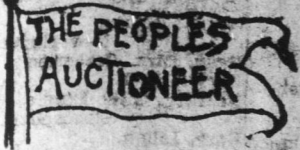

A MYSTERIOUS QUEST.

CHAPTER IV.

The Story of a Strange Girlhood.

"I shall not say much about my childhood," the Signora Valdi began. "It was like that of many other girls left to grow up in a great city, in the shabby gentility necessitated by small means. My father was a doctor and only half successful, and that in a quarter of the town where most of the patients never pay, and the few that do, pay so little that comfort is scarcely known in the house and luxury never. My mother was an invalid, and, there being no other children, I grew up in the comparatively empty house a creature of fancies and dreams. My voice was my great companion. I dared not sing in the parlors or where my mother could hear me too plainly, but would go away into the garret, where in undisturbed possession of so much empty space, I would sing and trill till I was utterly exhausted or my stock of songs gave out. Later, I took to acting, having seen one opera through the kindness of a school-teacher of mine who knew my passion and had accidentally overheard my voice one day. For even then I never sang before any one, and if by chance I caught any one hearing my throat choked up and I broke into a cold perspiration. But this was inexperience, as I thought, and I went on cherishing my dreams and acting over and over imaginary scenes from operas which I knew only by name, creating songs and manufacturing situations which must have been sufficiently crude and ridiculous, but which gave my voice a chance and allowed enough of my fervor to extend itself to prevent me from falling ill or becoming desperately dissatisfied and unhappy.

"When I was fourteen, my mother died, and two years after this, my father. But I was not discouraged, I had my voice, and, child as I was, I imagined I had only to lift it in public to have fame and fortune lavished upon me. I was soon undeceived in this regard; for, in the first place, I could not raise my voice in public, and in the second place, the very first musical adept I saw explained to me how much study and practice were necessary to achieve even the smallest suc-

cess. Study I did not shrink from and practice was simply a delight. But I had no money, and training is expensive, and so is mere living. I found difficulty in existing till one happy day - was it happy? - I let my voice out in what I supposed to be an empty church, but which in reality contained a great teacher, who, hearing me, thereupon took me in charge and started me on a career which he said would end in wealth and adulation.

"Alas for me, I believed him, and was no longer hungry or cold or meekly clothed. At least, I did not feel my hunger or the chill of the room in which I worked at sewing or copying, or anything which would furnish me with daily bread. And as for my clothes, they were so certainly destined to change into the silver and gold tissues befitting an opera queen, that I have sometimes laughed, in passing through the streets, to think how the men and women who jostled me so rudely would one day feel proud if I cast them a glance or bestowed upon them the haughtiest of smiles.

"My companion and the only confidante of my dreams was this old Portuguese crone whom you see with me now. I have made her acquaintance in the depths of my poverty, and being none too well off, had found no other friend who could supply her place in faithfulness and devotion. She is not prepossessing to look at, but she loves me; too well I fear, for she would not even let me die, though she knew my secret desperation.

"But this is hurrying on too fast. I studied then, long and faithfully, and practiced every hour, when I was not obliged to work for my subsistence. Hope sustained me, and the days flew by on wings. My eighteenth birthday passed and the day was set for me to try my voice in concert. Had I carried out this intention, I might have been saved two more years of useless labor and vain hope. But unfortunately, at the last minute, a spirit of opposition seized me, and I refused to test my powers till I could do so with all the eclat of scenery and costume. I would appear as Margherita or not at all, and my foolishness was listened to, and my debut postponed.

"A new teacher now took me in charge. I was able to pay him something, but not much. Never mind; there was a future in store for me, I was but running up a debt which I could easily liquidate by one night of triumph song. If he were willing to wait - and he seemed to be - I certainly could do this, for my voice and manner and style were improving daily, and ere long the doors of the theatres must open before me, and wealth and honour take the place of indigence and obscurity.

