

This is cheering news for the days when the Chancellor of the Exchequer is to tell us how many times he will increase the income tax.

"How large an indebtedness an old nation can incur without serious strain and without much discomfort is shown by the experience of Great Britain in the Napoleonic wars of a Great Britain's Expenditure in 1913-1 century ago," says Sir George Paish. "It is true that at that time the taxation of the poor was heavy, but, on the other hand, the taxation of the rich was light, and no one ever doubted the country's power to meet a debt charge which called for 11 per cent. of the nation's annual income, or to carry a debt that was equal to over one-third of the nation's total wealth and to three times the nation's anwould, however, severely strain the powers of a young country, as the latter would probably owe abroad the greater part of the sum borrowed

"The British obligation of nearly £900,000,000 in 1816 was debt incurred for purely unproductive purposes, and the interest upon it had to come out of an income not appreciably increased by the creation of the

"And the British people experienced no difficulty in meeting this great burden of interest, which was equal to 11 per cent. of their total income. Moreover, in 1816 the total annual expenditure of the Government reached £65,000,000—a sum equal to over 25 per cent, of the nation's entire in-

point a person to be Censor of the point a person to be Censor of the writings, copy or matter printed or posing, to have acted in contravention of such regulations in like manner as the publications issued at any print- it he had committed the act. ing house, printing establishment or works, and any person so appointed sistants, from time to time, and remain there for such time or times as may be reasonably necessary, and to examine, consider, approve or reject any writing, copy or matter printed or proposed to be printed at said premises, and, after the appointment of any such person and the notimanager or person in charge of the other matter shall be printed there or issued for publication therefrom which is not approved by the person so appointed as Censor, and any such printing or issue for publication, without such approval, shall be deemed to be a contravention of this order. 2. The printing or circulation or procuring to be printed or circulated of any letter, communication, report or news concerning the operations of the present war or the movement of any of the forces, naval or military, of His Majesty or of His Majesty's allies, or as to any of the naval or military forces or operations of His Majesty or of His Majesty's allies connected with or for the puroose of the war, or criticising or commenting upon the policy, proceedings or action of the Government of any neutral state, if such printing or circulation or any of the statements conreport or news be likely to cause disaffection to His Majesty or to prevent, hinder or interfere with the success of the forces by land or by sea of His Majesty or of His Majesty's allies, or with any foreign state or otherwise

to prejudice His Majesty's relations to assist or encourage the enemy, or to prevent, embarrass or hinder the successful prosecution of the war, shall be deemed to be a contravention of this order, and, in any prosecution for or in respect of any such offence instituted by the authority of the Attorney General, it shall be presumed, in the absence of proof to the contrary, that the printing or circulation of the statements in respect of which the prosecution is brought were likely to cause disaffection to His Majesty or to prevent, hinder or interfere with the success of the forces by land or by sea of His Majesty or of His Majesty's allies or to prejudice His Majesty's relations with a foreign state or otherwise to assist or encourage the enemy or to prevent, embarrass or hinder the successful prosecution of the war. 3. For any contravention of this or der the offender shall be liable upon indictment to imprisonment for a

term not exceeding two years, and to a fine not exceeding five thousand dollars, or upon summary conviction to imprisonment for a term not exceeding six months, and a fine not exceeding two thousand dollars; and the proprietor of the premises, and every director or officer of any corporation controlling or operating the premises, where any such offence is committed, shall also severally be liable upon indictment or summary conviction to imprisonment and fine as aforesaid. Moreover, all copies of any book, newspaper, periodical, pamphlet, or tract printed, issued, circulater or published in contravention of this order, in the possession of whomsoever they may be, may be seized and destroyed by any peace officer, and, if the Colonial Secretary so direct, the printing presses, plant and machinery within or connected with the premises shall be seized, and the premises may be closed indefinitely or for such period as the Colonial Secretary may name.

of the War Measures Act, 1914, His Excellency the Governor in Council has been pleased to approve the following Rules and Regulations:

1 No person shall, without lawful authority, publish or communicate any information with respect to the movement or disposition of any of the forces, ships, or war materials of His Majesty or of His Majesty's Allies, or with respect to the plans of any naval or military operations by any such forces or ships, or with respect to any works or measures undertaken for or

onnected with the fortification or defence of any place, if the information is such as is calculated to be or might be directly or indirectly useful

2 No person shall, without the permission of the competent naval or military authority, make any photograph, sketch, plan, model or other representation of any of the forces or ships of His Majesty of any of His Majesty's Allies, or of any naval or military work, or of any dock or harbor work in connection with any place in this Colony, and no person in the vicinity of such forces, ships or work, shall, without such permission, have in his possession any photographic or other apparatus, or other material or things suitable for use in making any such representation. For the purpose of this regulation, the expression "Harbour work" includes ights, buoys, beacons, marks, and other things for the purpose of facili-tating navigation in or into a harbour. 3, No person shall, by word of nouth or in writing, spread reports

among any of His Majesty's forces, or among the civilian population. 4. Any person who attempts to commit, or procures, aids or abets, the commission of any act prohibited by 1. 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
