

Does the company intend to make an effort to supply the local market this season? Is it not possible to get the coal to the railway track, and ship it via Port aux Basques? Would not even that place be better than depending on Sydney, and getting none? If the coal is really there, have we not energy enough, capital enough or initiative enough, to get it out and deliver ft? Wouldn't it be a great scheme for the newspapers, led by the "People's paper" to start a campaign, for the procuring of local coal for the local market and get it cheaply and plentifully?

There is no question, domestic or foreign, that all classes of the people are so much interested in: will the Telegram concentrate public opinion on it so that some solution may be forthcoming? If we really have coal in sufficient quantities, there never again will be a time, when it will be needed worse, or be more profitable to handle than at present. There are obstacles in the way of getting it, but havent we go enough, or pep enough or administrative ability enough to overcome them. 





Armenia refused to comply with the ultimatum. No military action has thus far been reported, but the situation is serious. 



### The End of Simplified Spelling.

There no doubt has been some surbecause of the recent anent, made by the Modern ublic interest in the proposed new orm of spelling, its failure to make tion. The movement to reform inglish spelling in the United Stat took definite shape in the year 1906, when the Simplified Spelling Board was organized in New York City. Many distinguished men and women have, at one time and another, been identified with the campaign, and from the first it was liberally financed. Reams of literature, in the form of more or less convincing propag anda, have been printed and distribut ed throughout the length and breadth of the land, the chief effort, especial y early in the campaign, being made to win over the support of college and universities through appeal made to their executives or to those employed as professors or instructors. The board published, not long after its organization, a list of 825 American college professors and officers who, it was claimed, had agreed to follow the prescribed simplified form of spelling in the use of 300 words, wherever possible. Further impetus was given to the movement, momentarily at least, in August, 1906, when Theodore Roosevelt, then President of the United States, ordered the pubblic printer to adopt the spelling advocated by the board in the publics departments. Due to public protests this order was modified, a little later, to apply only to the official correspondence of the White House.

It might, perhaps, have been supposed that a movement so thoroughly organized, so liberally financed, and quite generally indorsed by educators in some parts of the country, especially as it had the support and approval of the editors of a number of the more popular dictionaries, must eventually succeed. But the fact remains that it did not succeed. Indeed, it never even approached success. The popular protest which reached President Roosevelt seemed to express the almost unanimous sentiment of the masses. Those who opposed arbitrary innovaions along the lines proposed insisted, and apparently with reason, that spelling reform should continue to be, as it always had been, a matter of growth. Those persons who had learned to spell the words in common use quite emphatically insisted upon the right to continue the spellings they had learned. They admitted that many of these spellings were arbitrary, in sense, but that they were no more ar bitrary than the so-called simplified forms perscribed, and that no method of phonetic spelling could ever be successfully standardized. Perhaps many of the sticklers for the older form may have admitted that there were many words, some of them in quite common use, which they knew "by sight" only, and with which they had no "speaking acquaintance," but they evinced no inordinate desire to be compelled to form unnumbered new acquaintances, as it were, the presentations to be made by writers who claimed the privilege of disguising and camouflaging the English language to suit their own whims.

There is, of course a trend toward what all admit to be, or claim to be, a "modern" form of spelling. Even a cursory examination of the accepted forms in use to-day would be convincing of the accuracy of this statement. But it might be quite difficult to bring convincing argument that the changes involved had ever been arbitrarily made. Tennyson and Swinburne employed, in the spelling of many words, forms quite different from those followed by Shakespeare and Bacon, and, no doubt, to those earlier writers the forms employed by Wyclif appeared antiquated, if not grotesque. The change from one form to another has been gradual and almost unnoticed, as are the changes to which all become accustomed in dress, and even in so-called correct forms of etiquette. There is evidently no need to tell a people that its language is indefensible etymologically as well as on grounds of accepted usage. But it has been proved, apparently that its merit of familiarity is its sufficient defense.—Christian Science

