LATEST FIGURES PLACE BABLY BAMAGED Stem Twisted Almost to Form

FIND THE STORSTAD

Semi-circle - Condition Bears out Statement of Collier's Captain.

Montreal, June 2.-When the Stor stad was relieved of her load of coal at the Dominion Coal Company's dock today it was seen that her stem was twisted so much to starboard that it aimost formed a half-circle. Some of the lower-most plates in her bow were also twisted to starboard and torn away. There is a large indent on either side of the stem, and the rivets are torn away.
