Blame. VIENNA, June 8 .- The Austrian Social Democratic Congress has made a report on the Berkenberg mine disaster, in which it the Berkenberg mine disaster, in which it is alleged that the immense loss of life in the mine was due to the officials driving the miners back from the shart when they were trying to escape after the fire broke out. The officials, the report declares, told the men there was no danger, and persisted in the face of many appeals made to them in their refusal to allow the men egress from them in the strength of th the mine. It is also stated that when the the mine. It is also stated that when the fire engines were got out there was no water available. The report that the fire was started by incendiarier is absolutely without foundation. The probable cause of the fire was the ignition by lighted tapers of a wooden altar that had been erected in one of the lower galleries by the miners in honor of the patron saint of Bohemia.

LONDON, June 8 .- Another scion of Irish nobility is in the clutches of the law. The alleged offender is Sir Gilbert Edward Campbell, of Carrick-Buoy, Ballyshannon, county of Donegal. Sir Gilbert Edward is third in the line of baronets of the name. He is a Tory, and is a member of the Constitutional Club. He was arraigned at the Bow Street Police arraigned at the Bow Street Police Court on the charge of defrauding authors by obtaining money from them under pretext of publishing their works. Two others are charged with being concerned with the baronet in the fraud, and were also arraigned with him. Sir Gilbert Edward is about 54 years of age. He was formerly a captain in the Ninety-second Highlanders. Evidence was presented sufficient to justify a remand, and the case was continued.

"Poobah" in Samoa.

LONDON, June 8 .- The Times publishes letter from Robert Louis Stevenson describing alleged misgovernment in Samoa. Mr. Stevenson asserts that Chief Justice Cedercanz and Baron Pilsach, president of the Municipal Council of Apia, have made their salaries preferred claims upon the Samoan treasury, which is usually found empty after the two officials have got through with it. In order to enable them to secure this cinch on the national finances the chief justice and the haron overthrew a decision requiring that customs receipts shall be paid to the municipal authorities of Apia. Mr. Stevenson adds that "Baron Pilsach, as adviser of the King, wrote a letter to himself reprimanding himself as president for consenting to the decision, got the King's signature to scribing alleged misgovernment in Samoa

this letter, and brought an action against himself before Justice Cedercranz. Nobody was present at the trial but the judge and Baron Pilsach. Judge Cedercranz reversed his decision, and thus enabled Baron Pilsach to demand that the municipal authorities surrender the money to the Government. FRANKFORT, June 9 .- The Rothschilds have through the aid of the police and of their own detectives, succeeded in recovering about 1,500,000 marks of the 1,750,000 marks embezzled by their former cashier, Jaeger, who absconded and was recently captured in Alexandria. Eight members of Jaeger's family are under arrest on suspicion of having shated his stealings, or at least, of having some knowledge which would aid the authorities in bringing the guilty man to justice, and in reimbursing the bankers for their loss.

Gladstone Expects to Win. LONDON, June 9 .- Mr. Gladstone spoke nexpectedly to day on current issues before a party of Liberal excursionists at fore a party of Liberal excursionists at Hawarden. He said that the Liberals had won every great political battle of the last 50 years. "The Conservatives now admit," he continued, "that all these victories have benefited the country, including our free trade victory, although it seems, according to recent statements in high quarters, that they are about to change their minds again on this point. This does not matter, however. The Liberals, please God, will win in the coming battle. They certainly have never had a greater, more sacred, and more hopeful cause."

The clerk was instructed to have the resolution suitably engrossed, framed and forwarded to the family of Mr. Mackenzie.

WRECKED ON THE ISLE OF JERSEY.

London, June 9.—The Steamer Alert, bound for the Island of Jersey, in the English Channel, and loaded with excursionists, has been wrecked in a fog at La Corbiere Point, on the island. When the passengers heard that the vessel was stranded a frightful panic occurred. Most of the passengers seemed to think that they

One of them rushed to the captain and offered him a gold watch if the captain would save him. Scores of women fell on their knees and begged heaven for mercy. One young women who had evidently come to the excursion with some other man than her husband confessed her folly before all on board, and cried that if heaven only spared her life she would never do so again.

The frantic people rushed hither and thither, seizing the belts and clambering into lifeboats in such numbers that the crew were helpless to get the lifeboats in working order. Fortunately the Alert did not go down, but held together, although badly damaged. The people on shore saw the wreck, and fishermen put out in their boats to save the people. By the time they got to the Alert several passengers were attempting to jump from the steamer into the water, while the crew were making every effort to hold them back. Exactly why they should want to jump was difficult to understand, as they were perfectly safe for the time on board and would probably have been do waned in taking every passenger ashore without the loss of a life. The steamer is not breaking up, and may perhaps be saved.

THE WEEK'S MARKETS.

Something Like a Big Gamble in the Cattle Trade.

Better Prices Obtained in the British Markets.

Fall in Cheese-Butter Dull and Heavy -Egg Trade Very Weak.

