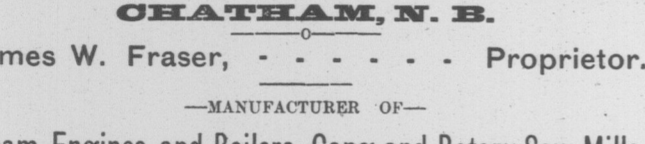

was left in charge, and it is not expected

that he could do everything in a time

when all were at their wits' end and

of full excitement. This splendid charity

was instituted in 1867, and was

founded by the late Stephen Wiggins.

It was opened July 1, 1876, and erected

at a cost of \$80,000. Mr. Wiggins left

this magnificent sum for a male Orphan

Asylum, under certain provisions.

These were, that each child to be admitted

must be born in the City and

County of St. John, preference always

to be shown to fatherless children of

mariners; the children must be not

under the age of four nor over ten years

at the time of admission, and not to be

continued in the institution after reaching

the age of fifteen years. No teacher

could be employed, who was a Unitarian,

Universalist or Roman Catholic, and

no Governor could act in that capacity

if he were of that belief. The

Governors consisted of nine gentlemen.

The British case, the counter case

of that of the United States, and the

British reply have been fully filed, and

the examination of witnesses commenced.

The British case claims:—

First.—That the differences between

the concessions of the old convention

of 1818 and the privileges conferred

by the treaty of 1871 are the subjects

of compensation.

Second.—That these are the right to

enter the great bays, like those of Fundy

and Chaleur, within the lines drawn

for the purpose of fishing, the right

of fishing within the three-mile limit

from the shore, the use of the coast for

the purpose of drying and curing fish,

the privilege of traffic for bait, supplies,

etc., in the Dominion and New-

founded ports, and the right of trans-

shipment of fish from the same.

Third.—That the mackerel fishery

of great value, almost entirely confined

within the three-mile limit, is absolutely

necessary to the United States. The

value of these claims according to official

returns and testimony is estimated

by the British Government at \$14,

280,000 for the 12 years last.

The American counter case replies:—

First.—That the difference between

the treaties of 1818 and 1871 is not a

mere question of the relative advantages

received by either Government under

the treaty of 1871.

Second.—That the right to enter the

headlands of Bay of Fundy and to

belong to the United States.

That the rights of traffic for supplies

transhipment were not conferred

by the treaty of 1871, and is only ex-

ercised permissively, and that even if

granted, it is mutually beneficial.

Third.—That the value of the mack-

erel catch derived from the inshore fish-

eries opened to the United States by

the treaty of 1871, is small, and the

American market could not be con-

trolled by the British Fisheries, even with-

out competition.

Fourth.—That the freedom of the

United States inshore fisheries, the men-

haden fishery, for mackerel bait, free

entry of fish and fish-oil, are sufficient

equivalent for any advantage derived

from the treaty of 1871.

Presentation of an Address to Mr.
