STUCK IN THE FOG.

The Fall River Steamboat Providence Run Down St. John Schooner.

New York, Sept. 28.—Brave Capt. Farnsworth, able seaman and commander of the British schooner Avia, lumber laden, from St. John, N. B., to this port, lying this afternoon in the residence of Phil Lawrence at City Island.

His right leg has been cut off close up toward the hip and his back is lacerated and bleeding from numerous ugly-looking wounds. The pride of his seafaring life, the schooner Avia, lies in a sinking condition off Ganaway Inlet, in Long Island Sound.

About 8 o'clock last night, when the fog was thickest and the rain was falling in torrents, the Avia was short distance to the eastward of the schooner Providence, proceeding under easy sail.

The lookout could not see a boat's length away, yet he kept his post and paced slowly and continually up and down the deck, passing every minute and then the black darkness.

All was still save for the waiving of the waves against the sides of the boat. Suddenly a loud puffing fell upon the deck, and the schooner was struck.

The dimly shining lights of a monster steamboat appeared close to the bow. The schooner was struck and the steamboat crashed into the schooner, carrying her bowsprit and straining her every timber.

Capt. Farnsworth reached the bow of the schooner just as the collision took place, and the steamboat swept onward in a moment, leaving the schooner a wreck.

The steamboat was the Providence of the Fall River line, Captain Farnsworth is one of the best known seamen sailing into this port.

Two boats of the Providence put off immediately after the collision and rescued the schooner's crew.

The schooner was towed to the wharf and the crew were taken to the hospital.

Mr. E. C. Elkin has gone to New York to look for the schooner.

STAMP OUT MORNING.

Sweeping Condemnation by a Congressional Commission.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 27.—The report of the Utah commission has just been received. Since September 1, 1888, there have been in Utah 27 convictions for bigamy, adultery, and unlawful cohabitation. Those who are convicted of polygamy regard themselves, and are so regarded by their friends, as martyrs, and think it is no disgrace to be sent to the penitentiary.

The commission, in view of the present condition of the territory as regards polygamy, does not think Utah should be admitted as a state. Should it be, the commission says—"It would not be long before the Gentile element, with its advanced civilization, its free trade and traffic, would be driven from the territory, and the Mormon territory be made supreme."

The commission, among other things, recommends that all jurisdiction for all polygamists and sexual offences within the territory be conferred on district courts; that imprisonment for unlawful cohabitation be extended to at least two years for the first and three years for the second offense; that it be made a penal offense for any woman to enter into the marriage relation with any man knowing him to be a wife living, undivorced, coupled, however, with the provision that in cases where a polygamist wife is called as a witness against the husband her testimony could not be used in any future prosecution against her, and a like provision as to the husband, that any person who refuses to testify upon public lands; that the immigration of persons claiming that their religion justifies polygamy be prohibited; that the constitution be amended to forever prohibit polygamy; that Congress pass laws for the government of the public schools in Utah; that when the result of the election comes out, the territory be re-districted for legislative purposes.
