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THE NEW YORK TIMES asserts that it is
stated, in private letters, received from England
that Lord Grey, will return to England so soon as
his recent treaty with the United States is com-
pleted, by the means of all parties—that the Brit-
ish Ministry had not abandoned the intention of
restoring our Royal Highness the Duke of
Cambridge, as Viceroy of Canada and the rest of
British America—that the appointment will not
be formally made until the Duke returns from the
west of way—and that Sir Edmund Head, now
Lieutenant Governor of New Brunswick, will prob-
ably be his locum tenens, holding office until after
the Duke's arrival. The Times adds that there is
some difference of opinion as to the amount of
salary to be paid to the proposed Viceroy. Some
arguing for £12,000 and others in favour of
£5,000 per annum.

The State of Maine (Portland paper) says,
the people of the United States, and especially
those of Maine, have every reason to feel gratifica-
tion at the manner in which Lord Grey has ful-
filled the responsible duties of his office, and to re-
quest his retirement from that exalted station he has so
dignifiedly adorned." This is pretty cool. It is no-
ticed that his Lordship has served the American
much more faithfully and effectively than he has
the Colonies. It was sent to govern, but we scarcely
expected to see the sword so openly made in an
American Journal. The same paper considers Sir
J. Head well qualified to succeed to the Governor-
Generalship, and thus sums up his qualifications—

"A man of elevated taste, he unites to the ac-
complishment of a scholar the saucy and dignity of
a true gentleman. His liberal opinions upon all
questions of internal policy and his thorough
acquaintance with American institutions will render
his appointment highly agreeable to the Canadian
people."

Pine or other lumber shall be continued within
the said Company, or any of them, and which
is fastened to or secured by the said Pier of Booms
or any of them on thy outside thereof. There
