### The Definition of an Amateur.

Lyons, France, June 13 .- The definition of an amateur has been agreed upon by a committee of the international Amateur Athletic Association. It follows closely the dethe special committee submitted to the federation held at Berlin in 1912 and embraces the following rules. 1-An amateur is one, who com-

petes only for the love of sport. 2-Competing for money or any other pecuniary reward in any sport considered an athletic sport makes sports considered as athletic sports. 3-In the event of an amateur ompeting with or against a professional in any sport, not for money and other pecuniary reward, then the member of the federation to which the athlete belongs shall be the judge of such competitor's status according to its own rules, and its certificate as to the competitor's status shall be accepted by all members of

4.—In track and field athletic sports anyone who knowingly competes with or against a professional thereby ceases to be an amateur.

5-One who teaches, trains or coaches in any sport for money or rofessional, except, however, that so far as competiton n hs own country and there only, is concerned, as an state or a school or other educational coaches as an incident to his main not be a professional, as the members of the federation of the country of.

### Canadian City Debts.

As in the United Kingdom, the tendency of the times has been in recent years the piling up of immens municipal debts. Particularly is this true of the growing cities in the West. The other day we gave an instance of the Municipal debt of Van-This has naturally had an effect on the rate of interest at which these municipalities have to pay on the money they raise. In the Empire Review for June, Calgary 4½ p.c. debts. are quoted at 94; Edmonton 41/2's at 91; Montreal 4's at 92; Quebec 4's at 96; Regina 41/2's a 91; Toronto 4's at 95; Vancouver 4's at 90; and Winnipeg 4's at 92. Calgary is one of the cities of the West whose population has increased from 12,500 in 1905 to 85,000 in 1913. monton is another city which has grown rapidly during the last decade. Regina had a population of 200 in 1882. Ten years ago its population was over 3,000; in 1913 the population is given at 50,000. Winnipeg's population in 1902 was 48,411. In 1912 it was given as 166,553. Despite the evidence of immense growth in population and resources, these cities have to pay a greater rate of interest than the City of St. John's does to the Government which raised the money for the city on 31/2 per cent. debentures. The smaller cities are in a much more unenviable position, as will be seen from a few extracts we





### NEWS BY CABLE.

LONDON, June 24. John Redmond's appeal to America for funds to equip the Irish Voluneers, raises the question as to what that body, whilst the importation of if ministers comply, any action they take must have the effect of freeing gun running by Nationalist counties. In Galway Harbor, on Tuesday, a cargo steamer was held up by the cruiser Diamond, but nothing contraband was found on her. Following recent rumors as to arms being landed in Connemara, it is noticeable that the Volunteer district have been notified they can be equipped, with rifles as soon as they are efficient. A grand total of sixty rifles were seized from continental steamers this week.

VIENNA. June 24. An escort of twenty aeroplanes flying mourning flags and manned by aviators from several nations, formed a flying guard of honor at the burial to-day of nine Austrian officers and men, killed in the tragic air-catastrophe, a few miles from here on Saturday. The presence of this aerial fleet created a vivid impression. An enormous concourse of people, including several Archdukes, members of the Austrian Cabinet, and foreign military attaches were present. While the funeral service was in progress, several aircraft circled round the cemetery, and then flew off in com-

FREDERICHSHAVEN, June 24. Ten bodies were recovered this morning from Lake Constance, and 25 more missing are believed to have heen drowned by a sudden and terrific storm, which occurred over this region. The storm broke so quickly that the fishermen were unable to reach the land, only a mile or so away. Many were rescued by Lake steamers and other craft, after their light boats had capsized.

SOUTHAMPTON, June 24. Shamrock IV had her first hard weather trial, with the older Shamrick, and acquitted herself well in a stiff northwesterly breeze, necessitating reefed mainsail. The Challenger worked out a lead of three minutes in a run of five miles. This was followed by a ten-mile thrash to windward, in which the Challenger did better, beating her opponent by 12

TORONTO, June 24. In only three ridings of Ontario will the voices of candidates be silent between now and election day (June 29th). Nomination was held vesterday throughout the Province, resulting in the placing of candidates in every electoral district, with the exception of North Renfrew, Glengary and West York.

SCHWERIN, Germany, June 24. Another aviation fatality occurred to the German Army Flying Corps today, when Lieut. Kolbe was killed by the overturning of his aeroplane which he was piloting, during a too abrupt landing. Capt. Ruff, a passen-ger, sustained a broken leg.


