# French and British Progress Rapidly on West Front

While the greatest battle in history continues to rage furiously in northern France, the riddle of Russia has presented a new phase with a menaced counter-revolution of staggering possibilities. For the moment the provisional government has the upper hand, but the voice of the radicals grows louder and more threatening every day, demanding concessions which would make the existence of an organized government impossible.

As far as news despatches indicate the radical insurgents in Petrograd are basing their attack on the May Day note sent to the allies by Foreign Secretary Milukoff, reaffirming Russia's determination to a seeming realization of the catasfulfill her obligations to the Entente and vigorously prosecute the war against Germany. The provisional government has energetically supported this position and the ministers declare they will resign rather than censure M. Milukoff.

The war office in London this morning reports the British have made further progress north of Havrincourt Wood and near Fresnoy. The French have battered their way a little closer to Laon and have stormed one of the great natural fortresses guarding the southern end of the Hindenburg line. By the capture of Craonne they have forced ajar the back door to Laon, but there are mighty obstacles still in their path. Craonne formed one of two gun-crowned heights at the head of a broad valley leading to the French goal.

# REICHSTAG RESTRICTS POWER OF THE KAISER

Ordinances and Decrees of German Emperor Require in Future Approval of the Imperial Chancellor

By Courier Leased Wire

Amsterdam, May 5.—via London.—A restriction of the power of the emperor of Germany has been decided upon by the Constitution Committee of the reichstag, according to a despatch from Berlin. The committee has decided to alter article XVII of the imperial constitution

"Ordinances and decrees of the Kaiser will be issued in the name of the empire and will require for validity, the counter-signature of the imperial chancellor or his representative, who thereby assumes responsibility to the reichstag."

The decision of the committee was in accordance with a joint proposal by the Centrists, National Liberals and the Progressives. Four Conservative members voted against the change.

The committee also adopted a resolution by the same proposers demanding a bill fixing the chancellor's responsibility for any violation of his official duty and the verification of such violation by a senate tribunal.

Dr. Karl Selfferich, secretary of the interior, told the committee that a definite statement in regard to his attitude could not be expected from him. He said that it would only be possible after the federal council had defined its position.

# MODEL HOSPITAL ONTARIO'S GIFT

### Institution in Kent Founded by Contributions From This Province

(From a London, Eng., newspaper) The modern military hospital is no longer a substantial structure of brick and mortar. It is a collection of temporary buildings put up in the minimum of time and at the minimum of expense. Such a hospital is the Ontario Military Hospital in Kent. It took seven months to build, from the time the architect first arrived on the ground until it was opened, and the cost was less than £70 per bed. It is to the Canadian province of Ontario that we owe this vast concern which is still growing, and which has tended over 6,000 patients in less than 12 months.

The subscribers to the fund and all the people of Ontario may well be pleased, for their money has been spent to good purpose, and they have the satisfaction of knowing that their hospital is put to its full use. There are rarely less than 600 patients in the wards, and often there are nearly half as many again.

The Ontario Hospital is absolutely self-contained, for there are facilities for all the most delicate surgical work ready to hand. There is a dental surgery where dentists and surgeons, all Canadians, most of them from Ontario, and all specialists. work together. Men with jaw and face wounds are made whole again. Plastic surgery has been made a feature of the establishment, and there is an excellent X-ray plant in a special building. Many American and Canadian business methods have been introduced, and there is an excellent system of card index filing in connection with the X-ray treatment. The records of the patients are kept with meticulous care, and by the card index system and man's medical history is revealed in 30 seconds.

There are at present 20 wards in the hospital, each of 52 beds. In addition there is an isolation ward of 40 beds, bringing the total up to 1.080. In six weeks 1.040 more beds will be ready, bringing the accommodation up to 2,120. This is a wonderful total for a temporary hospital which did not exist a year ago.

Nurses From Ontario. In regard to the staff, the Ontario people have again come to the fore. They have sent 80 trained nurses. All were certificated before the war. for a three years' course is necessary in the province before the final examinations are passed. These nurses rank as lieutenants and wear two stars on their shoulder-straps. They are paid as lieutenants, and their accounts, field allowances and mess allowances are all dealt with in the same way as those of the officers. They wear a distinctive uniform. with a blue cloak lined with scarlet, a blue soft hat, and the Army Medical Service badge of Canada, which has the serpent and staff surrounded with the maple leaves instead of the bay leaves. The matron, Miss M. Smith, of Ottawa, ranks as a captain and wears captain's badges. In addition to the nursing staff there are 310 N. C. O.'s and men doing duty as orderlies, dentists, dispensers, engineers, firemen in the power house,

The arrangement of the buildings is specially noteworthy, for they are laid out with the idea of economizing labor in the distribution of food and saving time in attendance on patients. The kitchens are specially convenient, and the food is taken through covered ways to rooms where it is carved on hot stoves. There are bread cutting machines, there are bread cutting machines, steam boilers capable of taking a sack of potatoec, steam ovens for cooking green vegetables, baking ovens, and all the apparatus of a modern hotel kitchen.

Diets are carefully checked, and there is no waste. Every day the diets required for each ward are sent down to the quartermaster's stores, where baskets are filled with any special food required. The check goes also to the kitchen, where the dishes are prepared. Every effort has been made to economize without stinting the men and several good schemes for saving have been initia-ted. Whereas every man used to be given two slices of bread on his plate the bread is now put on a large dish in the centre of the table, where a man may help himself. Thus, if there is any left over, it may be used for puddings or other dishes. Pota-toes are served in the same way.

