

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MINUTES

OF THE

BAY OF QUINTE CONFERENCE

OF

THE METHODIST CHURCH,

HELD IN THE CITY OF BELLEVILLE, FROM JUNE 6TH TO JUNE 11TH, 1889.

THE SIXTH SESSION of the BAY OF QUINTE CONFERENCE was opened in the Bridge Street Methodist Church, in the city of Belleville, on Thursday, June 6th, 1889, at 9 a.m.

Rev. WM. JOLLIFFE conducted the Conference prayer-meeting, continuing from 9 to 10 o'clock.

At 10 o'clock Rev. M. L. PEARSON announced the 747th hymn, which was sung, after which Rev. WM. JOHNSTON, Assistant Secretary, read the blst chapter of Isaiah and the 2nd chapter of Ephesians, when Rev. CALEB PARKER and Mr. J. L. WINTERS led in prayer.

The roll of ministerial members was called, and the names of the laynen elected by the District Meetings, when 106 ministers and 60 laymen responded to their names.

QUESTION .- What Ministers or Probationers have died this year?

REV. RICHARD JONES.

Richard Jones was born at the military post of Isle au Neix, Nov. 21st, His father was a devout soldier, and serjeant-major in the regiment then 1804. stationed there. The boy was accustomed from infancy to the discipline of military life, as well as to the religious teaching of the Church of England. These, added to the thorough elementary education of the military school, built up a type of moral, religious, and intellectual character not easily surpassed. At the age of fifteen he accompanied his father (now retiring from military life) to the new settlements in the neighborhood of Perth, where for six years he shared in the sturdy toil of the Canadian pioneer. The new settlements around Perth, commenced in 1815, attracted nearly 1,000 soldiers, who between that date and 1820 filled up the surrounding townships. These pioneers were at once followed by the Methodist itinerant, and as early as 1817 we find Robert Jeffers, the father of Dr. Jeffers, preaching in the hotel kept by Joshua Adams, in Perth. In 1822 we find Perth and the back settlements on the list of Methodist stations, with the Rev. Franklin Metcalfe, preacher, in charge. During his first year, he gathered in one hundred converts, and in the year following a hundred more, and among these was the man to whom we pay this last tribute of respect today. Solomon Waldron and John Ryerson were his pastors for the next two Under the guidance of these men the elements of strength in the young years. convert were speedily developed. He became, while yet under twenty-one, class-leader and exhorter, and received unmistakably the call of God to his great life-work. Meanwhile, as he became a true servant of Christ, he was faithful to present duty, and gave his time and energy until he was fully of age to building up a home for his father. As soon as he had completed his twentyfirst year, he hastened to give the life of which he was now the master to the service of Christ, and in November, 1825, left home for a brief period of study at the District Grammar School at Perth. These old District Grammar Schools were the colleges of that day, in which were trained the best men of the past generation. John Stewart, the master at Perth, was a thorough teacher, and knew how to build well upon the old foundations laid in the military school. But the time was far too short. Three months had barely passed when the order from the Presiding Elder Case came, and on the 15th of February, 1826, at six o'clock in the evening, the young student threw his saddle-bags over his shoulder and started to walk fifty miles through the woods to his new circuit. The first night was spent at the house of a Christian friend, but the next morning he found himself in an unknown land, like Abraham, obeying the call of God in faith, not knowing whither he went. His spirit of resolute consecration and of military obedience to orders at that time, are best exhibited in his own words: "I felt it to be a duty to call sinners to repentance, and in the performance of that duty I was perfectly passive, ready to go anywhere and to do anything at

Such was my state of mind when I received this letter from Elder Case about one o'clock' in the afternoon; and at six I was on my way to my first circuit with my saddle-bags on my back." The letter of Elder Case is equally characteristic of the spirit of the olden time. It concludes thus: "Now my young brother, enter into this great and good work with the spirit and dependence of a child—and with the courage and perseverance of a man—and with the faith, prudence and piety of the Christian, and God will be your support and erown your labors with encouraging success. As you stand as an exhorter, you are not to attempt to preach. This might be construed into assumption. The importance of the exercise of this gift is so considered, that our Church directs that young preachers often exhort without a text. God bless you. Farewell."

After spending a year and a half under the presiding elder, first as an exhorter and then as a local preacher, during which time his labors were greatly owned of God, and the membership of the old Augusta Circuit enlarged by nearly 400 new members, Mr. Jones was received on trial for the ministry in 1827, and ordained deacon in 1829.

The first ten years of his ministry were spent in the ordinary circuit work, first as junior preacher, and then from 1829 onwards as superintendent. In 1829, he found a truly consecrated partner in his work in Maria Wright, who for fifty-nine years of rarely felicitous married life, was the sharer of his joys and sorrows. In these ten years the gatherings into the Church under his own ministry exceeded 1,000 souls, and Methodism fully doubled its membership in the country. From this point Mr. Jones began to bear that responsibility of connexional office for which his energy of character and military respect for law and order gave him remarkable fitness. His presiding eldership dates from 1836, and for thirty-one consecutive years he filled this important office, with marked ability, in the Hamilton, Bytown, Bay of Quinte, Cobourg, Belleville, Toronto and London Districts. During this period, also, his name stood on all the important executive committees of the Church, and three times he filled the highest office in the gift of his brethren, twice as President and once as Co-Delegate. During all those years he was a leading member of that host of workers through whose labors Methodism grew to be the leading Church in the Province of Ontario, multiplying in the course of his active ministry its membership sevenfold, and in the course of his ministerial life nearly twenty-fold.

