Sir Arthur Currie aliudes, in this connection to the fighting at Hill 70, and the impression which some people in Canada have formed that the casualties suffered there were the heaviest that the corps had suffered in any engagement and says:

"That was a most ridiculously untrue statement, and from the standpoint of a comparison of our casualties with those we inflicted on the Germans was one of the most, if not the most, successful operations we have ever carried out."

With reference to the fighting in October and November of 1917, he says: "We all know that the casualties were heavy at Passchendaele. Before the battle started, I stated to the higher authorities just what I thought the operations would cost and I was within two hundred of what they actually did cost. We have never fought under worse conditions."

MANY SUBMARINES

Washinston, March 7.—More submarines were destroyed by the Allied and American naval forces in December than Germany was able to build during that month, according to information reaching Washinston. This fact developed today in discussions of the statement made to parliament Tuesday by Sir Eric C. Geddes, First Lord of the British Admiralty, that the submarines were being checked.

Whether succeeding months have shown a net loss in German submarines is not known here. It is believed, however, that the antisubmarine campaign has proved so effective that increased efforts this spring will see a steady decrease in the number of U-boats available to prey on allied and American shipping.

German submarines did not sink a single Italian vessel during the week ending March 2.

ARMY OFFICERS IN FRANCE IMPLICATED WITH GOLDSELL

Examination of Prisoner's Papers Indicates That Others Involved.

New York, Mar. 7.—Indications that a number of French army officers now in France may be implicated with Frank J. Goldsoll, under arrest in Washington, in his alleged larceny of between \$3,500,000 and \$6,600,000 of French government funds paid him as commissions on purchases of automobiles in the United States, have been found in an examination of papers seized in a raid on the office of the Alliance Motors Corporation, it was announced here today by Alfred H. Becker, an assistant attorney general. Washington, Mar. 7.—Efforts of Frank J. Goldsoll, accused of embezzlement of millions of dollars from the French government on war contracts here to have him released from jail in the custody of a United States marshal, were defeated today by United States Commissioner Hitt. Unless other relief can be obtained, Goldsoll will be required to remain in jail until his arraigament March 20.

In Spite of Fact That Formal Treaty of Peace Has Been Signed by Central Powers and the Bolshevik Government Fighting Continues at Various Points Along Eastern Front, Germans Evidently Considering Pact Mere "Scrap of Paper."

Germans Reach Jamburg, a Town Sixty-Eight Miles from Russian Capital, Now Being Evacuated—Turks Aggressors in Asia Minor Against Russians—Huns Negotiate Treaty of Peace with Finland—Japan Silent.

In spite of the fact that a formal treaty of peace has been signed by the Central Powers and the Bolshevik government of Russia fighting continues at various points along the eastern front. That Germany considers the convention she forced Lenine and Trotzky to sign as a "scrap of paper" is evidenced by the announced that the Teutons have reached Jamburg, a town sixty-eight miles from Petrograd. The report of the subsequent partial retirement of the Germans does not lend encouragement to the belief that further invasion of Russia has been abandoned. The United States assador has advised the Russians not to sign the pact.

The text of the peace treaty signed by Rumania serves, too to show that the Central Powers are loath to forego any conquests they may make in Russia. One of the clauses of the Rumanian treaty bound that country to assist in the transport of Teuton forces through Moldavia and Bessarabia on their way to Odessa, the 'granary of Russia.'

Not only are the Teutons advancing against the demoralized Slavs, but the Turks are also aggressors in Asia Minor. Reports state that the Ottoman troops are operating near Trebizond, on the southern shore of the Black Sea.

ALLIED FORCES IN SALONIKI IN DANGER OF EARLY ATTACK HEART AND SOUL

Chancellor of the Exchequer Andrew Bonar Law Makes Detailed Statement to House of Commons-Allies Still Stronger on Western Front Great Britain Has Loaned 1,264,000,000 Pounds to Allies Up to Date.

London, March 7—Great Britain's on the success of the American transloan to her allies up to February 9 had totalled £1,264,000,000, Andrew Bonar Law, chancellor of the exchequer, announced in the House of Commons today. Loans to the dominions had reached the sum of £180,000,000.

