NEW YORK, March 26. A hundred and fifty persons mostly talian girls from the East Side, were crushed to death on the pavements. or smothered and burned in a factory fire on Saturday. This is the wors disaster that New York has experienced since the General Slocum was burned to the water's edge in 1904 One hundred and forty-one bodies were removed from the ruins. Fathers, mothers and relatives, mad with grief, stormed the police lines at the norgues all night, fighting with the officers in their frenzy. Among the odies, fifty were burned beyond the will share the common grave of the nknown dead. The regular morgue vas too small to accommodate the lead, so the various charities were called on. The pier bore the bulk of the charred remains, the bodies being ranged in long lines on both sides of the pier. Nearly all the victims were employed by the Triangle Waist Company, on the ninth and tenth floors of a ten story building How the fire started will perhaps never be known. The loss to property will not exceed \$60,000.

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
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
