HELD UP AT POINT OF GUN AND FORCED TO RETURN MEN HE WAS HIDING OUT OF KHAKI

St. Andrews Resident Named Loring in Serious Position—Thrilling Experience of Members of No. 4 Pioneer Battalion—Loring Arraigned in Court at St. Andrews.

As the result of clever detective work on the part of Private Hafnenbasher of the No. 4 Pioneer Battalion, quartered at St. Andrews, Frank Loring, a boot and shoe repairer in St. Andrews, was arrested late Wednesday night on the charge of inducing and assisting soldiers to desert, and is now undergoing preliminary examination. It found guilty he can be sentenced to a term of imprisonment for life. Some time ago about a hundred men were transferred from the American Legion Battalion to the Pioneers, and during the past four weeks a large number of them have deserted. Sergeants were put on guard at different points on the Canadian border, including St. Stephen and Milltown, but were unable to stop the desertions, as the deserters were not passing into the United States by the highway. It was then thought by the officers that motor boats were being used to carry the men from the Canadian shore across the St. Croix river to the United States side, and it was decided to watch the river.

Slueth on the Track. Private Hafnenbasher who comes from Northern Ontario, and who has performed considerable detective work before enlisting with the Pioneers, was assigned the task of bringing to justice the person or persons assisting the soldiers to desert. He went to work in a shrewd manner which Privates Fisher and Wilson, he hung around the docks for a couple of days talking with men who owned motor boats, and finally struck on the man who was wanted, viz. Frank Loring. Loring was a former resident of the United States who came to the Canadian side to reside three years ago, and only last June became a naturalized citizen of Canada. Hafnenbasher, Fisher and Wilson got in close conversation with Loring and one subject leading to another, they hinted they were not satisfied and would like to get clear of going overseas.

The Plot in Detail. Loring warmed up to the conversation, and stated to the soldiers that he had a son who wanted to enlist and that he had told him if he wanted to go and get shot that he would take him out in the back yard and shoot him, but he would not allow him to enlist for overseas duty. This was the chance for which the three soldiers were looking and in reply to Loring's statement Private Hafnenbasher said that he and his two companions wished they could get a chance to get away.

Loring fell for the story, and made secret plans for the soldiers to desert. He told them that he would get them clear, and immediately laid before them his plans. He promised to provide three suits of civilian clothing and to have them in his shoe repairing shop. The soldiers were to sneak into the shop at eleven o'clock Wednesday night, when was dark and everything was quiet about St. Andrews. They would attire themselves in the civilian clothes and when the coast was clear Loring would escort them to his motor boat, and would take them down the river, cross the boundary line and would land them safely on the United States shore somewhere near Eastport. The soldiers led Loring to think they were very grateful for his offer, and left the shoe-repairer to complete the plan.

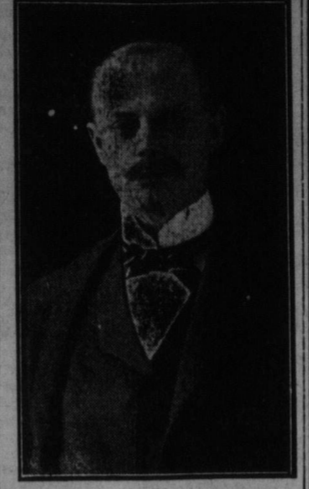
Plans for the Capture. As soon as Hafnenbasher returned to camp, he called on the officer commanding and reported his success. It was now up to the colonel of the battalion to make arrangements for the grand finish of the supposed neatly laid plot. Arrangements were made with Mrs. VanHorne for the use of her motor boat and Lieut. Pawson of the Pioneers with a guard was to take charge of it. The officer was to keep under cover with the VanHorne boat, and as soon as Loring with the deserters left the Canadian shore and neared the boundary line, Pawson was to capture Loring and his companions and place them under arrest.

