LONDON, March 13. An important statement was made last night by Postmaster General Samuel, in the Commons, with regard to the Government's plan for reforming the House of Lords. Premier Asquith, earlier in the evening, speaking on the subject, said he would take the earliest opportunity of proposing a plan which would make the Lords a truly impartial and judicial authority. Samuel said the new Second Chamber would contain no vestige of the hereditary principle, and under no circumstances would its absolute veto be restored. The House of Lords would be abolished during the lifetime of the present Parliament. This is as far as Mr. Samuel went, but previous declarations show that the proposal is likely to be an elected chamber of about 150 senators. The question arose in a debate on an official Opposition amendment to the address moved by Walter Long concerning the operation of the Parliament Act. He submitted that it would be improper to proceed further with measures of so great importance as the Home Rule and Welsh Disestablishment Bills, while the legislation of the House of Lords is still incomplete, and without reference to the electors. Mr. Long said the Government had shattered legislation. By its failure to fulfil its debt of honor to reform the Lords, the country had been left under single Chamber government, for the House of Lords is at present paralyzed so far as effective action goes. Premier Asquith, replying, asked who shattered the Constitution? Our old constitutional arrangements were shattered, he answered, when some three or four years ago the Lords rejected the Budget. Everything that has since happened in the direct and legitimate and inevitable consequence of that revolutionary proceeding. After declaring that the Parliament Act was an important and incomplete thing, Mr. Asquith said: "I shall welcome with unaffected sincerity, the day, and I hope it will soon arrive, when I shall have the honor of proposing a plan which will reconstruct the Second Chamber into a truly impartial and judicially-minded authority."

LONDON, March 13. The British Naval Estimates for 1913-14 announced to-day, are \$321,646,500, as compared with \$225,477,000 last year. The new building programme provides for five battleships, eight light cruisers, sixteen torpedo boat destroyers, a number of submarines. The personnel of the Navy will be increased to 146,000 officers and men. There will be under construction April 1st, eleven battleships, three battleship-cruisers, thirteen light cruisers, thirty-five torpedo boat destroyers, and twenty-one submarines. During the year now closing, four battleships, three battleship destroyers, five light cruisers, fifteen destroyers, and three submarines were completed.

LONDON, March 13. Admiral Sir Archibald Douglas, G.C.V.O., K.C.B., who was born in Quebec, died yesterday at Newnam Hook, Hampshire, aged 71. At the end of last year he underwent a serious operation. Though he had been able to do a certain amount of work, he never really recovered. Of high professional attainments and wide experience, Sir Archibald was a diligent worker and served loyally and ably in many responsible posts. His genial and generous disposition won for him the regard and respect of a wide circle of friends by whom he will be generally mourned. He retired from active service in 1907.


NAPLES, March 13. Ex-President Porfirio Diaz declared today that he would not return to Mexico. He was looking well after his arrival from Egypt on board the s.s. Adriatic. In reply to enquiries he said his only desire was to be allowed to rest quietly, but all his efforts would be directed to assisting the prosperity of his native land. In case of intervention by the United States, his countrymen without distinction, would be united against the foreign invader.

FORT SMITH, Ark., March 13. Marcen Capps, a miner and former minister, was found guilty of burning three of his five children to death and sentenced to the gallows. Capps was charged with binding his children on an oil-soaked bed and setting fire to the building. He claimed the house was set on fire by the overturning of a lamp.

Yesterday afternoon, the Board of Trade members met to discuss the want of uniformity in the weights and measures of merchandise sold in this country, with a view to asking the Government to enact legislation and have the matter adjusted. Mr. W. G. Gosling presided over the representative gathering of merchants. After a lengthy discussion in connection with certain irregularities, it was known to exist in the selling of certain goods, it was the opinion of the Board to have some articles properly standardized. Resolutions were passed, (1) as certain irregularities as mentioned existed, it was desirable to have them remedied by Act of Legislature, and (2) that certain articles be sold at a specified weight.

Sub-Committees comprising retail and wholesale men, were appointed to decide the best and most feasible means of handling goods and their reports will be passed and forwarded with the Resolutions to the Government.

Preparing to Rebuild.

Early to-day the Reid Nfd. Co. set to work a number of their employees to clear away the debris and get ready to rebuild the engine shops destroyed by fire yesterday. A deal of the machinery is good enough to be again put in use, as well as a large amount of other material. 



CROSBIE'S

Pull With the Government.

One member of the Executive has a good "pull," a strong "pull" and a thoroughly effective "pull" with the present Government. We refer to the Hon. J. C. Crosbie. Mr. Crosbie has neglected no means of "making hay while the sun shines." He realized he had but a few years in which to make his pile and he set about it vigorously and earnestly. "After me the deluge," said Master John, to himself, as well as Morris and Morison will make patriotism pay.

