

An important statement was made last night by Postmaster General Samuels, in the Commons, with regard to the Government's plan for reforming the House of Lords. Pre-mier Asquith, earlier in the evening "toot," when tather and mother have speaking on the subject, said he as rollicking a good time as children would take the earliest opportunity of proposing a plan which would make the Lords a truly impartial and judicial authority. Samuels said the new Second Chamber would contain no vestige of the hereditary principle and under no circumstances would its absolute veto be restored. The House of Lords would be abolished during the lifetime of the present Parliaelected chamber of about 150 on an official Opposition amendment to the address moved by Walter Long concerning the operation of the Par-iament Act. He submitted that it would be improper to proceed further with measures of so great importance as the Home Rule and Welsh Disesablishment Bills, while the legislaion of Parliament was still incom-plete, and without reference to the electors. Mr. Long said the Government had shattered legisaltion. By its failure to fulfil its debt of honor to reform the Lords, the country had

been left under single Chamber government, for the House of Lords is at present paralyzed so far as effective action goes. Premier Asquith, replying, asked who shattered the Con-stitution? Our old constitutional arrangements were shattered, he answered, when some three or four years ago the Lords rejected the Budget. Everything that has since happened is the direct legitimate and inevitable consequence of that arbitary and revolutionary proceeding. After

declaring that the Parliament Act was an imperfect and incomplete thing, Mr. Asquith said: "I shall welcome with unaffected sincerity. the day, and I hope it will soon arrive, when I shall have the honor of proposing a plan which will reconstruct the Second Chamber into a truly impartial and judicially-minded

authority." LONDON, March 13. The British Naval Estimates for 1913-14 announced to-day, are \$321,-546,500, as compared with \$225,377,000 last year. The new building programme provides for five battleships, eight light cruisers, sixteen torpedo boat destroyers, and a number of submarines. The personnel of the Navy will be increased to 146,000 officers and men. There will be under construction April 1st, eleven battle-ships; three battleship-cruisers, thir-teen light cruisers, thirty-five torpedo marines. During the year now clos destroyers, five light cruisers, fifteen lestroyers, and three submarines

were completed. LONDON, March 13, Admiral Sir Archibald Douglas, G.C.V.O., K.C.B., who was born in Quebec, died yesterday at Newnham Hook, Hampshire, aged 71. At the end of last year he underwent a seri-ous operation. Though he had been able to do a certain amount of work, he never really recovered. Of high professional attainments and wide experience, Sir Archibald was a dili-gent worker and served loyally and ia held in place on the corsage by a the back of the arm, its bright lining ably in many responsible posts. 