The quantity of food on the ice was about equal to the sustenance of the nineteen persons for a month. Capt. Tyson, who now took charge of the party, at once put them

charge of the party, at once put them on short allowances. A meal for nine men consisted of 1½ lb. bread, and ½ lb. penmican mixed with water. This was served out twice a day. The Esquimaux shared in the same proportion. Fortunately they had two boats on the ice, the "Polaris" being left without boats. Eleven dogs were with them, and these they shot, as they could not spare food for them. The first movement of the fice on which they were, was to the southwest, a heavy northeast wind blowing, and in a short time they found themselves thirty or forty miles south of where their ship was last seen. Oyaing to a heavy sea which was running, their fice broke up, and they were separated from one of their boats, six bags of bread, and some articles of clothing, which, however, they subsequently recovered. After drifting eight days they found themselves within a few miles of the Greenland coast. They made two attempts to reach land but failed; stormy weather set in, and they drifted fast towards the outh.

ACCEPTING THE INEVITABLE.

When they had passed Cary Irlands all hope of getting to land was abandoned; and, with the aid of the Esquimaux, they built three snowhuts on the ice. During the mouth of November they caught four or five seals, and about the same umber respectively in January and February. Their sufferings from cold and hunger were very great. We can fancy what must have been the forlorn condition of those poor creatures during the gloom of the long Arctic night. Even with every comfort on board ship, and surrounded by cheerful influence of all kinds, with books and amusements to while away the time, the Arctic night is felt to be terribly oppressive. But what must it have been to this forlory band, shut in a wretched snow-hut. cold, half-starving, without light except what a feeble lamp could furnish, and with nothing to break the terrible monotony of the weary hours! For eighty-five days they were without the sun: but at length on January 19th, 1872, they were gladof day. It was like a glimpse of opening heaven to the eyes of the heartsick group on the ice-floe. On the whole, however, they managed to preserve their cheerfulness to a wonderful degree, and never lost hope of ultimate deliverance. At times, too, the voice of Hannah, one of the Esquimaux women, cheered them, as she sang the songs of her native land. It is touching to find that the wellbeing of the baby was a constant source of interest and affectionate inquiry; and when daylight returned, a look at its dusky little face, as it nestled in Mrs. Hans' bosum, was often asked for, and never failed to awaken smiles and tender words. The services of the two Esqui en were invaluable. They watched ice-holes and speared the seals, when white men were unequal to such an achievement. They killed the Polar bear and shot the snow



### THE MOTOR FUEL WAR.

The steady rise in the price of petrol, a price which, according to the committee of investigation, is very largely unjustified, is directing the attention of all motor fuel users, whether for pleasure or commercial purposes, to a closer and closer search for spirits to compete with petrol. Benzol practically holds the field for the time being on this side and is rather cheaper than petrol, besides giving 1216 per cent, more power and 25 per cent. more mileage. Supplies of benzol, however, are limited, and there appears to be no concelvable prospect of those supplies being increased to any extent in the near future. In fact, the output has gone down recently and, of course, being extracted from coke and coal its production is determined by the time limit on the output of these minerals Power alcohol derived from the vegetable kingdom is the great theoretical aid and competitor, but there still remain Governmental department restrictions that impede progress here. Potatoes are amongst the best known sources of power alcohol, but notatoes so far are ruled out as a source agrees that alcohol has many advantages as a motor fuel, but so far if used unmixed with another spirit, it corrodes the engine through imperfect oridation. 

### A Remarkable Clock.

One of the most remarkable clocks is that in Strassburg Cathedral. Every day at twelve o'clock an eager crowd assembles to see the curious evolutions of the clock, for at that hour a very elaborate performance is gone through.

The clock not only tells the time of day; it tells on its calendar the months, the day of the month, and all the movable feast days of the Catholic Church. A statue of Apollo points out the day of the month and the name of the saint corresponding to that day. We can learn from it the time for the rising and setting of the sun, while the diurnal motion of the moon round the earth, and its passages over the meridian, the phases of the moon, and the eclipses of the sun and moon are all indicated.

Allegorical figures seated in chari-ts, represent the days of the week, ots, represent the days of the week, drive slowly into view, appearing each day in proper order. On Sunday, Apollo, drawn by the horses of the sun; on Monday, Diana, by a stag; on Tuesday, Mars; on Wednesday, Jupiter armed with a thunderbolt; on Friday, Venus; on Saturday,