"Looking at me now and remembering my failure, can you imagine such folly? You must be young and poor and have a voice to do it. Why, this room has been peopled with visions. I have seen myself in the possession of every power, every happiness. When my fingers ached with writing, I have thought of the day in store for me, when just my signature would be worth gold. Till then I wanted no companionship, and felt myself untempted by pleasure or wealth. Till I could enjoy all, I wanted nothing. I preferred to take my happiness at a bound, and from these rooms of faded grandeur and faded suggestions, step at once into the palatial apartments suited to the successful prima donna.

"You can imagine, then, the excitement of those days, when I was informed by my enthusiastic teacher, that the time had come for my appearance, and that after two short months of rehearsal, the stage of the - should be ready for my debut. If time flew before, it halted now. Never, never would those two months pass. And yet they ought not to have gone so slowly, for I was very busy. The rehearsals themselves were enough to absorb me; and they did, but they never left me satisfied, and I longed to end them. Somehow I needed an audience, or so I thought. I could not warm up to empty benches; but my manager seemed satisfied, and fed me with flatteries, and expended great sums of money on my toilet and the stage accessories. He was sure of success, but not so sure as I was. I can say this now, since I have so egregiously failed, I neither doubted my voice nor my training nor my spirit. I left this room on that fatal night, calm. I took what I thought to be my last look of these miserable apartments, with the quiet farewell of one who feels her fortune assured. I left behind in it many memories, but I went forward to great hopes. When I heard the door close, I had the feeling of something shutting upon my past, and went downstairs and out to my carriage with a different step than that which had been accustomed to mark my departure.

"This feeling followed me to the theatre, and increased, rather than diminished, with the putting on of the dainty robes which another's enthusiasm had procured for me. Nor did the sounds of the orchestra make me equal, nor the voice of the call-boy; nothing moved me till, having crossed the stage, I caught a glimpse - or did I feel the presence - of the vast crowd that awaited in eager expectancy for my first notes. Then, indeed a dagger entered my heart and terror such as the victim of the amphitheatre alone can know, caught me in its clutches, paralyzing throat and limbs till I could have welcomed any death that would have annihilated my consciousness. I was before the footlights; I was in the spot which I had pictured myself for years, and I could

not sing a note; I could not even fly. I must stop and face the wonder, the pity, the disgust, that must be on every countenance, till Fate should come to my aid and break the spell that bound me.

"It came in the shape of a few stray efforts at applause, doubtless meant for my encouragement. The sound - it was the first I had heard - seemed to loosen the icy fetters that held my limbs enchained, and I sank, suffering frightfully, upon the floor of the stage, I was never more to mock by my presence. The curtain was rung down and I was carried away, whither, I hardly knew, and to what I could even then dimly guess, for my heart was broken, and my only earthly hope was at an end.

"But," eagerly interposed the artist, "you may be mistaken about this. Stage fright is common. Our greatest actors are subject to it. It is rather thought by them the token of genius, and a promise of future success. Surely your manager -"

"Do not speak of him, or of my masters. I shudder at the thought of their anger and cruel disappointment. I have never been able to face them, nor never can till I am able to reimburse them for all their useless expense. As for making another attempt, that is impossible, I had rather die. At the mere thought of confronting again that cruel sea of faces, the blood stops flowing in my veins and the world turns black before me. I was not made for a prima donna, or rather, something is lacking in me necessary for success upon the stage. Yet that success is all I have lived for, and without it, what am I?"

A Marble Statue of Sir Wilfred.

Montreal, Nov. 15. - Mr. Paul Chvire, the Parisian sculptor, who designed the Champlain monument on Duferin Terrace, Quebec, and the Mercy monument to be unveiled next spring in the Ancient Capital, was in Montreal to-day after a short trip to Ottawa. Mr. Chvire has just booked the order from the G. T. R. for a statue of Sir Wilfred Laurier to adorn the centre piece in the lobby of the Chateau Laurier in Ottawa.

