The year 1916 will be long remembered by the fight fans for the reason that every champion defended his title during the year which is now no more

Jess Willard, the massive heavyweight title-holder, beat back an attack on his crown by Frank Moran. Freddie Welsh, possessor of the lightweight championship, defended it from Charlie White, Johnny Kilbane, one of the greatest fighting cham pions ever known, easily knocked out the featherweight challenger, George Chaney, while Kid Williams fought a draw last February with Pete Herman and later outclassed many other bantamweights who had their eye on the little Dane's title. The biggest battle of the year was

the Willard-Moran clash in New York. Tex Rickard, promoter of many big bouts, startled the country by offering a huge purse for a ten-round bout between the heavyweights.

It was the largest purse ever of fered for a no-decision battle, and drew 13.000 fans to Madison Square Garden in New York; and Willard, aside from badly battering his Pittsburg rival, drew down \$71,250, including his guaranteed purse of \$47,500. Moran with his picture rights thrown in, collected \$26,750.

Trounced Challengers. Kilbane, Walsh and Williams fought many times thruout the season, but Willard took part in only one bout. On Labor Day, Kilbane, Welsh and Williams fought bouts in which their titles were at stake, Kilbane easily polished off George Chaney of Baltimore in three rounds at Ceder Point, O., and this feat wiped out the only challenger the smiling lad from Cleveland had. Kilbane has run out of firstclass opponents and threatens to enter the lightweight class, for the sole reason of getting Freddie Welsh into a championship bout.

There are still several good lightweights in the running for the Bri ton's crown. Included in the list of challengers are Benny Leonard, the sensational knockout artist from New York, and Johnny Dundee of Brooklyn, who represents the east, and Joe Welling of Chicago, Johnny Tillman of Minersville and Richie Mitchell of Milwaukee, who upholds the west in the lightweight division. Of course there are many other promising 133pounders, but none-of them stand out prominently enough to be considered as possible championship challengers. **Bibbons** the Best.
