Those competent to judge say that there should be no difficulty in erecting right here just the class of freighters the British Government is asking for.

### JUDGMENTS GIVEN IN RESTIGOUHE CASES

Graphic Loses Appeal in Libel Action—Prescott Co. Case Also

Fredericton, Mar. 16.—The appeal division of the Supreme Court delivered judgment this afternoon.

In the matter of Colquhoun vs. the Graphic, on appeal from the Restigouche County Circuit. The application of counsel on behalf of the Graphic to set aside the verdict of the trial judge was refused.

In the matter of Trafton vs. Deschene, another appeal from the Restigouche County Circuit, where judgment was given for the defendant, the court set aside the verdict of the trial judge and ordered that judgment be entered for the appellant.

In the matter of the Prescott Lumber Company vs. Jardine and Clinch, the judgment of the trial for the respondents was sustained.

The following letter shows the esteem in which the late John Court was held in his battalion.

North Battleford, Sask.,  
March 1st, 1917.

Dear Mr. and Mrs. Court:

As Chaplain of the battalion to which your dear son belonged I thought you might appreciate a little word from me relating particularly to his last days with us.

Little did we think when first visiting him that his illness was so soon to end as it did. It appeared like a bad case of biliousness or something of that kind. But as the days passed it revealed itself as something much more serious. I saw him on Saturday before he died and though he appeared very sick the doctor in charge thought he was some better. I could scarcely believe there could be such a change as I saw on Sunday when I called. I saw at once that he was dying. He was however quite conscious and rational. He fully realized that he was near the end and wished me to pray with him. He repeated every word after me like a little child. A little while afterwards I went out and had a talk with the nurse. She spoke quite frankly to him and told me that he fully realized that he was dying but that he was reconciled and not afraid to die. In speaking to those who knew him best they all said he was such a good living lad and that he would be greatly missed.

As a stranger I can say but little but I want to assure you of my Christian sympathy and the sympathy of every officer and the men of the Battalion. We had a short service this morning and then marched in a body to the train. Our prayer is that the God of all comfort and grace will comfort your hearts. You and your noble sons are playing a worthy part in the great cause and the God whose cause it is will freely reward you. May He be near you in your sorrow and loneliness and give you strength to bear it.

### POSTMASTER GENERAL HAS RESIGNED

Celebrated Nationalist Gives Up Cabinet Position to Go Overseas

Ottawa, March 20.—Hon. P. E. Blondin, Postmaster General, has tendered his resignation. Sir George Foster has called the same to Sir Robert Borden.

Mr. Blondin has resigned for the purpose of enlisting in the overseas forces. He has written a letter to the Minister of Militia and Defence in the following terms:

Ottawa, March 20, 1917

"Dear Sir Edward: I must inform you that I have put my resignation as Postmaster General in the hands of the Acting Premier in order to offer my services in the overseas forces. I am writing to put myself at your orders and consequently I apply for enlistment in the overseas forces of Canada.

Sir Edward King proposes to ask Mr. Blondin to recruit a battalion for service at the front as a part of the Canadian expeditionary force.

### BONAVENTURE SOLDIER DIED IN WEST

Remains Were Brought to His Home, Escumac, for Burial March 9th.

Shoreham, Sussex, Feb. 24th, 1917.  
 Miss Emma Marquai Secy. Women's Institute, Dalhousie, N. B.  
 Dear Miss Marquai:—  
 I hope you will pardon delay in acknowledging receipt of stockings and cigarettes sent the Dalhousie boys by the Institute. By the time these arrived the land had been broken up and two drafts had gone to France one to the 42nd Highlanders and the second to the 8th Montreal Battalion and were training behind the firing line for the greater struggle of their lives.  
 I was in France at the time and consequently it was late in January before I could unpack the box and mail the presents to the men. I suppose you have received acknowledgments from many by this time. I want to thank the Institute for mine and on behalf of the boys, especially those who may be unable to do so, not to be able to reply, for life is uncertain in this game.  
 One hundred and four Senior Officers were sent to France on a Course of Instruction, and then to be used on these Reserve Battalions which are formed on the English System. We had our Christmas in La Havre in France and the first day of 1917 was spent in the front line of trenches in Northern France. I shall never forget this day and the day following. On the second day Fritz got busy and threw all kinds of articles at us, thinking he had it all his own way, until noon, when the Canadian Artillery opened up with what they have. They threw such a variety of "Peace Proposals" at the Hunns that they were glad to shut up and repair damaged trenches. We had all the experience of trench life, except going over "No Man's Land" in "Raids" which are the usual pastime there.  
 It was a great experience for us, but after three weeks, orders come to return to England for duty. We shall have more of this later, for time will draw us all into the great Maelstrom now surging in one of the fairest Countries of the world, Sunny France. "The Chosen home of chivalry, the garden of Romance."  
 The first Draft went to the 42nd Highlanders; and the second, to the 87th Battalion. Both of these Battalions are Montreal Unites. I saw the boys of the 42nd Battalion about January 5th. They were happy, well clothed, well fed, and well trained. At that time they had been in the trenches only 42 hours as a "try out" to accustom themselves to conditions vastly different to anything they have ever experienced before. There is

no fear that kind which makes cowards of us all. They would like to be quiet, but their little "oug cut" gives the busy people for the time. They would like to see one another but those who will not put on the U.N.I.O. are men of the hour with a philosophy and a theology of their own. I am speaking of the men as I found them in the trenches. One has to be with them to see their true worth in the light of stirring times, live with them to learn their resourcefulness and courage. It is a mighty game and the Canadians know how to play it as well as the best, but the task is great and the foe is strong.

The remnants of the 132nd 104th 100th a r. e. l. division 149th from St. John, 149th and 145th have been made into the 13th Reserve Battalion under Lt. Col. W. Fowler of Sussex N. B. to train men and officers to reinforce the 26th New Brunswick Battalion under Lt. Col. A. E. G. McKenzie at the front. Also the new 104th which is the amalgamation of the old 104th and 106th. We have moved from Bramshott in Surrey to Shoreham in Sussex, the land of the Downs and pleasant undulations.

We had a pleasant surprise a few days ago when we had Lt. Col. McKenzie with us. He has done well and if spared will continue to do so. I can assure you we are proud of him here.

The 132nd has disappeared except a few cap badges bear witness to its once existence. No Company officers were sorry when the change came as they were well "fed up." The boys who went to France have been highly spoken of and some have already given their all. The officers who have taken courses in the various schools have completed most favorably with officers from other Battalions, but one lacked something from the beginning and that was never supplied until the 13th Reserve Battalion was formed.

I would suggest to those who have friends and relations over here and especially in France, write, and keep on writing. You do not know how hard it is for the boys to find time and suitable place to write. It cheers them to hear from home. How nice it is to receive a nice pair of stockings filled with cigarettes, a half dozen handkerchiefs, a tasty cake, some fudge, something they liked when home. You know little if anything about destitution in Canada. Of course the boys are not in want as they are well paid, but it is wonderful the amount of pay that is assigned home by the boys of the 132nd. Some have reserved but little for themselves. Those who came before us have put up the barrier. We shall have to see it is kept up for so many have become toil worn and cannot do more.





After this sum had been disposed of, the Society only had twenty-five (\$0.25) cents in hand. Since then, October 1st 1916, as shown in the above statement, the sum of \$728.90 has been realized. Needless to say that this has not been done without considerable effort, and was only made possible by the kind and hearty co-operation of one and all. Too much praise cannot be extended to our zealous President, Mrs. George Kempfer who succeeded in collecting the sum of \$149.03 which was expended in sending sixty-seven Christmas boxes to our boys at the front.
