the grave, whither thou goest." Relief from many doubts, solace under many anxities, strength and support under many sorrows, will be found in working for Christ, as many of you, we trust, can already joyfully testify. But alas! how many talents lie buried within our borders, some of them are very precious and sorely needed, but they lie buried from year to year. Brethren, we put the question solemnly to each one of you. "What are you doing for Christ?" and we pray that conscience and the voice of the Holy Spirit may cause it to echo in the heart of many an idler, until it receives its answer in entire consecration to the Master's service.

The echoes of many voices that are now silent in the tomb still ring in our hearts as in yours. Let them admonish you to remember those who have spoken unto you the word of God. Be followers of their faith, consider the end of their conversation.

We close by asking a continued, and if it may be an increased interest

in your prayers.

Hold up our hands, beloved, in continued prayer, so that we may receive from on high, that blessing which alone can render our labours effectual, and which we will rejoice to dispense among you, and "for this cause we bow our knees unto the Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, of whom the whole family in heaven and earth is named, that He would grant you according to the riches of His glory, to be strengthened with might by His Spirit in the inner man: that Christ may dwell in your hearts by faith: that ye being rooted and grounded in love, may be able to comprehend with all saints, what is the breadth, and length, and depth, and height; and to know the love of Christ, which passeth knowledge that ye might be filled with all the fulness of God."