A Permanent Cinema.





# World-Hunger Stares Us in the Face

David Lubin, representative of the United States to the Inernational Institute of Agriculture-maintained by forty Govemments-reports officially to Washington that the food grains the world on March 31st, 1917, showed a shortage of 150,000,000 bushels below the amount necessary to feed the world until August, 1917. He declares it is beyond question that unless a greater acreage is put to crop in 1917 there will be WORLD-HUNGER before the 1918 crop is harvested.

The failure of the grain crop, in the Argentine Republic, which is ordinarily a great grain-exporting nation, resulted in an embargo being placed, in March, 1917, upon the export of grains from that country to avert local famine.

The United States Department of Agriculture, in its offireport, announces the condition of the fall wheat crop (which is two-thirds of their total wheat crop), on April 1st, 1917, to be the poorest ever recorded, and predicts a yield of 244,000,000 bushels below the crop of 1915. The 1916 crop was poor. Even with favorable weather, the wheat crop of the United States is ikely to be the smallest in thirty-five years, not nore than 64% of the normal crop.

Under date of April 10th, Ogden Armour, executive head of Armour & Company, one of the world's largest dealers in food products, stated that unless the United States wishes to walk deberately into a catastrophe, the best brains of the country, under Government supervision, must immediately devise means of increasing and conserving food supplies. Armour urged the cultivation of every available acre. The food shortage, he said, world-wide. European production is cut in half, the Argentine Republic has suffered droughts. Canada and the United States must wake up!

People are starving to-day in Belgium, in Serbia, in Poland, in Armenia, in many quarters of the globe.

Famine conditions are becoming more widespread every day. On these alarming food conditions becoming known, President Wilson immediately appointed a Food Comptroller for the United States. He selected Herbert C. Hoover, to whom the world is indebted, as Chairman of the International Belgium Relief Commission, for his personal direction of the distribution of food among the starving Belgians.

Mr. Hoover is already urging sacrifice and food restrictions, for, as he states, "The war will probably last another year, and we shall have all we can do to supply the necessary food to carry our Allies through with their full fighting stamina."

## Food Production is the Greatest Problem the World Faces To-day

Owing to destruction by submarines, ocean ships are scarce. It is much easier to protect shipping between Canada and England than on the longer voyages from India or Australia.

One vessel can make twice as many trips from Canada to Britain as from India, and four times as many as from Australia. Therefore, every ton of food stuffs grown in Canada is worth to the Motherland two tons grown in India or four tons grown in 'Australia.

## Why the Call to Canada is So Urgent

If this country does not raise a big crop this year, not only will the people of Canada suffer, but the Motherand and her Allies will suffer, and their military power will be weakened if not paralyzed. Therefore, the right solution of the present war problem comes back to the farm, as to a foundation upon which our whole national and international structure must be built and maintained.

The farmers know that they are the last reserve, and that the soil on which crops are grown is the strategic ground on which wars are decided. To their care is entrusted the base of

To enable the farm to do the work two factors are essential. The first is Time. Whatever we are to do must be done at once. Nature waits for no man. The second is Labor. Many farmers cannot plant the acres they would because they cannot get the necessary help. Many are afraid to increase their acreage because they fear they would not be able to cultivate and harvest an unusual crop after they had raised it. If they are to do the work that is essential for them to do, the last man in each city, town and village must be mobilized at

Every man not on Active Service can help. In every city, town and vilage are men who, by their training on the farm, or by their present occupation, can readily adapt themselves to farm work. These can render no greater service to the Empire at the present time than by answering the call of the farm. Capable men and boys willing to learn should not allow their lack of farm experience to stand in the way.

Can the employer render a more signal service in this crisis than by encouraging these men to help the farmer to cultivate every available acre, and by making it easy for them to go?

Ontario's farm lands are waiting—the implements are ready the equipment is complete—the farmer is willing—all he needs

So short is the world's food supply that without increased production many in Canada must go hungry, and even with enormously increased production we cannot expect cheap food. The world is waiting for our harvest.

If peace should be declared within a year, the food conditions will be no better, for the accumulated hunger of the Central Em-

We do not know when this war shall cease. It is endless—its lengthening out has paralyzed the thought and conception of all men who thought about it and its possible time of conclusion. Three months six months, we said; nine months, a year, we said; and yet two years and eight months have passed their long, dreary and sanguinary length, and there is no man who can tell how long this gigantic struggle may yet last.

Lloyd George, in a letter addressed to farmers throughout the

Empire, said: "The line which the British Empire holds against "the Germans is held by those who WORK ON THE "LAND as well as by those who fight on land and sea. If "it breaks at any point it breaks everywhere. In the face "of the enemy the seamen of our Royal naval and mer-"cantile marine and the soldiers gathered from every part "of our Empire hold our line firstly. You workers on land "must hold your part of our line as strongly. Every full "day's labor you do helps to shorten the struggle and "brings us nearer victory. Every idle day, all loitering, "lengthens the struggle and makes defeat more possible. "Therefore, in the nation's honor, heed! Acquit your-"selves like men, and as workers on land do your duty "with all your strength!"

So, for the honor of Canada's soldiers in France-and for the glory of our New-born Nationhood-let it be said of Ontario's citizens that, in the hour of our greatest need, their response was worthy of their sons.

We owe a great debt to those who are fighting for us.