On his retirement from itinerant work, in 1868, Father Jones devoted his executive ability and energy to the service of our University. From its inception he had taken a deep interest in this institution. He was a pastor in Cobourg when the foundation stone was laid in 1832, and was from the very first a member of its Board of Management, and one of that noble roll of Methodist preachers who were originally the largest contributors to its building fund. The year 1868 was a crisis in the financial history of the institution. It had just been freed from debt, but was entirely without endowment. Its yearly income of less than \$10,000 was made up of students' fees, the educational collection and a grant from the Legislature of \$5,000 a year, and barely sufficient to meet expenses. That year the grant was withdrawn, and the very continuance of Victoria became a question. The courageous efforts of four or five men appealing to Methodist liberality carried us through. Dr. Punshon, Dr. Nelles, Mr. Kerr and Mr. Jones were of that number. Some ministers present to-day will remember his Annual Conference addresses at that date. He lived to see the income of Victoria University more than double what it had been before the reverse, and more than four times the fragment that was left when he gave his remaining strength to help meet its difficulties.

Of the character of the man whose record we have thus briefly epitomized we need to say but very little. He was a man who had learned how to obey and who knew how to command. He was a man of purpose, of energy, of action. His courage never failed, though again and again he was called to pass

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through times that tried men's souls. His convictions of duty were as clear as the sunlight and imperious as the laws of the Medes and Persians. And to the honesty of these convictions and of life governed by them, his brethren, ministerial and lay, accorded universal 'and profound respect. His religious experience, like his moral character, was of the clearest type. Repentance, faith, pardon, the witness of the Spirit, the love of God, and the hope of heaven, yere, for nearly seventy years, living verities to him. And what he felt he preached with power. His was both an evangelical and evangelistic ministry. It always satisfied the old-time standard of Methodist preaching in souls saved.

For three years he has been the Lord's prisoner. During that time it has been our privilege to spend many blessed hours in his company. We have listened as he lived over again the years gone by. We have seen him in pain, we have seen him in the deepest sorrow, yet in all his joy was abounding. He exulted in the full assurance of hope. His constant testimony was, "All is well." Thus through the quiet eventide time of life he passed gently, peacefully downward, and entered without a struggle into rest. And of him we might well say :

> "There is no death, what seems so is transition, This life of mortal breath Is but the suburb of the life Elysian,

Whose portal we call death.'

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON TEMPERANCE.

Your Committee regard the recent sweeping repeal of the Scott Act in Ontario as an event which, though seemingly disastrous, may yet turn out for the furtherance of the cause of Temperance, so intimately connected with the Saviour's, kingdom. The Act was not condemned on its merits, but was the victim of party jealousy and of fickle impatience. The bright public record of its effectiveness in reducing drunkenness and crime, where faithfully enforced; will long be an unanswerable testimony for prohibition.

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METHODIST CONFERENCE.

Your Committee are glad to report that, from the Districts of this Conference, there comes no note of discouragement, but many pledges of effort and co-operation in any forward movement. Prohibition sentiment has not declined, and a general prohibitory law is demanded.

Your Committee believe, with the Bishops of the Methodist Episcopal Church, that "license is powerless as a remedy, and can never be sanctioned without sin." The present situation cannot continue. Reaction is inevitable, and the way is open for general prohibition. Your Committee, therefore, beg to recommend :---

1. That, as the ballot under Providence must ultimately decide the question, every lawful effort be made to enlighten and prompt our people to the faithful discharge of their duty in so important a crisis.

2. That our people be once more earnestly urged to subordinate party interests and preferences to the great cause of Temperance, and to support only those candidates for Parliament who are thoroughly trustworthy in regard to strictly prohibitory legislation.

3. That faithful efforts be made to secure the introduction and use of the authorized text-book, "Public School Temperance," in all our schools. We also recommend the perusal of it by young and old.

4. That our Sabbath school officers be requested to give more attention to the use of the Temperance Pledge in the Sabbath school.

5. That, while gratefully recognizing the work done by our religious periodicals, and by our people in various temperance organizations, we regard as the most powerful of all agencies the preaching of the Word. We believe that upon the courage, wisdom and fidelity of ministers and preachers in keeping this great subject before the people, success largely depends. We, therefore, recommend frequent preaching on Temperance; and that the cause be commended from time to time to those who assemble in meetings for prayer.

REPORT OF SABBATH-SCHOOL COMMITTEE, 1888-9.

Your Committee, in reporting on Sabbath school work, beg to instance the following :—We have 100 more preaching appointments reported than last year, and our number of schools is one hundred less than the number of appointments, so that there is a wide field left for operation. Our staff of teachers has increased about 50, total number being 3,206. The increase of scholars is 364-25,312 being the total. We report 1,115 conversions, being a much less number than reported a year ago. Also about 100 less number meeting in class. There is also a falling off in the list of those learning catechism. The Temperance column advances te between 400 and 500 increase. Our schools are provided with reading matter in part from 24,652 volumes in libraries, being an increase of 3,800, and a circulation of our own denominational Sunday-school periodicals in the aggregate of 35,920 copies, being an increase of 500, and 3,000 other papers. We infer that our schools are seeking to secure efficiency in and for their work, from the fact that \$12,563.33 have been

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devoted to school purposes the past year, an increase of \$4,000. In the Mission Department there is a slight falling off, while the receipts of the Sabbath-school Aid and Extension Fund far exceed that of former years.

We are encouraged to hope that, with the constantly multiplying appliances in this most promising department of our work, consecrated talent, sympathy and love, accompanied with a zeal akin to the spirit of the Master, greater results may yet be realized in the conversion of our children and youth. "That our sons may be as plants grown up in their youth. That our daughters should be as as corner-stones polished after the similitude of a palace." "Those that be planted in the house of the Lord shall flourish in the courts of our God."

