(Editor's Note:—John Nelson Stockwell, M. A., Ph. D., has attracted world-wide attention as the author of scientific papers attacking the nebular hypothesis, and of other works which have earned him the commanding place in science. He is the author of "Memoir on the Secular Variations of the Planetary Orbits," in the Smithsonian Institution's contributions to knowledge, and "Theory of the Mutual Perturbations of Planets Moving at the Same Mean Distance from the Sun, and its Bearing on the Constitution of Saturn's Rings and the Cosmogony of Laplace."

Dr. Cook, approaching the pole (marked "3"), was going toward a place where the sun would be visible at midnight. He says he saw the midnight sun (marked "1" and "2") on April 7, and was at the point marked "4," 234 miles from the pole.

I have taken the best information I could secure as to Dr. Cook's data, and I have undertaken an analysis of what his observations really show.

On March 30, at midnight the sun's declination was 4 degrees 0 minutes of the equator, and it to this we add 35 minutes for refraction, we get the apparent declination of the pole equal to 4 degrees 35 minutes north.

But Dr. Cook tells us that the night of April 7 was "made notable by the swinging of the midnight sun over the beginning of the six months of summer at that place. On April 7, at midnight, the sun's declination may be taken as north 7 degrees 4 minutes, and to this must be added the sun's semi-diameter, 16 minutes, and refraction, 35 minutes, making the declination 13 degrees 55 minutes. In order that the whole sun might appear above the horizon, if then, the sun was in the horizon of some place at midnight, the place must be as far from the equator, and consequently the polar distances must be equal to 7 degrees 55 minutes, the latitude must be 82 degrees 5 minutes.

The British Foreign Office regards this arrangement among the banks as an abandonment of British rights, and apparently is determined to force the Germans to surrender.

BOLIVIA AND PERU REACH SETTLEMENT. Boundary Dispute Settled and South African Embroglio Averted--Countries Exchange Pleasantries. Rio Janeiro, Sept. 15.—The Journal of Commerce in its issue yesterday said that telegrams from the Pacific coast announced that an agreement between the governments of Peru and Bolivia on the recent boundary dispute, which at one time threatened to plunge these states into war, had been, or was on the point of being signed. The basis of the understanding in this dispute is the decision handed down by President Alcedo of Argentina on July 9 last, and this decision is by the terms of the new agreement, recognized by Bolivia.

BRITAIN TO FORCE CRISIS WITH GERMANY. "Gladly," exclaimed the poet today, "I would abandon all things, every body, and say adieu to earth for the joys of ethereal space."
