





SAN FRANCISCO, Calif., June 23 -Blackmail, murders, opium smuggling and smuggling of coolies across the border were revealed in letters and documents taken yesterday up-on the arrest of Wong Do King, head of the Bin Kung Tong, according to information given out to-day by Federal immigration officials. Death, the immigration men say, was the penalty to all who opposed or attempted to betray the schemes of the highbinders. The deportation of Wong will be sought, and other powerfu! Chinese will be prosecuted

Wong, for 20 years has been head of the Bing Kungs, the most war-like and powerful of the Chinese tongs

Widespread levying of blackmail, said to be the principal activity of the Bing Kungs, was made effective by a score of gunmen, on salanies with bonuses for killing "big men." The gunmen also protected gambling dens and owners of Chinase and Am dens and owners of Chinese and American slave girls, the letters show. Many letters bear upon the recent tong war, which extended the length of the Pacific coast, some of them gving specific instructions for the killing of various men.

astrous fire that has visited this city since the burning of the Board of Trade building, thirteen years ago. A general alarm called the fire apparatus from every station in the city and the ambulances from every hospital.

The fire started presumably from a burning match or lighted cigarette thrown carelessly by a passerby into some shavings lying in the Fabian avenue doorway. The ignited shavings in the open doorway were quickly sucked into the building by a draught, and the blaze trailed its way immediately to a bin in the centre of the building, which was packed with excelsior and other flimsy

material. This box of refuse served as tinder for the creeping flames. From the refuse box to the dry kiln on the floor above in the east wing of the building, a room filled with closely piled lumber, was the path of the flames. The intense heat from the burning of the refuse bin literally melted the floor from under the dry kiln, precipitating part of the tons of lumber into the raging fur-nace beneath, which besened the piles sufficiently to cause a draught. All this happened before the fire