Your Committee, in addition, beg to suggest the importance of giving prominence by the Sabbath school Committee elected by the several District Meetings, to the arranging and discussion of those subjects which are vital to the interests, growth and usefulness of our Sabbath-schools, and thereby seek to realize the object intended by the General Conference in ordering the enlarge nent of the Committee ; and further, that all Sabbath-school schedules be prepared, and promptly handed over to the Secretary at the time the Committee meet for organization at the Annual Conference Session.

Your Committee by further to recommend the Conference to appoint W. Jolliffe as the Secretary-Treasurer for the ensuing year.

REPORT OF SECRETARY TREASURER OF SUNDAY SCHOOL AID AND EXTENSION FUND, 1888-9.

The amount contributed to the Fund from the several Districts in the Conference is \$268.45. It is gratifying to be able to report that there has been an increase in the annual receipts for several years past.

It is meet to say, however, that a greater amount might be realized if the claims of the Fund were more generally entertained; and especially do we mention those schools on self-supporting Circuits, which only at present return but a nominal amount.

We express the desirability of awakening an interest in all our Sabbath-schools in behalf of this praiseworthy and benevolent department of our work, with a view to increase its efficiency, and to accomplish the object for which it is instituted

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON THE STATE OF THE WORK.

Your Committee recognize, with gratitude to God, the fact that peace and and progress have continued during the past year. The increase in our membership is comparatively small; but a year of faithful seed sowing may, and we trust shall, bear fruit in larger numerical increase in the

year ensuing. We recommend that the spiritual life of young converts be more carefully fostered, so that a larger proportion of those added to the Church from year to year may continue faithful.

We also find an increase in some of our Connexional Funds, while in others we find a decrease. The largest increase being in the Educational, and the largest decrease in the Missionary. We would earnestly recommend that all legitimate efforts be made to among our people, and thus secure increased givings for this most important department of our work.

We would also respectfully note the fact that the average salary of our ministers and preachers, as paid by our Circuits and Missions, is considerably under \$600. We call attention to this fact specially, because in many instances it has a depressing effect upon our ministers and preachers in the discharge of their duties as pastors.

We rejoice that our Sabbath-school work is being very heartily taken hold of by our people, that interest being greatest where the ministers take time to look after the Sabbath-schools. We are of the opinion that the time has come when no single congregation or pastor can afford to ignore the great benefits to the Church of fidelity in this important part of the Church's work.

We are pleased to observe that the spirit of discontent in relation to the important work of the Stationing Committee has not, to any considerable degree, affected our Conference, our people, as a whole, being loyal thus far. But while this is the case, we must guard faithfully and consistently the interests of the work, as well as the interests of the men, remembering at all times the apostolic principle expressed in the words, "For I say, through the grace given unto me, to every-man that is among you, not to think of himself more highly than he ought to think."

Your Committee earnestly request those who are placed in charge of our Circuits and Missions to carry out as faithfully as possible the regulations of our Discipline, so as to guard with greatest care the rights and privileges of our people.

We gladly recognize the unswerving adherence of our people to the principles of total abstinence and prohibition; and, notwithstanding the apparent reverses of the past year in the repeal of the Scott Act, we recommend that our ministers and people do not forget the necessity of persistent effort in this cause.

2. We are glad to find the Council of our flourishing Provincial expital still upholding the sanctity of the Sabbath against many who have endeavored to break up its holy quiet and rest.

3. We also rejoice to hear that a "Ford's Day Alliance" has been formed in this Province, and pray that great good may result from its establishment.

4. We would entreat our people to abstain from reading secular news. papers, social visiting, travelling by rail or steamboat, or taking drives for mere pleasure, on the Lord's Day.

5. We wish to keep prominently before our people last year's recommendation with reference to the discouragement of Sabbath funerals,

6. We would not only urge our people to keep the Sabbath day holy themselves, but to use every proper means to persuade as many others as possible to walk by the same rule, to mind the same things.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON GENERAL EDUCATION.

Your Committee beg to submit the following Report :--

The past year has been one of prosperity and marked advancement in the work of Methodist higher education. Victoria University has seen full classes, earnest work, and very satisfactory results in the building up of strong character and in the equipment of noble young men and women for the active duties of life. So long as our University is cherished in the affections, remembered in the prayers, and supported by the consecrated liberality of the Methodist people, we have no fear for her future, wherever she may be situated, and according to whatever policy her work may be prosecuted.

Albert College has proved itself the very right arm of strength to our Church University. The increase in accommodation, the self-denying labors of President and staff, the high quality of work done, the success of students in their subsequent university career, or in other spheres of activity, all give promise of permanent prosperity. Albert College has vindicated for itself an unmistakable right to the confidence and patronage of our united Church as our own recognized institution of secondary education.

The honor, the influence, the abiding power of our Church in this Province are much dependent, under God, upon the strength and success of these two colleges. Let all their interests be dear to Methodist hearts, let all their enterprises be generously sustained by Methodist money. The Report of the Educational Society for the past year shows a gratifying increase in contributions within the bounds of this Conference. Your Committee would urge upon all the ministers the necessity of pressing the claims of this Society earnestly and persistently upon our congregations, seeking especially to increase the number of one dollar subscribers, to whom a copy of the Annual Report of the Society will be sent, containing due public acknowledgment of all such subscriptions.