The statue will be marble, along the lines of the bust of Sir Wilfred Laurier made by the same artist and presented to the ex-Premier in 1901. The bust will slightly exceed the natural size and will be supported by a single column adorned with appropriate allegories. It will be ready in the spring and will cost five thousand dollars.

Throughout the whole of its existence McGill has been sustained through the beneficence of private individuals—having neither a private nor a public revenue of its own. Affairs had arrived at that stage when the loyal friends of the University had decided to make a whirlwind campaign of the citizens of Montreal, and "right generously" have these latter contributed. Committees were organized and decided to canvass the city for five days, Monday to Friday. Every day they met at luncheon and reported progress. The first gift was one of \$100,000 on condition that the million be raised. Later a second gift of \$100,000 was given on condition that the final amount total to over one and one-half million.

Excitement was intense and everybody strained to aid "Old McGill." On Friday, noon, it was announced that the million mark had been reached and that the amount was very near a million and half. The students immediately held a meeting and that afternoon they canvassed the city from door to door and succeeded in raising over \$29,000.

The first official announcement came out at 9.30 on Thursday night in the "McGill Daily" extra and it was known that the total was \$1,528,965. At the final meeting of the committees many speeches were made expressing gratitude to the citizens and friends who had so willingly rallied to the rescue of our "Alma Mater, Old McGill." 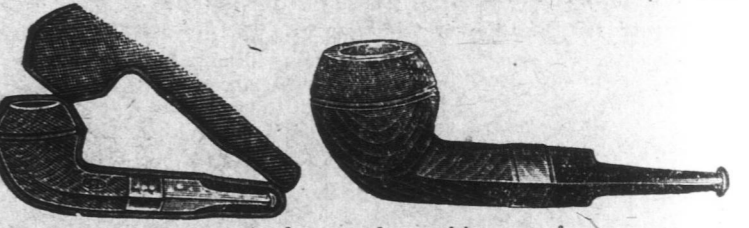

Bogus Duke Gets Long Term in Prison.

Notes From Greenspond.

Two boats belonging to the place carried the President and the Northern Delegates off to the ship, and volley firing was kept up from one of the boats the whole way out. In the meantime the cannon in the "battery" began to add their hoarse voices to the noise and bustle. It is conceded by everybody that a greater welcome has never been given to anyone previous to this in the memory of man.

What came near being a drowning accident happened as the Fogota was leaving here for South this trip. Two men from the shore were on board in the saloon enjoying a chat. By and by they felt the steamer quiver which told them that she was leaving. Both rushed for the wharf, but the steamer was a good distance off, and one, Mr. S. W. Hodnott, instead of landing on the wharf when he jumped fell into the water. Although a very heavy man he managed to keep afloat until the steamer came back and threw him a life, when he was hauled upon the Government wharf, not a very easy job. So far the man is not feeling any bad effects from his "cold bath."

Our schooners which had been lying up in Catalina for a long time waiting a favourable wind arrived safely this week. Many an anxious heart had a lead taken off it when the schooners arrived. We have seldom, perhaps never, had such a continuance of high winds.

Our respected doctor contemplates taking a trip to the Old Country. C. Cron, Esq., M.D., is going to supply for him during his absence of about 6 months.

It is rumored that one or more of our members for this Bay is going to resign and go into private life. One thing is sure when the election comes we will make the three of them resign then if they have not done so before. Should public opinion remain as it is now we can truthfully say: "Their day is done."

Several of our men have been in deer shooting and all have done well with them. One man was fortunate enough to shoot a fine fox. The skin is valued at \$300, but the man shot it with an exploding bullet, which damaged the skin considerably.

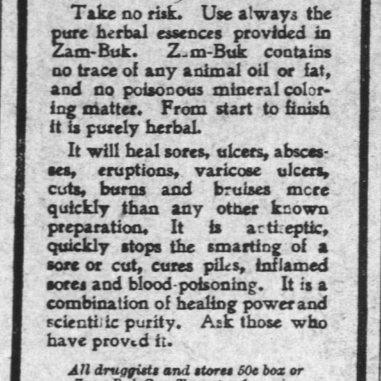

Sidewalk Sketches.

THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES.

The house of representatives is a popular assembly which is never so popular as when it adjourns sine die. It springs direct from the people, but they don't brag much about it among themselves. The life of a congressman is very hard. He is obliged to get up before noon and hang around the cloakroom until the steering committee decides how he ought to vote, and then he has to go out and entertain some visiting politician who wants the post-office and all there is on the bill of fare. The congressman is a reflector of public opinion, but he does most of his reflecting after somebody has beat him to it in a primary election. The house always revises the tariff and sends a few trust magnates to jail every session, but it doesn't get very gay about it unless the senate air brakes are in good working order. The senate looks down upon the house and bosses it around a good deal. The house never gets a Turkish bath or any patronage higher than a fourth-class postoffice until the senate pushes back from the table, and this doesn't happen often enough to make anybody giddy. It is the chief ambition of every congressman to break into the senate and engage in bossing and free baths, as there is no surplus of either in the house. The senate is a very cruel body, and once in a while it passes some bill which the house has sent up in a spirit of mere playfulness. When this happens the house goes into executive session, dismisses the chaplain and exposes the latest design in deckle-edged profanity. The house is composed chiefly of lawyers with a flourishing practice in the justice court, whose chief occupation is to construe the constitution and write "great applause" into their speeches—two very pleasing and harmless practices. The house is most responsive to the will of the people immediately before election.

Word comes from the scientific expedition of the American Museum of Natural History, of New York, which has been working in Lower California with the United States Government vessel Albatross for six months, that the new elephants found on Gaudaloupe Island were more than 13 feet high and 21 feet long. The Albatross is loaded with skins and bones of animals, many of them heretofore unknown except as prehistoric.

Big Sea Elephants in the Pacific

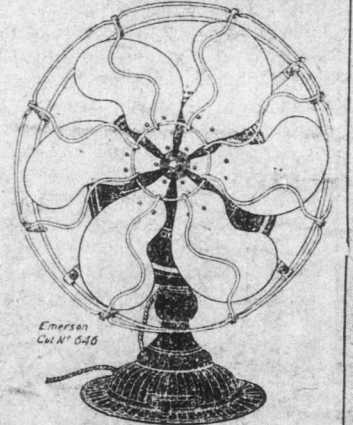

Mr. English Writes Again.

Editor Evening Telegram.

Dear Sir,—Up to the present time I have confined my remarks mainly to geological and mineralogical errors in "Callban." I intend after just a few more words on these subjects to turn my attention to other chapters of the book, geographical and economical. As far as grammatical errors they abound, one may find gems of tautology on many of the pages of "Callban." Here are a couple of samples: (p. 116) "Arable areas not exceeded by any others in the island; (p. 117) "Nowhere else in the island is there any thing like the quantity of pine timber to be met with here"; on page 108 we are told that all the iron ore needed for the furnaces at Sydney come from Bell Island. This is not correct, for Newfoundland ore contains too high percentage of phosphorus for the making of certain grades of steel, as for instance, Bessemer steel. Sydney imports Spanish and Cuban ores as well as Newfoundland ores. Mr. McGrath says there is undoubtedly vast mineral wealth in this country. I hope he is right, but his method of arriving at that cheerful conclusion is not very logical or convincing. He says that most of Canada's mineral wealth is found in the Laurion group of rocks, and that ore have large areas of the series in this country, therefore the mineral wealth must of course be there also. Let us look over this. We find that the Laurion group of Canada is at the top or near the top of the Lower Silurian system, and is represented mainly by sedimentary rocks. According to Mr. McGrath those rocks are represented in Newfoundland by serpentine and associated rocks. Mr. McGrath should read modern works. Should he do this he will find that a great deal of Canada's mineral wealth is derived from Huronian rocks, notably the rich silver, nickel and Cobalt mines of Sudbury and Lake Lemiscamingue, and the great copper mines of Lake Superior, not to mention the mineral wealth of the Yukon which is found in tertiary rocks, etc. Mr. McGrath's reasoning is a bit at fault, I think. So much for the minerals.

