

### Reasons For Not Worrying.

(From the U. S. Public Health Bulletin)

The birds build nests for the protection of their young against the weather; the foxes dig holes for security against foes; the squirrels lay by stores of nuts against the coming of winter; the dogs bury bones against the day when bones will be scarce. These are the manifestations of a normal protective instinct arising from an experience of many, many generations. So far as is known, though, to the birds, the foxes, the squirrels, and the dogs, no one has ever been known to worry about the future. No fox ever fretted because he only had one hole in which to hide; no squirrel ever died of anxiety lest he should not lay by enough nuts for two winters. Instead of for one; and no dog ever lost any sleep over the fact that he didn't have enough bones laid aside to provide for his declining years.

This protective instinct is also present in the human mind, to the individual and the nation. In order for man to store up and lay by, to gain advancement either in honor or material things, it is necessary that he take some forethought of the morrow, but just so soon as he carries this beyond the normal point the mental process becomes an exaggerated and abnormal one. The normal protective instinct is stimulated by a normal fear of those events which are reasonably sure to happen in the future unless means are adopted against them. The moment that this fear becomes abnormal or exaggerated it overstimulates this protective instinct, and to no good purpose because it results in worry. The worry continues long after the necessity for the normal stimulus of fear has passed, with the result that there is an impairment in mental power and a disintegration of the nervous forces. In other words, the mental machine has been running idle and at the same time delivering no propulsive power. In fact, worry is an abnormal state.

Not all worry is preventable, but for the most it can be avoided. Most of our fears are overblown and as a rule, if we meet our troubles day by day as they come without worrying about them before they arrive or fretting over them after they have passed, we shall be able to meet them with a clear head and a steady hand. Worry weakens the health of a man; it makes him an idiot. It really weakens the mental forces by using them out by doing nothing. It really relieves worry rests with the victim of this unhappy habit himself, but sometimes the real causes are not the ones which seem to explain the condition, and we must go deep into our lives or have the assistance of those who are skilled in unravelling mental processes.

In the year 1914 there were 114,283 prisoners under a sentence, but in 1915 the number fell to 64,165, presumably because the army had absorbed a large proportion of the criminal population.

### When Cooking Meats.

When boiling ham, place a plate beneath it to keep it from sticking to the bottom of the kettle. Trim off the rind, rub brown sugar into it and brown the ham in the oven before serving.

### When Cooking Meats.

Save scraps of fat and skim all of the grease from the top of gravies and soups. Bring slowly to a boil and strain through a fine-wire sieve. Use for frying purposes.

### When Cooking Meats.

Do not mix mutton or lamb fat with other fats. Melt in a pan, and add a pinch of salt and a little boiling water to cause the sediment to settle. Strain and turn into molds. Mutton fat makes the best of cosmetics for chapped and bleeding hands.

### When Cooking Meats.

To make a tough steak tender place it on a deep platter and sprinkle it with three tablespoons of vinegar or lemon juice and one of olive oil. Turn it several times and let it soak two or three hours before broiling.

### When Cooking Meats.

Fried meats should not be given to young children. A child of 2, or over should be given at least two ounces of meat, fish or poultry, except on days when an egg is eaten. It is important to teach children to chew meat thoroughly.



### Control of Epidemics Amongst School Children.

(ISSUED BY THE DEPARTMENT OF THE PUBLIC HEALTH, NOVA SCOTIA)

The fact that young people are more susceptible to most of the infectious diseases than adults makes it necessary that particular attention should be given to them when an epidemic threatens or prevails.

The fact that the massing of children in the schools affords a special opportunity for the spread of disease should be considered in connection with the further fact that when children are so massed it is possible to keep them under practically constant observation.

Experience has shown that epidemics are most easily prevented or controlled if schools are not closed, but if instead, a system of daily medical inspection is instituted.

Success in preventive work depends upon the following factors:

1. Early detection of the first case or cases.
2. Strict isolation and quarantine of patients until the infective stage is passed.
3. Isolation of contacts until the period of incubation is over.
4. A determined effort to detect carriers, mild and typical cases, and cases in the earliest stage of illness.
5. A determined effort to locate "missed cases" and isolation of such, as well as isolation of contacts with such, for the period which may be indicated.

The expense incurred by such a practice may be largely and perhaps completely offset by the saving of school moneys, which are often reduced when an infectious disease becomes prevalent in a community.

In combating an epidemic amongst school children, the school nurse may play a very important part. She can be of great assistance to the examining physician, can aid in supervising the isolation of infected children and the practice of preventive measures in their homes, can ascertain the cause of absences from the school and in this way perhaps new foci for infection; and can in many other ways prove of much value.

