American Fruit in Europe.

condition. England prefers fresh fruit, and since last October has estimated that England will take an average of from 12,000 to 15,000 barrels a week for the entire season of nine months. The working classes of Germany and the work- BARGAINS ingmen and miners of Australia are the chief customers for Amercan dried fruit abroad, but the poor people of England and Russia buy to a limited extent. As long as dried DRY apples can be exported from New York at five or even seven cents a pound, the workingmen of Europe and Australia will buy all that can be spared. The business of exportbe spared. The business of exporting fruit is one that has been chiefly built up since 1865. In the 11 months ending July 1st, the fruit exported amounted in value to \$2,831,-2000.

Fall Plowing.

When land is plowed in the fall, and till spring without harrowing, it may be sown to any kind of spring grain, after being well harrowed and the crops in most cases will be as stock such as is kept in any first class Boot and Shoe Store. Buyers will do well to compare my prices with others. grain, after being well harrowed and good as if the land were plowed under in the spring. Stable dung, when plowed, under in the fall for a hand provided stock of Groceries and Provisions, Tarred Paper. Paints. Zinc, Nails, Spikes. etc. should be sown broad-cast in the spring, and harrowed in, unless one sows seed with a drill that deposits and covers the fertilizers at the same time. If it were not for the great hurry that farmers are subject to in our short springs, it would not be of any advantage to plow light, loamy soils in the fall; but in consequence of not having time, in many cases, to plow all the land in the spring one desires to cultivate, it is desided. ly advisable in some cases to plow in the fall, especially clayey soils which are greatly benefited by being thrown up to the action of the frosts of winter. It often occurs that a field As my fall and winter goods will arrive in the spring is too wet to plow when the seed should go in; and such land if plowed in the fall, would be in GOODS at a good condition to harrow in the SMALL ADVANCE spring, and the crop would be better for the fall plowing.

Greasing Axles.

On the authority of the Carriage Monthly, more injury is done to carriages and wagons by greasing too much than the reverse. Tallow is the best lubricant for wood axles, and castor oil for iron. Lard and common grease are apt to penetrate the hub, and work their way out around the tenons of the spokes and spoil the wheel. For common wood axles to the spindle to give it a light coating. To oil an iron axle, first wipe A Full Stock of clean with a cloth wet with turpentine, and then apply a few drops of castor oil near the shoulder and end. One teaspoonful is enough for the four wheels.