The national debt at the end of the financial year, the chancellor said, would not exceed £5,900,000,000.

The average daily expenditure from the beginning of the financial year up to February 9, Mr. Bonar Law set forth, was £6,557,000. The chancellor moved a vote of credit of £600,000,000. bringing up the total credit since the cutbreak of the war to £6,842,000,000.

The treasury has sufficient funds to carry it along for the remainder of the financial year. The new vote is intended to start it on the new year, beginning April 1.

The chancellor said the total of recoverable loans was £206,750,000.
There was an excess of expenditures in the army of £121,000,000 owing to the extension of operations in Mesopotamia and Palestine and the increased cost of commodities.

Mr. Bonar Law said he recognized that what had happened in Russia made it doubtful and would cause a difference of opinion as to what the prospects were of recovering the whole of the money advanced to Russia. The matter could be better discussed in his opinion when the budget was introduced but meanwhile he would treat the sum as recoverable.

Regarding the military situation the chancellor said: "The Germans have transferred thirty divisions from the Russian front. The allies still have a slight superfority in men and guns on the western front, but there is a possibility that the appearance of Austrians there would change this."





Ottawa, Mar. 7.—Canada's net debt stood at \$1,010,780,470 on February 28, an increase during February of \$13,-251,263. The total gross debt of the ominion on February 28 was \$1,996,-93,359. Total assets were \$985,612,-

393,359. Total assets were \$985,612,889.

Let us knope that the epilozue will rehabilitate the good name of our province. But, Sir, if the situation is not too bright we should not despair for we have at the head of our affairs men of some financial ability capable of dealing with problems more insticate than those which they have now to solve.

now to solve.

It is because our fundamental resources is agricolture and it is in that branch that most can be done for the promotion of the welfare of our people that the premier has placed in charge. that the premier has placed in charge of that department a man who not only can combine theory with practical knowledge of farming but realizes the importance of the trust resposed in him. I have no doubt that when the people are educated to turn their attention to farming the most profitable branch of industry the value of our lands will rise above the average price of \$28 per acre. 



CHEAPER AND NO RESTRICTION IN US

cretary of Canadian Auto mobile Association Inter views Authorities on the Subject—Controller at Present Has No Jurisdiction Over Gasoline.

Automobile owners and others who have occasion to use a large quantity of gasoline will be glad to learn that it is most probable that there may be a decrease in the price of gasoline in the near future, and also that there is not any likelihood of action being taken in regard to the restriction in the use of gasoline.

The secretary of the New Brunswick Automobile Association is in receipt of a letter from the secretary of the Canadian Automobile Association is in receipt of a letter from the secretary of the Canadian Automobile Association in which that official gives some news on the question, which should prove of great interest to car owners and others. In part he says:

In view of rumes which have been provalent with regard to a gasoline shortage and restrictions being placed on the use of gasoline in Canada by motorists, while in Ottawa I interviewed the authorities in this regard. I discussed the subject with Assistant Fuel Controller Peterson. Mr. Peterson advised me that the fuel oppsying ou measons and re surjection over gasoline. This jurisdiction could be obtained if desired, but there was no present intention of asking for it. There were a number of good reasons why gasoline imports should not be interferred with, and there was little likelihood that any action what ever concerning the use of gasoline would be taken.

These official statements should be reassuring to the members of the New Brunswick Automobile Association and motorists of Canada in general, particularly when coupled with the statements made by A. C. Bedford president of the Petroleum War Service Committee of the United States, that there is today a large excess production of gasoline incident to the preparation of fuel oil, and that gasoline should be used freely though not wastefully, at otherwise storage capacities would be exhausted.

Car owners will not only be happy to know that there is to be no restriction to the use of gasoline, but will be pleased to believe that the price of the gas will be decreased.

CARRY THE PAPERS OR BE ARRESTED

Men of Military Age Who Have No Papers With Them Showing They Have Complied with M. S. A., Will Be Arrested-Chief Rideout is a Busy Man.