[Special to the ADVERTISER.] MONTREAL, June 8.—I think that the de-velopments of the past week have proved cattle dealers to be a lot of gamblerswerse than or as bad as any plungers in the grain pit on the Stock Exchange. Notwithstanding the unfavorable reports from the other side, and the very blue outlook for the first month's trade in Canadian cattle, the western drovers went into the country and bought right and left at prices ranging from 5c to 5½. They no doubt got the idea into their noddles that the large exporters would require all the cattle they could lay hands on to fill their June space, but they were sadly mistaken. There were more cattle in the country than they expected, and when the shippers managed to get about 17,000 head out, not counting distillers, up to the end of May, they got frightened, at least that is how things look, for cattle are coming forward at such a rate now that prices have declined over ½c. The drovers, no doubt, came to the conclusion that the bad British markets would not allow of their shipping, and preferred withstanding the unfavorable reports from

PROPOSED GRANT TO MESSRS
PRITCHARD AND POWELL.

The proposition to pay Messrs. Pritchard and Powell for their services as members of the City of London Trust, has given rise to a good deal of averse criticism, and we are not surprised that the City Council hesitates before establishing a pre-

Messrs. Pritchard and Powell were ap pointed members of the City of London Trust under an act passed in 1885 to "authorize the Corporation of the City of London to borrow certain moneys." In conjunction with the mayor, they were constituted trustees for the proper disposal of the old military grounds, accepted by the city in its dicker with Mr. Carling for military school and camp grounds. The Act of Parliament defined their duties, and at section 7 set forth that they were to serve without pay, the enactment reading :

"The said trustees shall be a corporation, to be called and known as the City of Lon-don Trust, and shall not be cutilled to any remuneration for their services."

Nothing could be more specific than that. It is here clearly set forth that the City of London Trust is to be regarded as an ordinary municipal body, and that there may be no doubt on the subject it is stipulated that the trustees shall not be paid. As the ADVERTISER has always under-

stood it, membership in the Trust was an honor sought after, just as other municipal positions are. But, it has been argued in defense of the grants now asked for, the trustees have been successful in their efforts. They have acted with prudence and caution, and have made the best possible bargain for the city. Granted that they have; is not that what they were elected for? The citizens desire no man to serve them unwillingly, or on any other ground than that he shall use his best mergies to conserve their interests. Surely civic business in London has not been so badly managed that when one section of the representatives of the people have done their work in an unexceptionable manner, as we all cheerfully admit the London Trust has done, it is necessary to contra-vene a law to reward them for their services. We have a Hospital Trust. The trustees serve without pay. They have done much work for the benefit of the taxpayers, and have been contented with the honor. We have a Water Commission. No one can say that the com-missioners have not done very good work for the city, spending much valuable time in its performance. But it has not been proposed that Messrs. Davis, Jones, Essery, or the other commissioners who have from time to time served shall be remunerated for their services. The same remarks can be applied to the Board of Aldermen and to the School Trustees. These bodies may not always succeed in giving complete satisfaction to their constituents, but, in the main, it will be conceded they do their What, if the precedent is set, will hinder their members from setting up a

demand for monetary remuneration While fully appreciating the services of the gentlemen who have been members of the Trust, the ADVERTISER feels that it would be dangerous to set the precedent now suggested. If all our public bodies cannot be paid, it is only fair to pay none of them.

AN ELECTRIC RAILWAY FOR LON-DON. The Advertises publishes news of great

importance to the citizens of London today. As a result of the offer of a new company to establish a system of electric railways in the city, the president of the London Street Railway Company has written that his company is prepared to make the necessary extensions and to convert its present system into one run by electricity instead of horses. The privilege of extending its lines to all streets on which another company offers to establish lines, is given the company in its charter, and President Cronyn frankly expresses the intention of his company to provide all reasonable extensions.

What advances have been made through man's inventive genius since the old street railway company received its charter in 1875! Then it was a difficult matter to get any one to build a street railway, and when a charter was obtained the stock had not many takers. So anxious were the people to have the change that they cheerfully accepted a car service every half-hour, and thought they were doing pretty well. When the railway opened, it was laid down by law that the company should not use any other traction power except horses or mules. It was feared that it might introduce steam, and scare the horses. Electricity as a motor was then practically untried. Now it is superseding the horse in every progressive city in the country, to the great advantage of the people.
London could not, therefore, stay behind. The new system will be a vast
improvement in point of speed on the old one, which has had its day and has been appreciated by the public, especially in the very warm and very cold weather. It will be costly at the start, but the company expects to recompense itself in some measure by the much-increased traffic. While the horse and driver will be dispensed with, the company will have to maintain its electric plant and its system of trolleys, and also provide three men for each car—two motor men (one to relieve car) and a conductor. Dear Sir,—Re London Street Railway Company and proposed extension.

The letter written by you on the 14th ult. under the direction of the Municipal Council of the City of London and addressed to me as president of the London Street Railway Company, has been laid before the directors of this company, who intrust me to acknowledge receipt of such letter and to state:

1. That this railway company accepts the option contained in that letter, and will proceed with the work of extension, as indicated in such letter, on the conditions contained in the bylaw passed on March 8, 1875, by the Municipal Council of the City of London and referred to in your letter.

