DEATH TOLL ON LAKES

Twenty-Five Vessels Valued at \$1,144,000 Lost During the Season Just Passed.

Detroit, Dec. 6. - At 12 o'clock tolay navigation on the great lakes for the year 1909 will be officially closed. With the end of the season comes the reckoning. Twenty-five vessels, with a total tonnage of 30,146, and valued at \$1,144,000, have been wrecked the past season, and of those who cperated these boats 62 have perished. Chief among the causes of disaster nas been fog. Twenty-four collisions are recorded, and at least 50 per cert of these were caused by fog. The greatest loss of life on any on vessel occurred when the steamer John B. Cowle was rammed and sunk by the steamer Isaac M. Scott, near Whitefish Point, in Lake Superior, on July 12. 

GAMBLING IN FUTURES

Washington, Dec. 5. - Both the producers of cotton and the dealers in that commodity are the victims of the system of trading in vogue on the cotton exchange of the country. This is the burden of parts four and five of the report of Commissioner of Corporations Smith on the conduct of such exchanges. The practice of dealing in futures as it is carried on at present is condemned, although the report

need of a central market, is especially condemnatory of the dealings in futures, branding this form of speculation as pure gambling, and highly injurious to legitimate trade. In quotations for "future" deliveries of cot ton, the market is so uncertain, and so many elements of change enter into the transactions, that all bids are made at a much lower figure than those offered for cotton actually in existence. The effect of these fictitious quotations, the report points out, tends to mislead the cotton planter as to the

true value of his crop, honestly grown, In addition, it leads brokers to "play" both sides of the market to protect themselves against loss in such trades, with the result that the producer is forced to pay in the end, while the farmer loses likewise.





SASKATCHEWAN ASKS FOR NEW RAILROAD

Legislature at Regina Spent a Couple of Hours Discussing the Hudson's Bay Line. Regina, Sask., Dec. 5.—The Legis-

lature spent a couple of hours discussing the resolution introduced by H H. Willway (Opposition), that the House most respectfully urge upon the Government of Canada the necessity and importance of the immediate con struction of a railway to Hudson's Bay and for that purpose would request the Government to make Provision at the present session of parliament for its actual construction. A very general discussion followed, some of the Government members taking exception to partisanship. Hon. Mr. Haultain point ed out that there was nothing of the kind in the resolution and the speeches. Premier Scott, in closing the debate, regretted the partisan introduction, bat said he was entirely in accord with the wording of the resolution, which he thought represented the proper tude, which people in Saskatchewan were in duty bound to take for their

own interests. Accepting the resolution, with a tribute to Mr. Haultain's conciliatory explanation, the premier said he was particularly pleased that it came from the Opposition, as indicating a unanimity of provincial desire. He thought it should be placed in the hands of the Ottawa Government, and moved in amendment that a humble address be presented to the Lieutenant-Governor. and that the same be forwarded to the overnor-General-in-Council.
