It has been shown by the investigntion conducted by scientific expeditons to the Pacific islands that there is a slow elevation going on there, that, by lifting the reefs gradually above the waves, preserves them from erosand certain animal forms of a terrestrial character to exist there.

This is in opposition to the old idea that the atolls were formed by the gradual subsidence of small islands and that the coral insects build up encircling reefs as the islands sank. Recent reports show that the elevation of the islands is a general phenomenon, but variable in amount, some islands rising rapidly and others very slowly.

Both the flora and the fauna of these islands are confined to a very few species, although, seen from a distance, some of them appear very rich in vegetation -Washington Star



Industrial Rank of Canada Fixed.

FOURTH OR SIXTH AMONG THE

trial importance of Canada is contained in a recent decision of the League of Nations, according to information reaching the government at Ottawa. This decision was rendered under the authority of article 22 of the treaties of peace which declared that eight out of the 12 government seats on the governing body of the international labor office should be held by the countries of "the chief industrial importance" and that any question arising as to which were the boundaries of the chief industrial importance should be decided by the League of Nations council.

A special commission was appointed to consider the criteria to be adopted in this matter and it was agreed that the seven characteristics following should be utilized, namely:

1. Industrial population (including mines and transports). 2. Relation of industrial population to total population.

3. Length of railway track. 4. Relation of railway track to area. 5. Horsepower used in industry. 6. Relation of horsepower to total population.

7. Size of mercantile marine. Statistical information on these noints was obtained from the various countries comprising the League of Nations and calculations were made therefrom on two different bases. On one of these calculations Canada was ranked at the fourth state of "chief ndustrial importance" and on the ther calculations as sixth. Under the rst calculations the first eight coun-

tries were, in order of importance: Great Britain, Germany, France, Canada, Italy, Belgium, Japan and India. On the second the eight states of "chief industrial importance" were: Great Britain, France, Germany, Italy, Japan, Canada, Belgium, and





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
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
