Thomas P. O'Connor's Interest ing Reminiscences.

Statement of the Late Leader's Attendant Physicians.

No Autopsy on the Body Necessary-The League's Condolence.

London, Oct. 8.—The Right Honorable Joseph Chamberlain, when interviewed regarding Mr. Parnell's death, said it might influence the Government to go to the country on the present legislation, but it was more likely the Government will endeavor to pass the Irish Government Bill with a fair prospect that it could be done if the Opposition would adopt the same attitude towards this bill as they had done to the English local election measure, but it would be, he thought, late in 1892 before the measure could become law.

TAKEN BY SURPRISE.

As far as known Parnell did not leave a will nor a political declaration. He had no perception of the gravity of his illness or any consciousness of the approach of death.

LONDON, Oct. 8.—A dispatch from Brighton sent at 3 p.m., says the doctor's certificate which has just been filed states that Mr. Parnell's death was caused by rheumatic fever, resulting in excessive temperature and failure of the heart.

A PUBLIC FUNERAL.

It was eventually decided at the family council, held this afternoon, that Mr. Parnell's remains shall be accorded a public funeral, and that the body shall be interred at Avendale, county Wicklow, Ireland, where the dead leader was born.

LONDON, Oct. 9.—Among the reminimences of Parnell is a contribution from Thomas Power O'Connor, M. P. for the Scotland division of Liverpool. Mr. Power heard while in America that during Mr. Parnell's visit to the United States the Irish leader met at Newport one of the reigning beauties of the season; that he fell in love with and proposed marriage to her and was conditionally accepted. He suddenly lost fiesh and became terribly thin and ghastly pale. He used to disappear for a day at a time, and then would drag himself to the house with glassy eye, emaciated face and tottering walk—the picture of coming death. A stern silence was, however, maintained between him and his colleagues in relation to these incidents. As a rule he would speak when he felt the inclinations to one of them whom he had just before dencunced as a coward and a traitor, as if absolutely nothing had occurred to disturb the pleasant relations existing between them. I met him accidentally for the first time after my return from America. After a handshake I asked how he was. His reply was: 'Oh, perfectly well; much better than you are.' 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

CIRCUMSTANTIAL EVIDENCE. he Ottawa rulers charged with robbing the Dominion Treasury for the benefit of themselves, or their retainers, and for re plenishing the bribery fund by which the Ministers have been continued in office, i worthy of notice.

The view is adopted by Mr. Chapleau, who has been in Quebec working up an agitation in favor of his being made chief of the greatest spending department in charge of the Administration, that there has really been no serious dereliction of duty, and that the evidence that Ministers and their associates have been plundering the coun try is really an hallucination in the minds of prejudiced newspaper editors and intermeddling clergymen. Well, it has been clearly proved that the taxpayers have been plundered of hundreds of the dollars under the very noses of Mr. Chapleau and his associates, who have each been paid \$8,000 a year to insure the honest expenditure of the money placed at their dis posal by Parliament. Do these facts prove that the offenses have been trifling, and that the ministers of the Gospel, who demand that the commandment "Thou shalt not steal" must be obeyed, should be blackguarded by the Chapleaus and the Haggarts? Assuredly not.

But, it is further argued, the complicity

of members of the Dominion Governmen can only be proved by circumstantial evience. Admitting that such is the ca and there is proof to the contrary, why should not overwhelming circumstantis evidence not be valued in cases of peculation by persons in authority as well as in cases of murder?

If circumstantial evidence had been rejected in the Benwell murder case, Birchall would have been to-day a free man, still engaged in living by his wits. The evidence of complicity in the robbery of the Dominion treasury is effectively brought home to Sir Hector Langevin, Mr. Dewdney and their associates who have whitewashed them in face of strong evidence, or burked further inquiry into their wrong doing. It is as strongly maintained as was the circumstantial evidence that Birchall slew his confiding victim. There were some missing links, for both Sir Hector and the notorious McGreevy destroyed their tell-tale correspondence, but while human nature is human nature it cannot be expected that either cunning murderers or practiced peculators will fail to destroy as many of their tracks as possible.

T., Oct. 8.—At yester-day's session of the Mormon conference a lengthy set of resolutions were adopted relative to the statement made by a majority of the Utah Commission in a recent report to the Secretary of the Interior. The resolutions further declare that the members of the conference don't believe that there have been any polygamous marriages solemnized among the Latter Day Saints during the period named by the commission, and, denounce the statements which convey the idea that such marriages have been contradicted as false and misleading.