Now let us see what this wonderful book has to say about farming, fishing, etc. The first thing which takes our notice on page 116 is the distinction made by Mr. McGrath between potatoes and roots. Apparently Mr. McGrath does not know that a potato is a root. He says "the soil produces roots, potatoes, grass and other crops." I suppose he blames Mr. Downey for this mistake. Such mistakes one could well overlook were they not so numerous, but occurring as they do so numerously they form a nauseating dose. When Mr. McGrath speaks of the fisheries he commits mistakes that it is hard to find excuse for. For instance, a stranger might be led to believe that the "Grand Bank" is the only one frequented by our fishermen, were he guided by this wonderful book. On page 130 we read: "The bank fishery is somewhat like the North Sea fishery of the Mother Country. It is pursued by staunch vessels which cruise on 'the Grand Banks, between May and October.'" Can Mr. McGrath be ignorant of the existence of other banks, such as St. Pierre Bank, Georges Bank, etc. This is lamentable ignorance on the part of one who claims to know so much. He says the vessels are termed "bank-

ers" and evidently thinks the term an incorrect one, for a little further on he calls them **bankmen**. Speaking of the mode of fishing on the banks, the author or compiler (I know not what to call him) shows that his source of information is not very reliable. He does not know that the fishermen make "two sets" of their trawls per day. They "haul and set" in the morning, row back to the ship, put their catch on deck, go below for a "ding up" and then are off again to "haul and set." Evidently Mr. McGrath did not come to me for help when making up his astounding book. Fronting page 129 is a picture showing the method of removing the fat from a seal pelt. The method is alright, it is done by means of a knife, but the picture conveys the impression that two men are needed, (I suppose Mr. McGrath would call them "sklmen," for he calls the men who kill the seals, "sklmen"), one to hold the skin whilst the other cuts off the fat. It may be that to skin a very large pelt two men are needed, I have never seen it. Certainly it is that most of the "sculpins" are skinned by one man, with usually a boy or man to put them on the skinning table for him. It is a one man's job. To-morrow I will take up other pages to see what gems they contain.

A Tremendous Sea Sweeps

Decks of French Line Steamer, Carrying Four Men Overboard, While Three Others Were Stretched Unconscious.

New York, Nov. 28.—A tremendous sea, which hammered the bow and swept the decks of the Fabre Line steamship Santa Anna, caused the death of four seamen and the serious injury of three others. News of the disaster was brought to port when the liner arrived to-day from Marseilles and Naples.

The ship's passage as a whole was stormy and unpleasant, but it was not until last Thursday that the heaviest sea was encountered, described by Capt. Pavri as the most terrific he ever encountered. A great mass of water rose like a wall before the vessel, then fell with crushing force upon the decks and sweeping over the forward part of the ship carried seamen Burnard, Hart, Caliste and Quiritto off the decks like cork. Three others were stretched out unconscious on the decks.

The impact of the wall of water had nearly stopped the ship. The engines were reversed quickly, life buoys were thrown out promptly, and, as the vessel neared the spot where the four had been swept into the sea, all hands on board were overjoyed to see them floating on the buoys. The sea was so violent, however, that three of them soon relinquished their hold and sank. Of the injured on board, it was found that Seaman Fozzell's spine was broken, and he died two days later.

Cure for Drunkenness.

A Magic Lantern Showed a Drunkard in the Hands of the Devil.

An interesting story telling of a novel cure for drunkenness comes from a village on the Bober. A newly-married Czech workman gave way to drink, and created unseemly disturbances in the house in which he lived. All efforts to induce him to give up the habit were in vain. Even corporal punishment administered by a person of whom he stood in awe had no effect. A little boy in the house in which he lived had a magic lantern given to him on his birthday, and it occurred to one of the tenants that the present might be utilized in curing the drunkard, who was known to be of a superstitious character.

