WOUNDED U. S. SOLDIERS HAVE REACHED ENGLAND

Haig and Petain Attacked Early Today East And Northeast of Ypres-British Report Progress Made, and French All First Objectives Taken-Latter Also Advance In Aisne Sector.

London, Aug. 16 .- Troops of the Entente Allies in Flanders attacked the German positions today on a wide front east and north of Ypres, in Belgium. The official report of Field Marshal Haig says that progress is being made.

The text of the statement, which was timed 12:11 p.m., reads:

"At 4:45 o'clock this morning the Entente allied troops again attacked on a wide front east and north of Ypres.

"Heavy fighting is taking place, but progress is being made at all points in spite of the stubborn resistance of the enemy.

"On the Lens battlefront three more counterattacks made by the enemy last night against our positions were repulsed. A hostile concentration in the neighborhood of Cite St. Auguste was broken up by our artillery.

## FRENCH TAKE ALL OBJECTIVES.

Paris, Aug. 16 .- French troops in Belgium, attacking early today in conjunction with the British on both sides of the road between Steenstraete and Dixmude, captured all their objectives and crossed the Steenbeke River, the war office announced today. Fur. ther progress is being made along the river.

The French made an attack on the Aisne and captured German trenches on a front of one kilometre. Four German counter-attacks were repulsed. ATTACKED AT DAWN.

The statement follows: 'In Belgium, after violent and most thorough artillery preparation,

we made an attack at dawn this morning in conjunction with the British army on our right. With superb spirit our infantry made the assault on the enemy positions on both sides of the road between Steenstraete and Dixmude, capturing all objectives and crossing the Steenbeke. Our troops are making progress on the right bank in contact with our allies. A VIGOROUS ATTACK. "South of Ailles a vigorous attack made us master of a system of trenches on a front of one kilometre, which was held strongly by the enemy. Four German counter-attacks on our new positions were re-

pulsed easily, and 120 prisoners, one of them an officer, have been ounted. In the region of the Hurtebise Monument we also made progress, taking a score of prisoners. "In the Champagne and on both banks of the Meuse heavy artillery fighting continued. We made a surprise attack near Louvemont, taking

seven prisoners. There is nothing of importance to report on the re-AIRPLANES ACTIVE.

"Our bombarding airplanes last night and this morning, threw many bombs on enemy establishments north and east of the Houthulet forest, and also on the railway station at Lichterwald. "During our attack in the region of Ailles and Hurtebise our aviators were not deterred by the bad weather from flying very close to the ground as our infantry moved forward, and turning their machine guns on the shelters and reserves of the enemy.'

# BARNS BULGING, FARMERS THRESH

Farmers of District Have One of Heaviest Yields Ever Known.

NO SPACE FOR STORAGE

Grain Free From Insect Blight or Smut-Corn an Average Crop.

Threshing of one of the heaviest grain crops in years has commenced in several parts of the district, and many farmers will have disposed of their armers will have disposed of wheat by the end of the week. wheat by the end of the west. This work is being done earlier this year because of the heavy c.ops. Many of the barns throughout the country would not be capable of holding the combined wheat and other crops, and many farmers have, therefore, decided to do part of the threshing now, leaving only the later crops until the fall.

Crops Free of Smut.

Oats are being cut and will be soon in the barns, to be followed by barley. Representatives of the department of agriculture state that all the grain crops have been particularly free of insect or other blights. The absence of smut is particularly noticeable they say, and attribute this to the educational campaigns along this line which



# HOUSEWIVES TO BE ROUSED FOR SAVING OF FOOD

Grand Canvass Will Be Made by London's Food Control Committee.

ICE CREAM NOT ISSUE

No Proposal Here To Check Use of Frozen Commodity, Says Chairman.

The policy to be adopted by the local branch of the women's auxiliary to the Organization of Resources committee in the campaign to enlist the co-operation of the London public in the food consertation movement was definitely outlined loday by the chairman, Mrs. David Williams "Bishopstowe." said Mrs. Williams "We propose," said Mrs. Williams, "to keep closely to the policy of the food controller, Hon. W. J. Hanna, as presented at the conference of women of Ontario, called some weeks ago in Toronto, and to carry out as far as possible the wishes of the conference.

"The issue that is before us at the present is to release a sufficient quantity." present is to release a sufficient quanpresent is to release a sumicient quantity of beef, bacon and wheat to meet the needs of our soldiers and of Britain and her allies. For these three commodities we are asked to substitute to a certain extent, other foods which are equally nourishing, but not suitable for superiors.

Three Things to Watch. The message which the London delegates have brought from the Toronto conference is this:

"(1) Eat less wheat and substitute commeal, oatmeal, etc.

"(2) Eat less bacon and beef and substitute fish, eggs, beans, milk, nuts, etc.

"(3) See that there is no waste.