Crosbie's spar has now become notorious. Special reference is hardly needed to it. Everyone knows what a fine price, no less than \$2,200, was paid for the Marconi spar which Crosbie saved from a wreck purchased for a small sum.

This was at the beginning of his career. It was followed by the coastal contracts made with his company, the Newfoundland Products Company, of which the Hon. Donald Morison, the Attorney General is a co-Director with Mr. Crosbie.

Mr. Morison has made himself famous in connection with another company, the Anglo Development Co., which received so many million acres of land from the Colony. In fact Mr. Morison's land transactions, almost but not quite, staggered Governor Williams.

But to return to Master John Crosbie. Having sold his spar at a fair, very fair profit, he set about making his coastal contracts. For the first service he gets \$15,000 for 33 weekly trips and for the Fortune Bay service \$20,000 for 22 weekly trips. When it is remembered that the Fortune service pays remarkably well on passenger and freight traffic, it will be seen that Master John and Master Donald, two wily members of the Executive, have received a good thing in these coastal contracts.

Governor Williams, deprecated the action of Ministers of the Crown being interested in contracts with the Government but condoned it, because some precedent existed. But no precedent for such a glaring case as this can be presented. It was not easy for "stagger" Governor Williams, though some of Morison's actions came pretty near it.

We wonder what His Excellency Governor Davidson, thinks of this conduct of two of his advisers. He may be unaware of it. If so President Coaker might call his attention

Cable News.

ALEXANDRIA, La. To-day.—The town of Provincial, La. 32 miles west of here was wiped out by a cyclone; negro boy killed and 15 persons injured.

LONDON, To-day.—No important fighting in the near East has occurred since Sunday according to an official Turkish statement; position at Adrianople unchanged.

PARIS, To-day.—A debate fought with greatest issues opened in the Senate; Government's Electoral Reform Bill, after being accepted by Deputies, July 1912, was sent to committee by the Senate. Committee presided over by George Clemenceau, former Premier, has now returned the Bill but without clauses providing for proportional representation. The debate is likely to be a long and fierce one as the Government makes the principle of proportional representation a question of confidence, and it is pointed out in the lobbies that the refusal of the Senate to vote this principle is liable to bring about not only a ministerial crisis but a deadlock between the two houses which can be settled only by a dissolution.

GLASGOW, To-day.—Students of Glasgow University and fifty dock laborers came to grips at a suffragette meeting in St. Andrew's Hall; students fared badly, many of them were beaten, scores ejected, and some taken to hospital. The remainder of the meeting in silence. Mrs. Emeline Pankhurst, suffragette leader, was announced to address the suffragettes. A large body of students from the University came to the Hall for the express purpose of breaking up the meeting, but got more than they bargained for. When Miss Allan was introduced, when Mrs. Pankhurst the students, who were in force at the back of the hall, started an uproar, immediately a detachment of stewards and dock laborers swooped upon them and a free fight followed.

Writes on Educational Matters.

LETTER II.

Editor Evening Telegram.

Dear Sir,—In my former letter I endeavoured to show the absolute need of an increase in the Elementary School Grant, and more particularly the High School Grant, if our port schools are to maintain their efficiency, and if School Boards are to be placed in a position to offer teachers a living wage. I wish now to speak of the allocation of these grants. The Education Act needs to be amended in many particulars, but especially in the mode of payment to the Boards of Education of the amounts voted for their expenditure. As matters stand at present, a sum of money is deposited in the Bank at definite periods to the credit of the Boards. This one amount has to cover all expenditure, viz., salaries of teachers, erection and repair of school buildings, funnelling, fuel, school requisites, and a number of other contingencies. With this a great number of teachers disagree. They observe in the Annual Reports that almost every School Board has a "balance in hand," and they say, and rightly so, Why are not our salaries larger when you have money in hand wherewith to pay? What is the meaning of these balances?

In the olden days, if a new school was needed to be erected in a settlement, or if one was to be enlarged or repaired, it was the custom for the Board to dismiss the teacher, close the school for 12 months, sometimes longer, and with the money that would have gone for salary to permit an amount to accumulate which could be spent in the erection of the building. Teachers naturally remonstrated, and asked, "Why should our money be spent in providing schoolhouses?" The Government was abused for permitting such a state of things. And there was friction and distrust between the teacher and his Board. The same thing in a measure still continues.