Among the pictures shown by the lantern was one representing a drunkard in the hands of the devil. The drunkard was supposed to be on his way to the place of torment.

The man came home drunk as usual one night, and on reaching his door, was thrown into a state of consternation on seeing this awful picture. He immediately sank on his knees and began to pray to the apparition for forgiveness. He promised there and then that he would give up all connection "with the other devil." He has kept his word.

Fr. Vaughan Praised.

King George and Queen Mary at Boston.

Boston, Nov. 28.—More than 3,000 people thronged the Church of the Immaculate Conception last evening to hear Rev. Fr. Bernard Vaughan, S. J., in the final sermon of his series in Boston.

When the preacher mounted the pulpit he commented on the reports that he had read in some of the papers in this country concerning the King and Queen of England, and declared that he could not allow them to pass without protest.

Fr. Vaughan maintained that he did not think there had sat on the throne of England sovereigns more esteemed and revered than were King George and Queen Mary. They had both won their way by lives consecrated to duty among all sections of the community, and he could not speak too highly of them.

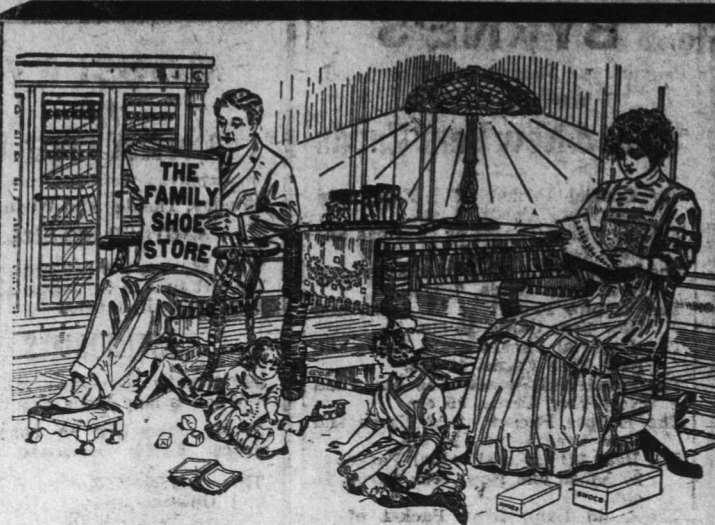

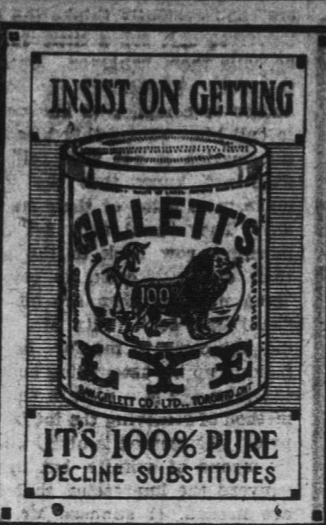

An excellent programme was rendered at the Synod Building last evening at 8 o'clock by the C. E. T. S. The attendance was large and enthusiastic. After the usual exercises and the singing of a hymn, there was a short musical programme interspersed with readings and recitations. Mrs. Bell played a piano solo charmingly, and readings were given by Mr. Ross and Mr. Cullen. There were several recitations and songs, after which Rev. James Bell delivered a lecture on "The amount of money paid in labor on various articles" as compared with the small amount spent in the manufacture of spirits. By the figures he showed the great waste of money amongst those who purchased liquor. The money spent in buying boots caused the maker to set to work and keep up his stock. He had to work to do so and had to pay others to help him, thereby distributing wages. The buying of strong drink did not give rise to any employment worth speaking of. The laborer got no labor or in replenishing the stock like in the purchase of other articles. In \$5 spent on coal the laborer received \$2.70 wages; \$5 on railways the workman received \$1.50; \$5 on cotton goods the workman got \$1.30; \$5 on iron and steel meant \$1.08 for the workman; \$5 spent on clothing meant \$1.06 for the laborer. Now contrast beer and spirits. Five dollars spent on beer the workman gets 30 cents worth of labor; and if you spent \$5 on spirits you put only 11 cents into the workman's hands. At the close of the address seven new members signed the pledge. Rev. Mr. Bell pronounced Benediction, after which teas were served.