Your Committee beg, moreover, to offer the following suggestions with regard to the relation of the Church to High Schools and Public Schools throughout our bounds. It is the duty of our Ministers and people to strengthen the hands of all teachers, inspectors, and other authorities in enlightened efforts to improve the hygienic conditions of our schools, to

secure good light and ventilation, to provide ample appliances for physical recreation and development, to check the tendency to cramming, and in all respects to promote the old ideal of a meus sama in corpori samo. We also beg to suggest that our ministers and people should practically interest themselves in their various school sections in the enforcement of all the regulations of the Educational Department intended to promote moral and religious training. The school regulations recommend teachers to drill their schools in the Ten Commandments and in other selected passages of Holy Scripture. Let our ministers and people see to it that school trustees enforce such regulations. Only by availing ourselves to the full of the concessions already granted, need we expect to gain something further in the way of moral and religious training in our schools.

Much may be done by kindly pressure on School Bcards to secure the appointment of teachers who shall, by their clean lives, their lofty prineiples, and their Christian faith, indirectly but most powerfully preach Christ, "allure to brighter worlds, and lead the way."

In our Public School system we have a most precious heritage from the past. Let us not only boast of it, but let us cherish and improve it, guarding it well both from a bald secularism on the one side, and from the subtle aggressions of a relentless Romanism on the other; for the future nationality, and even Christianity, of this fair land shall be what the school system of the land shall make them. "Whatsoever a man soweth, that shall he also reap." By the grace of God, let us bountifully sow the seeds of a noble Anglo-Saxon Christian civilization.

We recommend that Revs. Dr. Williams and O. R. Lambly, M.A., be our representatives on Albert College Board, and Rev. J. B. Clarkson, M.A., on the Board of Alma College.

REPORT OF VICTORIA UNIVERSITY FOR THE YEAR 1888-9.

The condition of Victoria University for the past year might be not imaptly described in the words of the book of Exodus. "Behold, the bush burned with fire, and the bush was not consumed." The agitations, uncertainties, and special embarrassments of recent years might have been expected to seriously affect the whole work of the University. But we have every reason to thank God, and take courage.

The number of students in attendance at Cobourg in Arts and Theology, the number of unrolled students in Law, and the number of Medical students attending our affiliated Colleges in Toronto and Montreal have been larger than ever. The total number of students has been 674, and of this 176 have been in Arts and 56 in Theology. The graduates this year, in the various faculties, numbered 105. The prospects for this coming year are bright. We have already received notice of nearly 70 matriculants in Arts, of which about 30 are from our noble Albert College.

The educational work of the year has been eminently satisfactory. Faithful work on the part of the professors has been responded to by faithful work on the part of the students, consequently few men have failed in examination; the average results have been excellent, and many candidates have secured remarkably high marks.

A thoroughly good, harmonious, and loyal spirit has prevailed throughout the year. Class-meeting and prayer-meeting have not been forgotten. With few exceptions, the students are members of the Church and consistent earnest Christians. The Students' Missionary Society has during the year sent out one of its members, a distinguished graduate of 1888, as a missionary teacher to Japan.

So long as Victoria attracts students of such industry, of such ability, and of such moral earnestness as characterize those now enrolled, her prosperity is assured.

Some changes have occurred, or are about to occur, on the staff. Dr. Haanel, after sixteen years of heroic work in the Scientific Departmentwork which has not only reflected credit upon the University in which it was done, but has also tended to the elevation of the standard of scientific. education throughout Canada-takes his departure from our College and our country, to enrich the great Methodist University of Syracuse with his ability and enthusiasm. Professor Horning has gone abroad to better fit himself for his work in Modern Languages. Dr. Workman, having won the highest academic honors open to foreigners in the ancient University of Leipzig, and having done work in the science of Old Testament criticism, which places him among the world's authorities on the subject which he has made his own, returns to consecrate his ripe scholarship to the service of our Church and University. Professor Bell is completing his course at Breslau, and is expected home in September, to strengthen the Classical Department with his erudition and his energy. Professor Petch has recently been added to our staff in the Department of Modern With an enlarged staff and an improved curriculum, the Languages. University offers fresh attractions to students, and has fresh claims upon the confidence and liberality of the Methodist Church.

The financial aspect is the dark side of this Report. The cash endowment is \$145,000. The annual income from endowment, fees, and Educational Society is \$19,000; and the annual expenditure, including interest on the debt, is \$23,000. How to stop this gap, how to adequately increase this endowment, how to put our work upon a wise, firm, and permanent basis for time to come—this is the problem which we commend to the prudence, the prayers, and the generosity of the Methodist people.

ONTARIO LADIES' COLLEGE.

DIRECTOR'S REPORT.

The Board of Directors of the Ontario Ladies' College have very great pleasure in presenting this, their Fourteenth Anihual Report.

It was our pleasing duty, last year, to refer to the very flattering success which had attended the College, and it gives us unfeigned satisfaction

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tering sucatisfaction to report that the present year has been one of continued and increased prosperity.

Our College has now been in successful operation for fourteen years, and it may well be regarded as one of the permanent institutions of the Church. While other schools, projected by individual enterprise and sustained by personal exertion, have enjoyed but temporary and indifferent success, this College has prospered beyond the expectation of its most sanguine friends. Every year's experience enables us to make improvements upon the past, and each year we are adding to our facilities for imparting knowledge and increasing our sphere of usefulness. In attributing the unparalleled success of the College in large measure to the careful and intelligent direction of the Principal, Rev. J. J. Hare, Ph.D., and the lady Principal, Miss Adams, M.L.A., we very cheerfully bear testimony to their able, efficient and well directed efforts, and those of their able staff of assistants, during the last year.

Our aim has been to raise the standard of education, in this College, above that of any other similar institution in this country, to make it in every way as thorough and comprehensive as the best schools abroad, and to furnish to young ladies, desiring a collegiate education, opportunities equal to those provided for young men. We trust that, at no distant day, the work done shall receive suitable recognition in the educational system of this Province.

