Strikes Denounced.

BELFAST, Sept. 6.—At the Trades' Union Congress in Ulster Hall yesterday the new president spoke at length concerning the president spoke at length concerning the labor question in the United Kingdom. He believed, he said, that trades' unionism was destined to be an honored instrument in freeing Ireland from the terrible incubus of religious bigotry and political intolerance. He denounced strikes as criminal folly in all cases where the resources of civilization had not been exhausted in efforts to avoid the use of such extreme measures. He also spoke of strikes as the "forlorn hopes" of the working people. He expressed the hope that the results obtained by the royal labor commission from their investigations would be crystallized in a system of conciliation and arbitration which would make industrial warfare far more infrequent than it now is.

A dividend of 35 shillings per £50 share was declared. Mr. H. J. G. Kendall, member of the court of directors, presided. Mr. Kendall, in the course of his remarks to the meeting, referred to the satisfactory freedom from all financial panic exhibited by Canata at the present time, when so much depression existed elsewhere. Is On the Wrong Side-Expenses Away Move Receipts.

Washington, D. C., Sept. 6.—Government receipts are still running low this month, the receipts from customs yesterday, \$79,000, being the lowest for any one day since war times. The total revenues for the six days of this month aggregate only \$3,890,000 or about \$650,000 a day, while the expenditures foot up \$4,900,000 or more than \$500,000 per day. Because the expenditure continues to exceed the receipts the treasury balance, which, on \$ept. 1, including the gold reserve, was \$107,000,000 has declined to \$105,500,000. The delegates were welcomed to the city by Mayor Desjardines and Ald. Prefontaine. George T. Beales, president, replied on behalf of the congress. "In looking over the field of labor at some and abroad, I feel safe in assuming that we have cause for congratulation. We in Canada have not, I regret to say, made the progress I would wish. For this there are doubtless many causes, but speaking for Ontario, the chief cause doubtless arises from the exodus from our shore ifor the Republic to the south of us of our members, who have failed, owing to depression in trade, to find work. Still we must not feel depressed or disheartened. The influence of organized workers is no mean factor in public affairs, whether federal, provincial or municipal; the work goes bravely on despite all difficulties. Let me beseech you then on your return to your different constituencies to renew your efforts among your fellows and to make every exertion to infuse new vitality into our grand humanitarian movement.

HOW TO SEVER PASTORAL TIES. The Windsor Record says Baptist congregations solve the problem, "How to Sever Pastoral Ties," by a specific engagement from year to year. We were aware that such a method prevailed in individual Baptist churches, and would be glad to know from some authoritative source, as a matter of information, how general the custom is. There is no trouble in severing the pastoral tie by hook or crook, and the Record misses our point. A strong-minded congregation might pick up its pastor bodily and deport him into another county, or it might fire him upwards in a chariot of dynamice. But our problem was this: How to sever pastoral ties with the least friction, and with a minimum of humilitation and a maximum of dignity all around. In the case of those denominations whose usage has been a pastorate of indefinite length, we suggested a five years term (to be terminated earlier by mutual consent)this term of five years to be renewable, if both parties so desire. In our opinion such a course would shorten no desirable pastorate, while it would afford a convenient and dignified method of severing the pastoral relation.



We, the Liberal party of Canada, in convention assembled declare:
That the customs tariff of the Dominion

That the customs tariff of the Dominion should be based, not as it now is, upon the protective principle, but upon the requirements of the public service.

That the existing tariff, founded upon an unsound principle and used as it has been by the Government as a corrupting agency, wherewith to keep themselves in office, has developed monopolies, trusts and combinations:

It has decreased the value of faith was other landed property;
It has oppressed the masses to the enrichment of the few;
It has checked immigration;
It has caused great loss of population;
It has impeded commerce;
It has discriminated against Great Britain.

Britain.

In these, and in many other ways, it has occasioned great public and private injury, all of which evils must continue to grow in ntensity so long as the present tariff systen

remains in force.

That the highest interests of Canada demand a removal of this obstacle to our country's progress, by the adoption of a second fiscal policy, which, while not doing injustice to any class, will promote domestic and foreign trade and hasten the return of prosperity of our people. That to that end, the tariff should be reduced to the needs of honest, economical

and efficient government. That it should be so adjusted as to make

That it should be so adjusted as to make free, or to bear as lightly as possible upon the necessaries of life and should be so arranged as to promote freer trade with the whole world, more particularly Great Britain and the United States.

We believe that the results of the protective system have grievously disappointed thousands of persons who honestly supported it, and that the country in the light of experience is now prepared to declare for a sound fiscal policy.

The issue between the two political parties on this great question is now clearly defined.

defined.

The Government themselves admit the failure of their fiscal policy, and now profess their willingness to make some changes, but they say that such changes must be based only on the principle of

must be based only protection. We denounce the principle of protection as radioally unsound and unjust to the masses of the people, and we declare our conviction that any tariff changes based on that principle must fail to afford any substantial relief from the burdens under which the country labors.

This issue we unhesitatingly accept, and upon it we await with the fullest confidence the verdict of the electors of Canada.