In the case of a disease which is communicable by direct contact with the patient, it is necessary to isolate the patient in order to prevent the spread of the disease. In this way a quarantined group will doubtless be found requiring little supervision. Similarly the use of the Schick test will prove useful in discovering those who should have special supervision when diphtheria is present.

Of course medical inspection should include not only the school children, but teachers and janitors also.

### Newspaper Staff of Three.

EDITED BY CONTRIBUTORS

The London Gazette has probably the smallest staff of any newspaper in England. This organ of the Government publishes Orders in Council, military and naval appointments and promotions, statistics of cattle diseases, honours lists, and notices of bankruptcy.

Since the war the number of supplements to the London Gazette, published twice a week, has risen from two or three a year to a daily issue. In spite of this increase the staff still consists of a superintendent and two assistants. The paper is edited by its contributors. Each Government office sends its quota of information directly to the contracting printer, who returns the proof to each office for revision.

## Town Council Meeting.

The first regular meeting of the new Council was held on Wednesday evening.

The old Council met at the regular hour with Mayor Fitch in the chair, and transacted unfinished and routine business and received the declaration of the Town Clerk as to the result of the annual election.

Recorder Crawley administered the oath of office to the Mayor elect, J. E. Hales and to Dr. C. E. A. deWitt and Messrs. A. V. Rand and T. L. Harvey, the new Councillors.

Mayor Hales took the chair and without further preliminaries the business was taken up. Coun. W. C. B. Harris was elected presiding Councilor, and the following standing committees for the ensuing year were appointed:

School Commissioners—Couns. A. V. Rand, W. C. B. Harris, Mayor Hales.

Public Accounts and Finance—Couns. Harris, Rand, Halsey.

License and Police—Couns. Regan, Harris and deWitt.

Quite an animated discussion took place with reference to a number of town matters, chief of which was the large amount of unpaid taxes. The information brought out, however, indicated that good work is being done at the town office in collecting arrears, and it is hoped that practically all indebtedness will be wiped out in the near future.

## War Savings Certificates.

The new War Savings Certificates which have been created by the Government to encourage thrift and economy and to give every one an opportunity to assist in financing our war expenditure, are now on sale at every bank and money order post office in Canada. The \$25 certificate sells for \$21.50, the \$50 for \$43 and the \$100 for \$86.

As an investment these certificates offer many attractive features, chief of which are the absolute security and the excellent interest return. For every \$25 lent to the Government at now, \$25 will be returned at the end of three years.

There are two other features which are especially interesting to small investors. First, the certificates may be surrendered at any time, if the buyer should need his money; and second, each certificate is registered at Ottawa in the buyer's name and if lost or stolen, is therefore valueless to anyone else.

But while they are excellent from an investment standpoint, the certificates should appeal strongly to Canadians because they offer to those who must serve at home a splendid opportunity for a most important patriotic service. The person who honestly saves to the extent of his ability and places his savings at the disposal of the Government by purchasing these certificates, may feel that he is having a direct share in feeding, equipping, and arming our Canadian soldiers, who are so nobly doing their part.

## Murder and Suicide.

A terrible tragedy occurred at Kentville on Saturday evening last. Elsie Acker, a domestic in the employ of Mrs. F. C. Dimock, who resides at Oaklands, the former home of her father, the late Col. L. DeV. Chipman, was shot and instantly killed by a man named Andrew Feindal. Feindal then shot himself above the eye inflicting a wound from which he died on Tuesday place at the home of Mrs. Dimock. Feindal had come to Kentville by the evening train from Halifax. He went to Oaklands where his ring was answered by Mrs. Botford, Mrs. Dimock's sister. He asked for Miss Acker who came into the hall. Pushing by Mrs. Botford, Feindal drew his revolver and sent a bullet through Miss Acker's heart, then turned the weapon upon himself. Dr. H. B. Webster, as coroner, empaneled a jury and conducted an inquest. The verdict was that the deceased came to her death by a shot fired with intent to kill.

Miss Acker and her slayer both being in Cherryfield, Lunenburg county.

The Legislature of New Brunswick has been dissolved. The General Election will be held on Saturday, February 24th.

## Our Winter Birds.

Few people have an idea how many birds stay with us during the winter. Most persons of course have seen English sparrows, crows and pigeons in the winter; but would be surprised to know that there are ten others that are fairly common. Many naturalists have observed that birds migrate, not on account of cold weather, but because of failure of food supply or to avoid their enemies. Feed the birds and they will stay. Of course it is not practical to feed all kinds of birds; but there are several that can be induced to stay. I have been feeding some birds this winter and have made a good start. We have with us, as regular boarders at the bird table, juncos, song sparrows, chickadees, robins, woodpeckers and blue jays. The pine grosbeak also made his appearance on Tuesday. All you have to do is to hang up a marrow bone outside the door and they will soon find it. Suet or goose fat is also very good; in fact they are very thankful to find any nourishing diet and will not even refuse butter, cheap as it is. These birds do not get their entire bill of fare from the food I provide, but make regular visits to the orchard and get busy gathering cankerworm eggs and any other vermin they can find. Now the esthetic side of this is very pleasant to those who have the power to appreciate it; but to those who have not, there is the dollar side.