In our College of Literature and Science, and in our Schools of Music, Fine Art, and Elocution, each important department has its own professor, and our facilities for instruction afford unsurpassed advantages. We believe that without a good degree of division of labor the highest results of education cannot be achieved. No expense has been spared in providing superior instruments and apparatus for the effectual teaching of each subject, while our magnificent College buildings, ample lawns and grounds, render college life homelike and attractive.

Our College of Literature and Science embraces difficult branches of collegiate study, and the staff comprises the Principal, Rev. J. J. Hare, Ph.D., the lady Principal, Miss Adams, M.L.A., and five efficient assistants, besides Dr. Haanel, of Victoria University, who visits the College each week throughout the year, and gives lectures and experiments in natural science. The equipment comprises a large refracting telescope, the finest of its kind in the Dominion, a compound microscope, and a working laboratory for students that is only equalled in University halls.

The School of Music is under the direction of Prof. J. W. F. Harrison assisted by. Prof. Bayley, Mrs. Bradley and four other able teachers. During the present year, the pupils of this school gave a musical and equationary recital in the Horticultural Pavilion in Toronto, and in that electro of criticism they scored a complete triumph. It is with gratification we mention that this year we have been enabled to equip this department with entirely new pianofortes, twenty-two in number, including three Concert Grand and three Cabinet Grand Pianofortes, also a large new Orchestral Organ, the most complete of its class, thus making our equipment in this department very greatly superior to that of any ladies' school in Canada.

The School of Fine Art is under the direction of Prof. L. R. O'Brien, President of the Royal Canadian Academy, assisted by Miss Windeatt,

Associate of the Royal Canadian Academy, and two competent teachers of drawing and art needle work.

The School of Elocution is presided over by Miss Graham, gold medallist from the Philadelphia School of Oratory.

Social Culture and Deportment, too often overlooked in a lady's edu. cation, are special features in our College work, and it is gratifying to know that our efforts in this direction are understood and appreciated.

In addition, we provide a Commercial School, in which are taught Book-keeping, Telegraphy, Phonography, and Type-writing, in connection with which we have lately added to the College a Caligraph writing machine.

A system of physical training, including Calsithenics and Riding, is also provided—such as skating, tobogganing, lawn-tennis, croquet, etc.—we being persuaded that the preservation of health, and the cultivation of the physical powers are essential to the perfection of the educational system.

We are pleased to be able to report an increase of income during the year, it having exceeded \$23,000. The number of pupils enrolled was 160.

We also are thankful to be able to report that during the year there has been entire freedom from sickness, thus testifying to the healthfulness of our location and surroundings.

We desire to return to the Conference our hearty thanks for your cooperation, and for the confidence you have been pleased to repose in us in the past, and we cordially commend the College to your continued patronage and support.

THE WESLEYAN LADIES' COLLEGE, HAMILTON.

DEAR BRETHREN,—To our Church belongs the honor of having the first University chartered in Canada—Victoria College—and the first college incorporated for the higher education of women—the Wesleyan Ladies' College, of Hamilton. As there are more than 240 of our graduates, and thousands of our ex students scattered throughout the country, many of you know the history of the Institution, and are conversant with the work it is doing. We are pleased to be able to say that the College was never so well prepared for thorough and advanced work—never so well equipped as it is now. The examination papers for all its advanced classes are prepared and valued by outside examiners—graduates of other colleges. Our course runs through four years, and is a fine preparation for an intelligent

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We are always proud of our equipment in Music and Art, and some marked improvements are in progress.

You will be pleased to see the prominence we give to Biblical Studies, Evidences of Christianity, Mental and Moral Science—and in this respect, as indeed in all others, we are workers together with you.

We have had a prosperous year educationally, and will graduate, on the 17th, a good class of over a dozen in the different departments. We trust that we may have your active endorsation. We are sure the Institution never merited it so much.

ALMA LADIES' COLLEGE.

To the Members of the Bay of Quinte Annual Conference of the Methodist Church:----

DEAR FATHERS AND BRETHREN, - We are grateful to a kind Providence that has preserved the lives and blessed the labors of our teachers. and students through another year. We rejoice that we are able to report a year of prosperity, both in regard to the number in attendance and the quantity and quality of the work done in the various depart-We continue to receive the patronage of all Christian denominaments. tions, and have reason to believe that there is a growing public confidence in the thoroughness and efficiency of the work done within our halls. The completion and opening of McLachlin Hall marks an epoch in the history of our school. The building is not only of surpassing beauty, but most admirably adapted to the needs of collegiate work. It has so increased the capacity of the College, that at least seventy more resident students can now be received, besides giving us a chapel with seating capacity of five hundred, some six additional class-rooms and an Art Gallery, which has been pronounced the finest in the Province. We are glad to report a healthy religious interest in the school manifested by the attendance upon prayer and praise services in the College and class-meetings and other voluntary services in the churches.

Our College Missionary Society is doing a grand work in educating the minds and hearts of the young women, and Inspiring them with burning interest in the world's evangelization. Three of our former students are now in China and Japan, and others are contemplating work in the mission field. Our enrolment has been 175 students—140 residents and 35 day pupils. Of the total enrolment, 15 come from the United States. Our attendance was somewhat lessened by the prevalence of a smallpox epidemic in an adjoining community.

Our Natural Science Department has been enlarged and more efficiently equipped with needed apparatus. Our Music Department was never better attended or more firmly established in public favor. Our Commercial Department continues to attract and qualify young women for efficient services in business life. Our full literary course, with its departments of Science, Mathematics, Literature, Languages, Christian Evidences and Philosophy, is giving young women an intellectual training of a thoroughly liberal and distinctively Christian character.