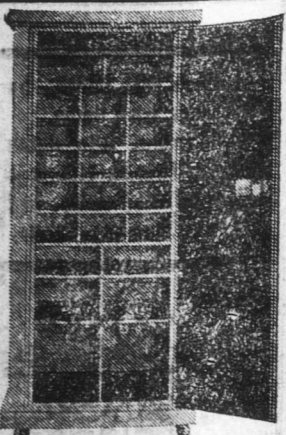

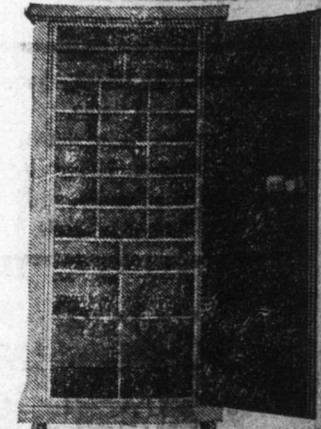

Suppose, my dear Madame, that you were the postman's or the expressman's wife and wanted a little of your husband left on Christmas day to enjoy it with you—how would you feel about it then?

Remember, we are supposed to be doing all this to celebrate the birthday of Him whose teachings are focused in the great rule, "As ye would that men should do to you, do ye even so to them."

Do you think we shall be celebrating that birthday rightly if we consistently ignore and forget that rule in our preparations?

This does not mean that it has gone out of style entirely, because it is seen on many excellent gowns, but the new thing is to use satin instead.

The simplest labour-saving device may quite possibly be worth a fortune. experiment. The tools were offered to a large contractor, who promised to let some of his men use the new shovels and report results.

About a week afterwards the contractor returned with the information that his men were fairly quarrelling as to who should use the new tools, some arriving to work a quarter of an hour before time in order to be there first when the tool box was opened. The navy's suggestion had proved a good one; a patent was secured, and an agreement made between the navy, the manufacturer, and the contractor. A Chapter for the Young Housewife.

If it were not for the perfection to which gas appliances have been brought, the position of any housewife without a servant would be a very difficult one. Imagine having to undertake the cooking for even the smallest family, if it were not for that delightful gas cooker! To take one item alone, namely, the fetching of coals. This is essentially a job for which one needs help and a servant in an average middle-class household; but, with the cooker, one strike of the match is all one has to do when cooking is the order of the day. It is now only necessary to light the cooker just a little while before starting operations; for amongst the virtues of gas is the speed with which dishes can be prepared for the table. Besides this cooking by gas is such clean work. When one's hands were plunged in pastry, under the old regime, it might just happen to be at this particular moment the stove might never stoking; but, having once raised the temperature of the oven to the desired height, there is nothing else about which to trouble now that gas does all that is necessary to ensure a successful result for our culinary operations. Then, again, gas is so reliable; there are no bulks to contend with, as in the case of a coal-heated range, when sometimes a good deal of coaxing is required before the fire will condescend to put a bright face on things. Once having lighted the gas, it is quite possible, after having seen that a sauceman is fairly on the boil, to put it on the smallest jet, and go and either lay the table for a meal, or even fetch from out-of-doors some forgotten article, with the full assurance that all will be well and that the dish in preparation will not suffer.