I would suggest a remedy for all this. The Education Act, or the system of payment of monies to Boards, needs amendment. Presuming that the grant be sufficiently increased to permit the payment of teachers' salaries in full, I would suggest, that two separate grants be made and deposited in the Bank. One amount (say 75 cents to the dollar) should be

specified as for Teachers' Salaries: to be expended in no other way. If a balance of this amount remained unexpended at the end of the year, it should revert to the Government. No Board would be likely to permit this to occur. And a second amount should be deposited (say 25 cents to the dollar) especially for Maintenance, Equipment and necessary repairs. Any balance of this sum at the end of the year should be retained by the Board, as other sums might accrue and be added to it, such as voluntary subscriptions, and be applied to the structure.

In this way no teacher could any longer have a grievance, when all the money voted for salary was expended in his interest. And Boards of Education would have something to "veer and haul on" without interfering with the teachers' prerogative. A word or two may be said about these "balances." Many hundreds of dollars are permitted to lie in the Bank. No interest is allowed, on these amounts; although should a Board overdraw one cent beyond its account a peremptory note is at once received, imperatively demanding repayment.

The only cure for this would be for the Chairman or Secretary of a Board, at the end of a financial year, to draw a cheque for the amount of this balance and deposit it in the Government Savings Bank, where it will earn at least three per cent. interest, and can be withdrawn in larger or smaller amounts. Or, if there is no branch Bank, the Government might arrange for a Money Order Office to receive and repay such amounts.

As I have remarked, the Education Act needs to be consolidated and likewise amended. Almost every denomination violates it in some degree, and the scale of fees is ignored in many instances. One objectionable clause should certainly be struck out, viz., the restricting a High School Grant to \$160. The abolition of fees seems likely to be relegated to the Greek Kalends.

The members of the C.H.E. are experts, no doubt, in propounding theories. They know what should be taught, certainly, and how it should be taught. But I would just like to see one of those would-be benefactors putting their own resolutions into practice in one of our outport schools, where the prevailing cry is "no apparatus" and "no money"—the Board's bankruptcy.

Now, Sir, it is under such conditions that the majority of outport teachers have to work. And in the face of all that why do not the other Boards, and the teachers especially, instead of criticising the honest action (honest, I say, because they are not posing to do what they know is impossible to be done) of the Carbonear Methodist Board, join in supporting it? Let us wake up, teachers, and remind our Boards of the facts as they are. Then they must do one of three things—plank down forty or fifty dollars for books and apparatus, put up with a wholesale failure in the coming exam., or follow the action of Carbonear.

Cable News.

LONDON, March 13. The English scheme for the commemoration of a hundred years of peace between Britain and America, provides for a permanent memorial which will cost \$250,000. It is proposed to acquire Surgrave Manor, Northamptonshire, the seat of the Washington family, and make it a centre for American visitors, and also to establish a University chair of Anglo-American history at London, with James Bryce as the first Professor.

LONDON, March 13. Oxford won the Varsity Boat Race to-day. She not only had half of last year's famous crew, and selected today's crew last term. The Cambridge crew was pronounced by experts as the best for ten years. Oxford's time was 20 minutes, 53 seconds. For the first time, Cambridge rowed a centre seated boat. Two Australians, H. K. Ward and C. L. Bailleu, occupied seats in the Oxford shell.

OTTAWA, March 13. At midnight Canada's parliament passed the 29th hour of continuous sitting (Sunday excepted), on Clause 2 of the Navy Bill. There is no sign of any let up. Sir Wilfrid Laurier, who has been ill since Monday, may not be able to appear in the House this week.

PARIS, March 13. The urgency of the French Government's Bill to increase the peace footing of the Army, has been pointed out to the finance and military committees of the Chamber of Deputies by Eugene Etienne, Minister of War, according to a semi-official note.

LONDON, March 13. The rate of discount in the Bank of England, remained unchanged at five per cent. to-day.

PERTH, March 13. Hon. John Haggart, died this morning.

C. I. B. Avalon Battalion met last night at their Armoury and the different sections competed in the various drill exercises for the Outerbridge Shield. The winners will be announced later. Last year No. 3 squad of B. Company carried off the trophy.

A meeting of ex-members of the C. C. C. took place in the Armoury of the Corps last evening for the purpose of forming a reserve company. Lt.-Col. Conroy presided, and after some discussion it was the unanimous opinion of the meeting to start the new organization which will comprise a military reserve and a club or fraternal society. The reserve will be commanded by officers appointed by the Lt.-Col. and will participate in parades. The club will be conducted on social lines and will select its own officers during Easter week when the rules of management will be drawn up. On next Tuesday night another meeting will be held when all who wish to become identified with the new body will be present.