Our Art Department, with its new gallery and apparatus, is attracting students from all parts of Ontario, and in the recent Departmental Examinations more than maintained its former high reputation —Alma winning 108 certificates in all, taking the only four full advanced certificates given in the Province, and winning in addition two gold medal certificates.

The response to the appeal for aid in the building of the McLachlin Hall has been encouraging. There has been subscribed nearly \$12,000— St. Thomas contributing \$5,000; over \$6,000 of the amount subscribed has been paid. The total expenditure incurred to date on new building is \$19,000. The increasing sympathy shown the College in its work furnishes good grounds for expecting that there will be forthcoming all reeded financial aid to keep the school fully equipped and thoroughly abreast of the times, and to enable it to do its share in retaining the education of Protestant girls in Protestant hands. It is a well-known fact that the numerous convents with which we compete are practically endowed through the gratuitous service of their teachers, and also liberally supported through accumulated benefactions of zealous friends of convent education.

It is the undisguised aim of the convent system to control the education of women, and all Protestant Colleges for women should be in such financial condition as to offer educational advantages as inviting as the best, and at rates that will remove all temptation for extending Protestant patronage to convent schools.

The Ladies Colleges should be powerful auxiliaries to the Missionary and Educational work of the Church, and should be recognized and affiliated in compact organization with our central university work. The fullest realization of this depends in a measure upon the support of the ministers of the Conference, who can do much to awaken interest, promote patronage and direct benefactions.

The Board highly appreciates the expressions of confidence made by your Conference, as well as the hearty co-operation of many individual members thereof, and has derived much benefit from the advice and counsel of the associate members appointed by the Conference in past years.

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METHODIST CONFERENCE.

THE REPORT OF ALBERT COLLEGE FOR THE COLLEGE YEAR 1888-9.

To the Bay of Quinte Conference of the Methodist Church in Conference Assembled :---

DEAR FATHERS AND BRETHREN,—The Report of Albert College for the present college year of 1888-9 is as follows :—

There have been 152 students in attendance—112 males and 40 females. In this number are representatives from nearly every Province in the Dominion, and from several of the adjoining States.

We are glad to be able to report that the class of matriculants in Arts is the largest in the history of the College, being twenty-eight—made up of six senior matriculants and twenty-two juniors.

The work of preparing candidates for the preliminary examination of the Methodist Church is assuming considerable prominence.

The first class was prepared in 1885, and consisted of four persons. The class has increased in number, until this year there were nearly twenty in the class. Believing that no college in Ontario offers equal advantages for this class of students, we would urge our ministers to send such candidates to Albert.

The Academy of Music, School of Fine Art, Business College, School of Elocution, are thoroughly equipped, and doing excellent work. None but graduates of experience or specialists are employed.

The class in preparation for teacher's certificates is about the usual number. In this class of work the College has been most successful, having passed between fifty and sixty per cent. of its candidates. This is a good test of the thoroughness of the work done at Albert.

We are also able to report that a marked spiritual influence has existed throughout the entire year. This is largely owing to excellent work done by the College Y. M. C. A. The students have two successful missionary societies, and the missionary spirit has been greatly increased during the past year.

There is a band of volunteers for foreign missionary work, fifteen in all, with captain and other officers. They have set apart one of their number, Mr. F. J. Livingston, for the foreign work in Africa, and are now busily engaged raising the money to support him in that field. About \$600 have been secured of the \$1,100 necessary.

It will thus be seen that, with many disadvantages, the College is doing good and thorough work.

We are anxious to increase the attendance this year to 200; and we are confident, if the thoroughness of the work done was more widely known, that such desire could be realized.

Albert College depends entirely upon its attendance for its financial ^{support}, and appeals to every minister and every layman in the Church for sympathy and support. "We thank God and take courage."

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REPORT OF THE BOARD OF EXAMINERS, 1889.

The Board of Examiners of the Bay of Quinte Conference ask to submit the following Report, viz. :--

They met the candidates and probationers in the Methodist Church, Colborne, April the 17th, 1889, for examination in the prescribed Course of Study. Four probationers and nine candidates were in attendance, and as a result of the examination, five obtained, each, a first-class certificate, five a second-class certificate, and one a third-class certificate.

The Annual Meeting of the Board of Examiners was held in the same place on the 18th of April. All the members were present. Upon resolation, the following were recommended for the adoption of the Conference, viz .:-

A resolution, expressing the esteem of the Board for the Chairman, Rev. John Learoyd, whose transfer to the London Conference will shortly take effect, was unanimously adopted.

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The cordial thanks of the Board were given to the Secretary, Rev. John J. Leach, Ph.B., who goes, by transfer, to the Manitoba and North-West Conference.

REPORT OF MEMORIAL COMMITTEE.

Your Committee beg leave to report that memorials in reference to the Jesuit question from the following Districts, viz.: Belleville, Picton, Brighton, Cobourg, Peterboro', Lindsay, Madoc, Campbellford, and Cannington were considered by us, and we would recommend the adoption of the following resolutions:

1. That this Conference regards as unconstitutional, deplores as a national calamity, utterly condemns and protests against the incorporation of the Jesuit Society—a society which history certifies as everywhere and always the enemy of civil and religious liberty.

2. That we indignantly resent the action of the Legislature of the Province of Quebec—part of this Dominion—in passing the Act known as The Jesuits' Estate Act, thus recognizing the right of a foreign potentate—the Pope of Rome—to interfere in our internal civil affairs, which, as we believe, is in direct contravention of Imperial Statutes, endangering the peace and prosperity of our country, and is derogatory to the supremacy of Her Most Gracious Majesty the Queen as the sole ruler in these realms, and as offering a gross insult to us as British subjects.