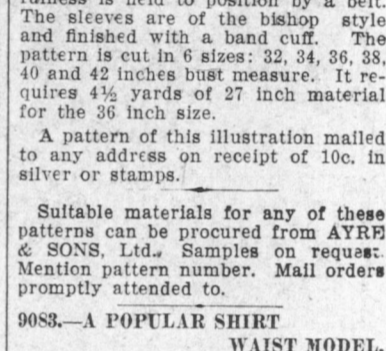

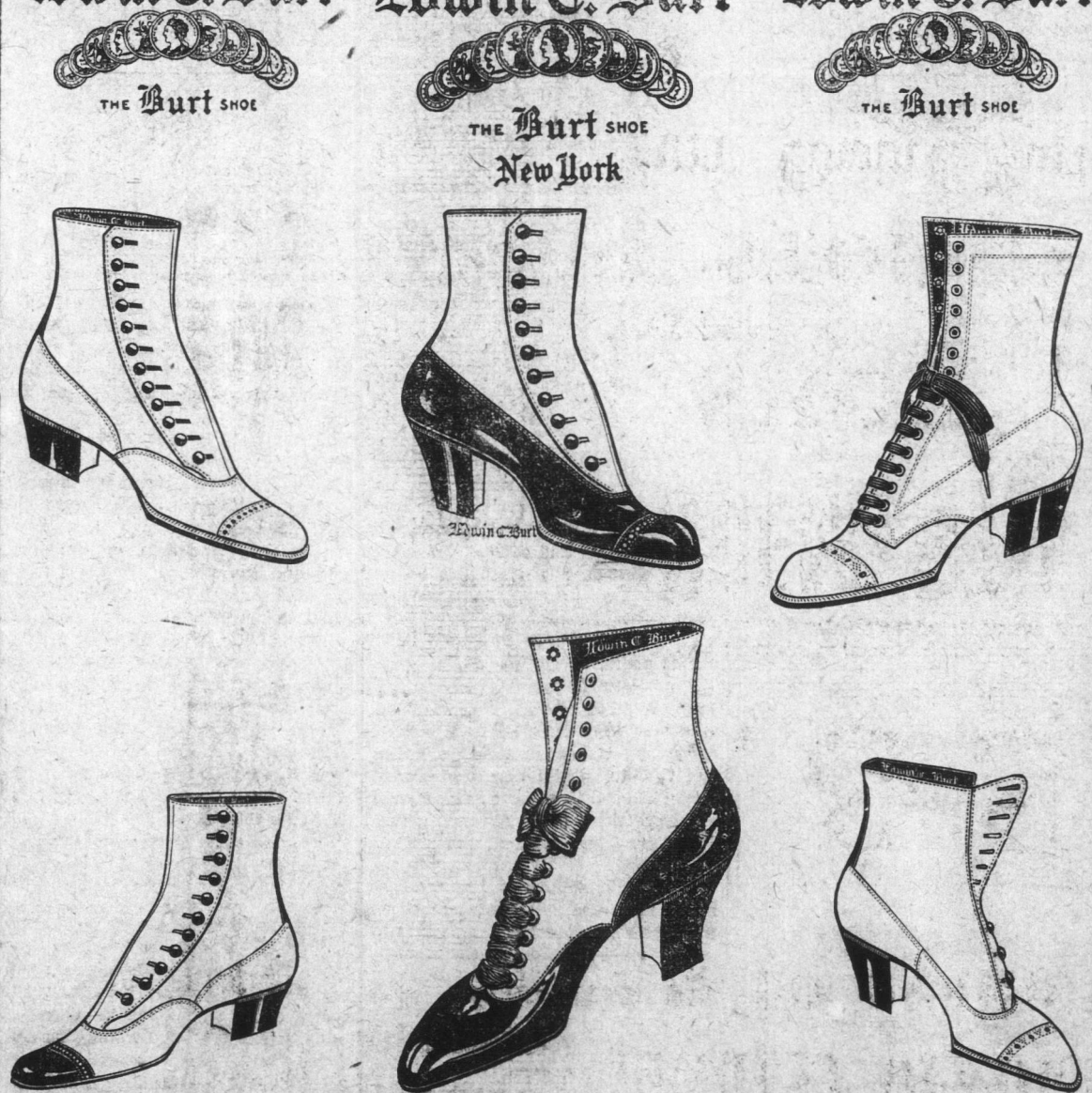
