



The sum of £59,265. 3. 6., which includes Bonusus to the amount of £5,136. 7. 1., has been paid to the representatives of deceased assurers. The number of persons thus decease

is 152, and is under the average provided for by the Society's Tables. The total Claims paid from the establishment of this Society is £405, 022. 16.
