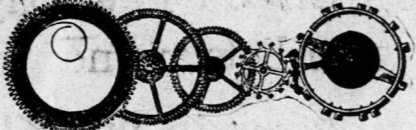

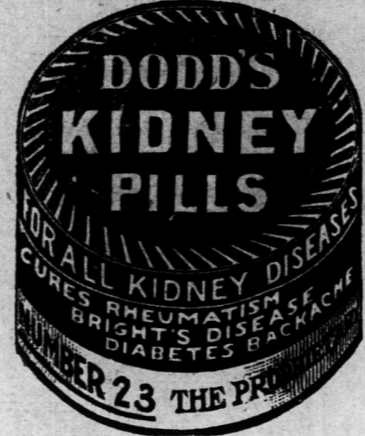

It is natural that the young married woman, carried away as she is with her new viewpoint on life, should be in an expansive and communicative mood.

But if she wants to be sure of having nothing to regret in after life, let her keep constantly in mind the saying of the old Greek philosopher:—

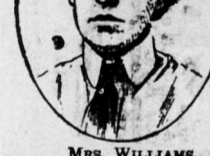
"I have often regretted my speech; never my silences."

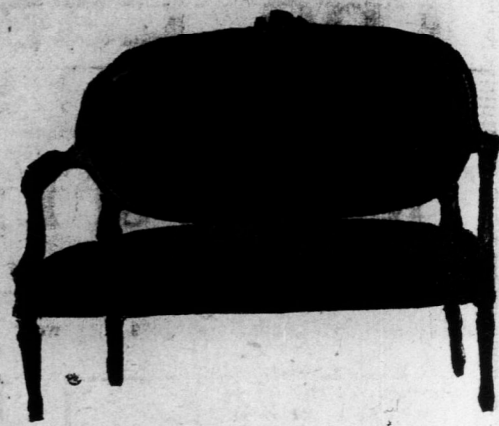

 Mr. C. S. Pilsent's motion to adopt the Report on Felld College was passed.
 Rev. G. S. Chamberlain's question re duties of Church Wardens was answered by the Bishop, that one Warden cannot take any action without consulting the other Warden and Incumbent.
 Mr. Watson introduced a Bill to amend Chap. 1, Sec. 9, and Chap. 7, Sec. 2, which was read a first time. Second reading to-morrow. House rose at 5.25 p.m.
Evening Session.
 House resumed at 7.30 p.m. Mr. Blackall presented the Report of Committee on boarding accommodation for girls, which was received.

 The Reports of Committee on Queen's College and securing and training candidates for Holy Orders were upon motion of Canons Bolt and Smith adopted. Canon White moved the adoption of Report on Education; passed. Canon White will on to-morrow move the consideration of certain Resolutions in connection with the Education Report.
 Mr. Blackall moves that the Bishop be requested to ask the Committee on Candidates to continue their work.
 House adjourned at 10 p.m., the Bishop pronouncing the Benediction.
 The deaf and dumb woman who was run over by a carriage near Portugal Cove Saturday night and was rendered unconscious, was taken into Mr. Jos. Goslin's house and everything possible done for her by the driver and the clergyman with him. When she revived she was taken to Hospital. 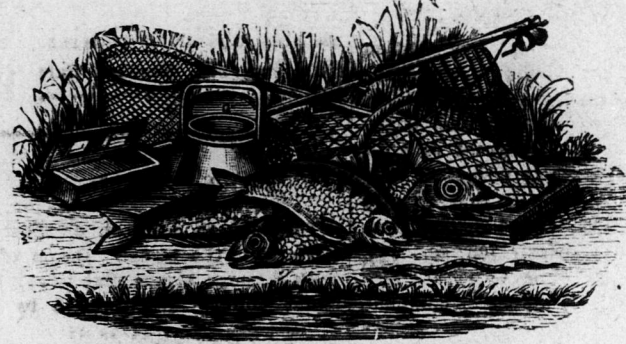