I have used a great many precautions to protect and encourage the birds around our home this season and have been rewarded with the largest and best crop of apples I have ever had, without using spray of any kind. My apples were above the average and with one exception the best that were brought to the warehouse, as Mr. Peck, the foreman, will corroborate. When you feed birds in winter it is very interesting to watch how soon some stray cat will find the place and climb up to have a bird for lunch. When you see this be sure your shotgun is handy and then watch how quickly the intruder will come down if your aim and ammunition is good.

## The Bantam Battalion.

Halifax, Feb. 5th.—The great event of the week has been the proclamation by Germany of an unlimited submarine warfare in an endeavour to destroy all shipping, and thereby bring about starvation in the Allied countries, especially England. It is recognized that Germany has been doing all that she possibly could against the Allies to destroy their shipping, so this is simply a notification that the same policy is to be carried out against neutrals. It is a further notification to us that the war is to be carried to the greatest extremity; that there is no hope of an early peace; and that the man-power of all the Allied countries must be mobilized to bring about a favorable end to the war. In a Maritime Province like our own, which means war by sea as well as by land, Germany is not going to allow any fine moral distinctions to stop her in her ruthless career. It is a challenge to every unenlisted man who is physically fit, and none should be out of khaki.

Men engaged in war have always been supposed to have a great advantage if they were large; we speak of certain Battalions as being fine looking soldiers on account of their great size. One regular English Battalion takes no men under 6 feet 7, and their great height, together with the tall, bushy head, makes them appear giants in stature. In this war, however, where there is no little hand to hand work, and where a bullet from the rifle of the little fellow is just as effective as that from the rifle of a large man, and where the small person has less likelihood of being shot, the little man is somewhat at a premium. The 216th Battalion, commonly known as the Bantam Battalion, is now recruiting in the Maritime Provinces under the direction of Lieut. Walsh, who is himself a lively little Bantam. Men who have previously been rejected on account of height will now have an opportunity of enlisting in this crack Battalion. This Battalion does not take men over 5 feet 2; while all other Infantry Battalions do not take men under that height.

## 400 Pounds of Catalogues.

One day last fall in early November there were 400 pounds of catalogues dumped off at a certain small place in Nova Scotia, with a population of less than 1000. Just think of it. Four hundred pounds of solicitations to the people of that community, urging them to buy anything they might need from certain mail-order houses in Upper Canada.

The increasing business sent to mail-order houses is becoming alarming to the average retail merchant.

## A Tale of a Town.

HESPELER'S EXPERIENCE IS THAT THE PATRIOTIC FUND STIMULATES THRIFT.

An officer of the Canadian Patriotic Fund in Hespeler, writes: 'In Hespeler many of the dependent families were not too well off financially, some of them being deeply in debt when the head of the house enlisted for active service. The Secretary of the local association visits these families once a month. He sits down and talks over their affairs with them, gives them advice, insists upon them paying their debts, and when they have got square with the world, advises that they bank at least the amount of assigned pay they receive. With one or two exceptions the women have been pleased to do this, and most of them have quite substantial bank accounts. As the result of having the worry and care of liabilities removed, and the addition of the backing of a bank account, they are taking more pride in themselves, are becoming better mothers, and the results are showing themselves in the bearing and demeanor of their children, who will undoubtedly become better citizens than would have been possible under former conditions.'

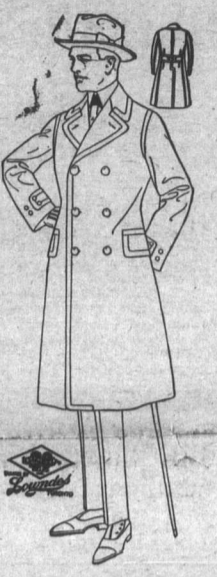

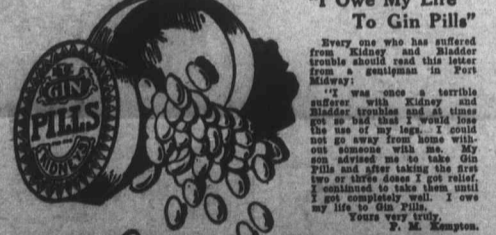
