Fierce Fighting in Egypt.

CAIRO, Jan 3.—The body of dervishes which recently attacked Gemai near Wady-Halfa was overtaken near Ambigot yester-day by a detachment of Egyptian cavalry and a fierce battle ensued. The dervishes, who greatly outnumbered the Egyptians, made several furious onslaughts on the made several furious onslaughts on the Government troops, but were finally repulsed with heavy loss. Many dervishes were slain. Capt. Pyne, of the British staff, and 45 Egyptians, including an officer, were killed, and many others were wounded. A detachment of Egyptian cavalry, with British officers, has arrived at Ambigot since the battle took place, and further reinforcements have been despatched to the scene of the conflict.

The British Columbia Crofter scheme is affected by this declaration, and as a consequence the Crofter Company, which proposed to establish a Crofter colony and provide the members with means for making a living, which would be to the mutual advantage of both the company and its settlers, is still unformed, and the company has been compelled to obtain an extension of time of one year for its formation.

London, Jan. 3.—The Rev. Dr. Joseph Parker's sermon at City Temple on Sunday was intended, as he said, to be a collection of messages to the various classes of the

His first message, he said, was to preachers, who must redouble their efforts to tell the truth to rich and poor alike, and not fear to expose corruption in high places.



MANITOBA SCHOOL QUESTION. A Granton correspondent asks for some facts with regard to the decision of the British Privy Council on the Manitoba separate schools question.

The Privy Council decided, upon the evidence and arguments submitted to them, that though two classes of public schools, known as Protestant and Catholic, existed prior to 1870, when the territory was added to the Dominion, they were not established by law at the time when the Province was admitted to the Confederation as were Protestant separate schools in Quebec and Catholic separate schools in Ontario, and therefore were not guaranteed to the people of the Province under the act of Confederation, which can only be changed by the Imperial Parliament. In 1871, however, the Legislature of Manitoba passed an act dividing the Province into 24 electoral districts. Each electoral district was constituted a school district. Twelve electoral divisions, "comprising mainly a Protestant popula-tion," were to be considered Protestant school districts, and twelve, "comprising mainly a Roman Catholic population," were to be considered Roman Catholic school districts. This system of denominational education, more or less modified, was maintained with full vigor until 1890, when the Legislature passed the measure providing that the schools should be free schools and entirely non-sectarian. 