In accordance with the plan Hafnenbasher and his two companions sneaked into Loring's store, which is next door to the county recorder's office in St. Andrews. Loring was there waiting for the soldiers, they talked softly and very little light was displayed. Loring, true to his promise, had the civilian suits of clothing ready and passed them over to the soldiers. Hafnenbasher and his companions lost no time in getting out of their uniforms, and presented a decided change when they donned 'civvies.'

The Midnight Voyage. When all was ready for a move the party made sure there was no person about the premises, and shortly after eleven o'clock went down to the dock where Loring had a motor boat in waiting. The lines were cast off, Loring started the engine, and, taking the tiller, steered out into the river, and headed down shore and towards the American coast. CHANGES IN THE SUPREME COURT OF N.B.

Understood Mr. Justice McKeown will become Chief Justice—W. B. Chandler to Ascend Bench.



CHIEF JUSTICE MCKEOWN. An unofficial despatch from Ottawa last night forecasted changes in the composition of the Supreme Court of New Brunswick made necessary by the death of Sir P. A. Landry. It is understood that this involves the promotion of Mr. Justice McKeown to the position of Chief Justice of the King's Bench division of the Supreme Court and the appointment of Mr. W. B. Chandler, K.C., of Moncton, to the vacancy as judge of the Supreme Court. Mr. Justice McKeown is so well known in St. John that it is not necessary to speak of his qualifications for the office of Chief Justice. He was a staunch Liberal in politics and was appointed to the bench some years ago by the Liberal government. He is today recognized as one of the best men on the bench and his promotion will meet with general approval. Mr. Chandler was admitted attorney on October 21st, 1876, and a barrister a year later. He bears a very high reputation in his chosen profession and has the complete esteem of all classes. He will be best remembered in St. John by his work as commissioner in the police investigation held here some time ago. Neither of these gentlemen could be reached last night to verify the appointments but it is believed that they will be made as outlined.

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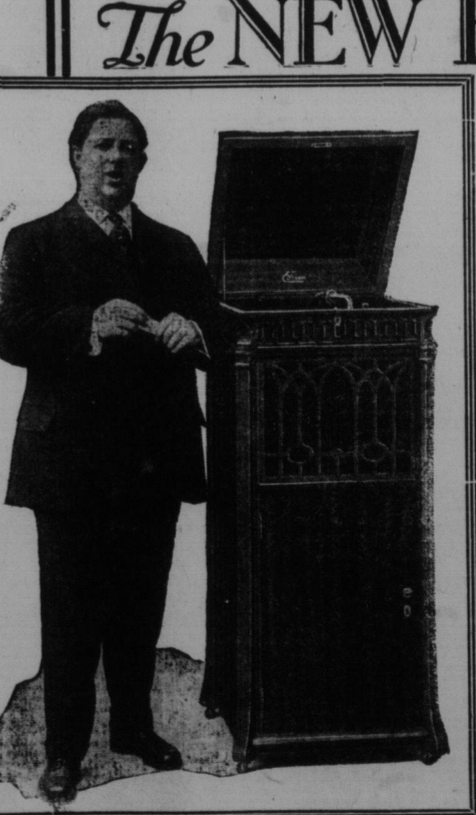

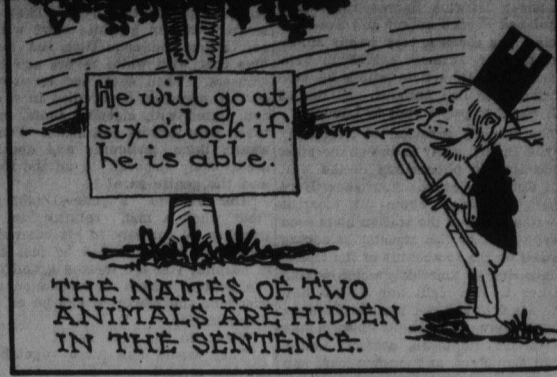