3. That, while we believe that spiritually the Roman Catholic Church is losing power, and numerically is not gaining in proportion to the population, we view with alarm, and take it as evidence of the increasing political power of that Church in the councils of our Dominion, that 188 members of the House of Commons should have voted against the disallowance of the Jesuits' Estate Act. That we strongly disapprove of said vote, regard it as a national disgrace, believe it to be contrary to the will of the people, and commend the action of the thirteen who voted for disallowance.

4. That the Conference petition the Governor-General to disallow the Jesuits' Estate Act. And that the President and Secretary be authorized to forward such petition.

5. That we declare our approval of the address of the Citizens' Committee of Toronto, and their action in calling a convention from all parts of the Province for the purpose of forming an organization, whose object

shall be the testing of the legality of the Jesuits' Estate Act in the highest courts of the realm.

6. We would recommend the appointment of six delegates to the Convention in Toronto that meets on 11th and 12th inst., and would suggest the following names for said delegation, viz.: Rev. M. L. Pearson, Ex-President; Rev. W. Johnston, Secretary; Revs. Wm. Buchanan and W. R. Young, and Messrs. John B. Aylesworth and W. H. Austin.

7. That we recommend to all our people the importance of supporting none as candidates for parliamentary honors who will not pledge themselves to oppose Romanish aggression and support equal rights, both civil and religious.

In reference to memorials from Districts concerning Prison Reforms, we express our hearty sympathy with the efforts being made by the Prisoners' Aid Association of Canada to so influence our Dominion Parliament and Provincial Legislatures as to end the deplorable condition of our penitentaries and jails in not having a proper classification of prisoners, and in all other needed reforms. We would further recommend the adoption of the recommendations of the circular issued by the above Association.

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SUPERANNUATION FUND.

Annual Report of the Board for the year endiny July 31st, 1888.

I have pleasure in again presenting to the Board the Annual Exhibit of the state of the Fund.

Although the past year has been one of great stringency in money matters, the income of the Fund has been sufficient to meet the claims of the year, and to pay off the balance against the Fund, with which the year was commenced.

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The amounts apportioned to the several Districts have been paid, with comparatively trifling exceptions, and the claimants have received their fu'l allowances.

I am sorry, however, to say that quite a number of our most poorly paid ministers have been compelled to make up deficiencies which should have been paid by their Circuits; but so willingly has this been done, in obedience to the law of the Church, that in very few instances have I heard any complaint.

The estimates for the coming year have been very carefully made, and I venture, with some hesitation, to recommend that the percentage be no higher than six per cent. the same as last year, although that may leave a small deficiency against the Fund.

The coming year will be a trying one, arising from several causes.-The amount of assessable income has not materially increased. The number of additional claimants is greater than usual, and their claims exceptionally heavy. There will probably be a falling off in the Interest account, as we will have to make a change in the securities of a considerable amount of our investments, and the interest has been very closely collected.

The above is the Treasurer's Report as adopted by the Board.

GENERAL CONFERENCE FUND.

In the years preceding the General Conference of 1886 the salaries of the General Superintendents were paid in part by the Missionary and Educational Funds, on the ground that the advocacy of the chief officers of the Church did very materially benefit these departments of our Church work.

According to the then existing law, the Fund paid only \$2,000 annually for the above purpose, or at the rate \$8,000 for the full quadrennium. The legislation of the General Conference of 1886 (I think unwisely) enacted that the whole amount required for the above purpose should be paid by the Fund, which amount during the quadrennium is \$18,400 an increase of \$10,400 during the four years on this one item.

The General Conference, through the Financial Committee, provided for meeting/this increased claim, by apportioning to the several Annual Conferences, on what they considered an equitable basis, such sums as they deemed necessary to meet these claims, and the Conferences, through their representatives, accepted such apportionments. (See Journal, page 251.)

I consider the estimates made by the Financial Committee of the General Conference to be-moderate and approximately correct, and I think the whole of these apportionments will be required to meet the claims against the Fund during the quadrennium.

The following tabulated statement will show how far the several Conferences have been successful, up till the 1st of September, 1888, in raising the amounts required from them respectively. According to the estimates of the Financial Committee of the General Conference, I would just say here in addition, that one-half of the quadrennium is now past, and one-half of the estimated amount should be in the Treasurer's hands.

METHODIST CONFERENCE.

From the above facts and figures it will be seen that less that one-half of the amount estimated as necessary has been paid in the past two years by the Conference; \$15,080 required, say \$7,150 paid, and \$7,930 still deficient on the two years. These figures speak more eloquently than anything I could say. What is to be done? This is a question properly belonging to the several Annual Conferences. That something should be done, and done generally and promptly, I think all will admit. The next meeting of the Annual Conferences should not be allowed to pass without very decided action. All the Conferences might not be disposed to take the same action; some might be disposed to adopt an additional collection to make up the balance, while others might prefer to do it by a private subscription among the friends of the Church. The amount should be raised in some way by each of the Conferences.

To prevent misunderstandings, it may be necessary to say that as our year closes on the 31st of August, and the year in Annual Conferences closes about June, it will be in vain to expect that our figures will agree with those returned in the Minutes of the several Annual Conferences.

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THE ANNUAL ADDRESS

OF THE BAY OF QUINTE CONFERENCE TO THE MEMBERS OF THE CHURCH UNDER ITS CARE.