2. The extensions referred to in your letter, and adopted by this company in its acceptance, will of course necessitate the introduction of the electric system in that part of the city on which at present the railway is operated by horse-power. This company takes for granted, in the very request of the city, that in the extensions the propulsive power shall be electricity, and that this system shall be made uniform throughout the city, for otherwise there would be the necessity of changing from ear to car, and difficulties would arise as to double fares and transfers. We understand, therefore, that the request, as presented, involves this further, which will make a complete and uniform system throughout the city.

3. The company is not aware whether or not the corporation has considered the

3. The company is not aware whether or not the corporation has considered the difficulties that may arise in attempting to carry on this work, which involves the crossing in six places of the Grand Trunk Railway, the Canadian Pacific Railway and the Michigan Central Railway. I need scarcely call the attention of the corporation to the fact that each individual crossing is, if possible, to be avoided, as it involves danger to the lives of the citizens, and also large additional expense in guarding the crossing, so as to endeavor to prevent accident. The steam railway companies are so convinced of this that they have in the past objected very strenuously to such crossings, and will doubtless, in view of the number of proposed crossings, oppose them in every legitimate way. It would he well, therefore, to consider whetherthe extensions suggested could not be made equally convenient for all purposes of the city, by utilizing the present crossings, whereby the opposition of the steam railway companies to the proposed extension might be avoided.

4. It is also suggested that it would be well worthy of the best consideration of the corporation, whether some of the lines proposed in the extensions do not unnecessarily run parallel to other lines at present in existence, and se close to them that they are unnecessary, and also whether in and through another system the street railway lines might not be extended to other parts of the city not indicated in the proposal.

These are matters on which the directors of this company will be glad to meet the members of the council or a committee appointed for the purpose of considering them, as the company feel that their interest and that of the city are identical in relation thereto.

"The farmers want cheaper tools, clothing and household necessities; and they want Government aid in reaching the British market. They have but to join hands and both parties will be eager to adopt their programme. The inanufacturers were few, and so had to campaign for votes. The farmers need do nothing but organize and vote."

Farmers complain that manufacturers Farmers complain that manufacturers have formed combines to enhance the profits of their industries. The complaint is an honest one, for the results of the manufacturers' combination is most disastrous. Other people suffer in order that the members of the several combines may derive an unnatural profit. The law that not only sanctions such combinations but surfaces them into existence is an iniquit-

nurtures them into existence is an iniquitous one.

If a man utters a complaint against such combines merely because he is their victim he is dishonest. If he is willing to enjoy the fruits of villainy and share the spoils fliched by the combines from the enforced purchasers of their productions he manifests the insincerity of his complaint and allows the stamp of selfishness and dishoner to be branded upon his foresheed.

The existence of rings and unboly combinations renders a counter-combination necessary, but such a combination must not be of a similar nature. The need of the day is men of principle who are not so selfish that they are inclined to secure gain at the expense of others.

The Order of Patrens is a combination formed to protect the interests of members without unfairly curtailing the privileges or profits of others. The protection desired by its members is dissimilar to that expected by the members of a manufacturers' combine. One erganization aims to make greater profits at the expense of the people, while the other is an organization of the people formed to curtail the amount paid to a manufacturers' combine. One combine endeavors to make money and the other to save it.

THE SALT CONTRACT CLOSED.

[From the Canada Farmers' Sun.]

The negotiations to obtain salt on the terms agreed upon at the Grand Association meeting in Toronto had been so far completed last week in the hands of Grand Trustee Forster, of Markham, who is acting in this matter on behalf of the Patrons, that it may be safely announced that the contract has now been closed.

A few remarks may be timely in this connection. Many of those who signed the agreements for salt did so expecting to be able to purchase this year at the Patron rate, and owing to the delay in closing the contract. have purchased elsewhere, and a few have written to have their names removed from the contracts. This cannot be done by the Grand Executive Board, as all who signed have become contracting parties and are parties to the agreement with the Ontario Salt Company, whose connection with the salt combine ceased on June 1; nor is it necessary that any Patron should withdraw, as their interests will be fully protected.

The contract made by every one whose signature has been attached to the agreement is that he will purchase annually for three years the number of barrels of salt specified. If it is too late in the season to use land salt this year, the privilege expected this season will be continued in 1895, as well as in 1893 and 1894. The contract will cover three full years, and three season's salt may be purchased by each and every contractor.

The arrangement completed is an excellent one, and the delay in its execution has been unavoidable.



AFTER THE FIRE-FLOOD.

Business at Oil City Resumed—The Dead Buried Out of Sight.

Buried Out of Sight.

Oil City, Pa., June 9.—After four days of excitement, violent grief and well performed duties to the dead and the living, this place has resumed business, and recovered its lost nerve and is now ready to look the future in the face with faith and hope. Activity is returning and the nervous dread and fear have gone. This morning seven unknown and unclaimed dead were buried. All the dead recovered up to noon yesterday have been buried, but the sad ceremonies are not yet over, as there are several in the hospital who will die. Up to 11 o'clock to-day, the relief fund of Oil City amounts to \$31,769, and of Titusville to \$31,825.