"It is these three things which the housewives of London will be called upon to do in signing the food conservaupon to do in signing the food conservan pledge.
"The main issue before us in the campaign we are inaugurating in the city is not the reduction of the high cost of living, important as that is, but

insuring of the co-operation of every usewife with the food controller in minating waste of food and releas-an adequate amount of wheat, beef d bacon for our fighting men, Britain d the allies "We do not propose to touch upon uch side issues as the manufacture of ice cream, important though these may be. His policy calls for production, conservation and elimination of waste. "At the conference in Toronto, such questions were introduced as what was termed 'the wholesale manufacture of fee cream." But no action was taken upon them.

# POPE FORWARDS HIS PROPOSALS BY KING GEORGE

British Monarch Asked To Submit Them To France, Italy, U. S.

PLEA AN ELOQUENT ONE

Vatican Appeals For End To Horrors, and Suggests a Peace Basis.

"In expressing to your majesty my sincere thanks for this extreme kindness I am happy to take the opportunity to offer you the homage of sentiment, a very profound respect with which I have the honor to sign myself your majesty's very humble and devoted servant.

A Sanguinary Three Years. "Towards the end of the first year of the war we addressed to the nations in conflict most lively exhortations, and more, we indicated the part to be followed to arrive at a stable and honorable peace for all. Unfortunately, our appeal was not heard, and the war continued desperately for another two years with all its horrors. It became even more cruel and extended over the earth, over the sea and in the air, and one saw desolation and death descend upon the cities without defence, upon peaceful villages and on their innocent population, and now one upon peaceful villages and on their innocent population, and now one can imagine how the sufferings of all would be increased and aggravated if other months, or, worse still, other years, are about to be added to this sanguinary triennium.

But in order no longer to speak in general terms as the circumstances had counselled us in the past, we now wish to make more cumstances had counselled us in the past, we now wish to make more concrete and practical proposals and to invite the governments of the belligerent peoples to an agreement upon the following points which seem to be a basis of a just and durable peace, leaving to them the task of analyzing and completing them.

The Conditions.

"First of all the fundamental points must be that the material force of arms be substituted by the moral force of right from which shall arise a fair agreement by all for the simultaneous and reciprocal diminution of armaments, according to the rules and evarantees to be esdiminution of armaments, according to the rules and guarantees to be established, in a measure necessary and sufficient for the maintenance of public order in each state. Then in the substitution for armies the institution of arbitration with its high pacifying function, according to the rules to be laid down and the penalties to be imposed on a state which would refuse either to submit a national question to arbitration or to accept its decision.

"Once the supremacy of right has thus been established, all obstacles to the means of communication of the peoples would disappear by assuring, by rules to be fixed later, the true liberty and community of the seas which would contribute to the numerous causes of conflict, and would also open to all new sources of prosperity and progress.

"As to the damages to be repaired, and as to the war expenses, we see no other means of solving the question than by submitting as a general principle the complete and reciprocal co-ordination which would be justifieds moreover by the immense benefit to be derived from disarmament so much so that no mense benefit to be derived from disarmament so much so that no one will undertake the continuation of a similar carnage solely for reasons of an economic order.

"If for certain causes there exist particular reasons they will be deliberated upon with justice and equity, but these pacific agreements with the immense advantages to be derived from them are not possible without a reciprocal restitution of the territory at present occupied.

"Consequently on the part of Germany, the complete evacuation of Belgium with the guarantee of her

Belgium with the guarantee of her full political, military and economic independence towards it. independence towards it.

"As regards the territorial questions as, for example, those which have arisen between Italy and Austria and between Germany and Prances there is received to have that France, there is reason to hope that in consideration of the immense adin consideration of the immemse advantages of a durable peace with disarmament, the parties in conflict would wish to examine them with a conciliatory disposition, taking into consideration as we have said formerly the aspirations of the peoples and the special interests and of the general welfare of the great human society.

Equity and Justice.

"The same spirit of equity and justice ought to be followed in the examination of other territorial and political questions, notably those rel ative to Armenia and the Balkan states, and territories making a part of the ancient Kingdom of Poland, whose noble and historical traditions and sufferings which it has endured especially during the present war ought to conciliate the sympathies

"Such are the principal bases whereon we believe the future reorganization of the peoples ought to be built. They are of a nature to render impossible the return of similar conflicts, and to prepare a solution of the economic question so solution of the economic question so important for the future and for the material well being of all belligerent "Therefore, in presenting to you, no direct at this hour the destinies

of the belligerent nations, we are animated to see them accepted, and to see thus the conclusion at an early date of the terrible struggle which more and more appears a useless massagre less massacre.

sides is safe. Incline your ears
therefore to our prayer. Accept the
fraternal invitation which we send

"On your decision depend the re-pose and the joy of innumerable families, the life of thousands of young people, in a word, the happi-ness of a people for whom it is your absolute duty to obtain their wel-fare.

May the Lord inspire your de cision in conformity to his very holy will. May God grant that holy will. May God grant that while meriting the applause of your contemporaries you will also obtain in the future generations a splendid name of pacificators.

"As for us, closely united in prayer and in penitence with all those faithful souls which sigh for peace, we implore for you the light and counsel of the Divine Spirit.
