RANZ JOSEPH is a name that goes legemony in Central Europe. When aviators direct the fire. he late emperor ascended the throne in 1848, the "German Confederation," set up by the Vienna Congress of 1815, was wrote: still intact. It embraced a host of states that now make up the German Empire and the present Austrian Of this loose confederation, Franz Joseph, as emperor of Austria, was president or leader, the king of Prussia being a sort of rival. Besides this position of prestige, the Austrian ruler enjoyed control of Italy, governing directly the provinces of Venetia and ombardy, and protecting a number of nexty despots throughout the peninsula. The suppression of Hungarian, Italian

and Slav revolts in 1848-49 put the tion for a time of unquestioned mastery almost unprecedented in the annals of Hansburg. But soon began the crumb bing of the miscellaneous edifice. In 1859-60 Italy, helped by France got free, excepting Venetia. In 1866

Venetia was gained by Italy, while Prussia overthrew Franz Joseph's German hegemony, and Bismarck forced his empire out of the German Confederation, thus making Prussia easily its paramount power. Co-operating with her rival in the conquest of Schleswig-Holstein from Denmark, Austria had been made to play Bismarck's game.

Between 1866 and 1870 she intrigued desperately to capture the waivering Roman Catholic southwest of what is now the German Empire, viz: the tates of Bavaria, Baden, etc. But the Franco-Prussian war lined up these states with Prussia, and the German onfederation, without Austria, was welded into the iron fabric, whose centre is Berlin.

Since 1870 Austria has prospered comnercially, and an increase of territory was gained at the expense of Turkey or Serbia in the annexation of Bosnia. Herzegovina, Within the empire, slavs groaned under the heel of Gernan or Magyar. At last, in 1914, came he plunge of the Teuton pirates into Serbia.