DEARLY BELOVED BRETHREN,—Being assembled according to usage in our Annual Conference, we greet you in the name of the Lord. To you, as the flock of Christ, "over which the Holy Ghost hath made usoverseers," our thoughts instinctively turn; and around you gather and concentrate all the feelings of our ministerial solicitude and regard. We rejoice exceedingly as we think of the peace, harmony, goodwill, and many virtues, which, by the Spirit of God, are everywhere prevalent among you. We are thankful also, beyond expression, for the heavenly influences, the divine visitations, the conversions, and the measure of general prosperity vouchsafed during the past year.

In various localities and portions of our .Conference we have been blessed with gracious revivals, and scores and hundreds have been turned from sin to holiness, and from the power of Satan unto God. The Sabbath-schools are everywhere flourishing and increasing. New churches, in all directions, are being erected. The finances of the Church are steadily improving, and there is no doubt, with the territory we have before us for cultivation and evangelistic effort, if we are true to God and Christ and our peculiar calling, a glorious future awaits us, surpassing expectation.

We deem it our duty, on this, as on former similar occasions, to remind you of the special object for which, according to the judgment of the venerable Wesley, God has raised us up as a people, viz. : "to spread Scrip-tural holiness through the land." But how can we do this unless we ourselves are distinguished by this divine quality? As then, "He that hath called you is holy, so be ye holy in all manner of conversation." To this end live and walk in the faith of God and of Christ, and of things invisible, and attend to the traditions and usages you have received. Do not think it an evidence of enlightened wisdom to disparage and neglect the classmeeting, the love-feast, or the prayer-meeting. Consider the religious standing of those who regard those blessed means of grace as well nigh obsolete, and who speak of them as such, and who have discontinued attendance upon them. Are such among you the most exemplary of Christians? are they the most pious, and jealous, and useful in the Kingdom of God ? then follow their example, but if otherwise, if they are in general those denounced by the Lord as "lukewarm," the religiously indifferent, those who have only a name to live, "foolish virgins," then beware. Be admonished, and follow not such unhappy and pernicious courses. Follow rather in the ancient footsteps of the Methodistic fathers and flock of Christ. Walk in the good old ways-not because they are old-but good, and let the means of grace, the house of God, the word of God, and the works and people of God be ever your delight.

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The times in which we live are perilous in the highest degree to the soul and to spiritual interests. The fascinations and seductions of worldly society, the insidious encroachments of a worldly spirit and worldly principles, the haste and eagerness to be rich, and the consequent specula. tions and modes of trade and merchandise, and the ever restless hopes and anxieties induced. Add to these the rationalistic, infidel and Jesuitical principles and dogmas, now everywhere propounded-all are fraught with danger, with, indeed, extreme peril to the souls of men. As your watchmen, beloved, upon the walls of Zion, we love you too well to slumber or be silent. We lift up our voice. We warn you of these dangers. We charge you to be vigilant. Your enemies, numerous, invisible, most subtle and formidable, are near; they surround you. Watch. Be ever on the alert. Quit you like men. "This is the victory that overcometh the world, ' that whereby we are able to conquer, "even our faith," the faith of the saints, the faith that is divine, that is of God. To possess this and to be daily and continuously influenced and actuated thereby, be especially and particularly attentive to private devotions, prayer and meditation, and the reading of the word. It is thus that men have faith and rise out of the vanities of time into the riches of eternity. It is in this way that the soul doth plume her wings of faith and hope, and, like the eagle as it soars towards the sun, scatters the dust of earth from her feet and ascends to contemplate and exult in the glories celestial. It is thus that men do live; that the feeble are made strong, even as David, and the Davids in Israel become as the angels of God.

You will not, we trust, deem it unbecoming or out of place if we address to you a few words relative to what we regard as most important obligations due to the ministry. You will, we are sure, feel with us how important and how imperative it is that the members of the Church should pray for and assist, and liberally support and esteem very highly the ministry of God among you. On no occasion speak disrespectfully or disparagingly of such ministry. Remember, beloved, that though human, and therefore characterized by infirmities and defects, it is, nevertheless, divine-the ministry of Christ. Do not think of ministers as some appear to regard them, as mere orators, sent of God to delight, by eloquent orations on religious subjects the imaginations and feelings of the people, as any eloquent orator on a stage or in a theatre might do. The true minister of Christ is an ambassador of God, sent by Him not to please men's fancies and to pander to men's tastes, but to save men's souls, and to treat with men in things pertaining to God and Christ, and eternity. It is to convert; to reconcile man to God ; to instruct the Church; to comfort, and, if need be, to rebuke; that all may be saved, and thus the entire Church may be without spot and blameless. Bear this in mind, beloved, and listen to the ministers of God who are sent to you, not so much to be pleased and delighted, as profited; to be taught, disposed and influenced to keep God's commandments. "He it is " says Christ, " that loveth Me, and such shall be loved of My Father."

In conclusion, allow us to remind you of the importance of family religion. Do not neglect family prayer, nor attend to it hastily or after a slovenly, formal manner. But let it be as the morning and evening sacrifice, a season of delight and means of grace. And let every one in

the family, from the youngest to the eldest, be made to feel and understand that God is one with and in the family, its best friend, its Almighty Protector and Provider, its invisible Head—most wise and loving and kind.

Finally, be strong in the Lord, and in the power of His might. Be sober; touch not, taste not, handle not whatsoever is impure, whatsoever deteriorates, whatsoever is injurious. Remember it is yours to be illuminated with the light divine, inwardly radiant and beautiful with all holy joy and heavenly grace and virtue; and outwardly resplendent in the exhibition of a God-like righteousness, beneficence and mercy.

And may the God of all grace make you perfect, stablish, strengthen, settle you, and may the blessing of the Triune Jehovah be upon you and your children forever. Amen and Amen.
