The Guelph Central Exhibition.

The Third and Greatest Day.

The Lieut.-Governor on the Grounds

Immense Crowds and Great Enthusiasm.

Wednesday, the second day of the Exhibition, passed off most successfully. The weather was beautiful throughout, and the crowds of visitors seemed heartily to enjoy themselves. At the gate 10,000 tickets were sold, and there must have been 2,000 more admitted, by members' and other tickets. During the day Vale's Ventil Horn Band were on the ground, and delighted all with their fine music.

This (Thursday) morning the crowd in town is as large as on the preceding day, and it is expected that the attendance at the Exhibition will be greater than on any other day. Fortunately the weather keeps favorable, and there is every prospect of a fine day.

ARRIVAL AND RECEPTION OF THE LIEUTENANT-GOVERNOR.

Everybody was on tiptoe of expectation for the arrival of the Lieut.-Governor. By the time the train was expected a large crowd had assembled at the station. The Mayor and Town Council, the Warden and County Council were present, besides a number of our leading citizens. The Guelph Rifle Company under the command of Capt. Bruce was drawn up at the station, and kept that part of it clear where His Excellency was to land. The train drew up at the station at half-past ten o'clock, and Hon. Mr. Gow and Mr. C.E. Romain stepped on board the special Pullman car, in which His Excellency came up, and conducted him to the platform, where he was introduced to His Worship the Mayor. He was accompanied by his A. D. C., Major Curtis. Three rousing cheers were given as soon as His Excellency stepped on the platform, the Volunteers presented arms, and the Wellington Field Battery, Capt. Macdonald, which was stationed near the depot, fired a salute.

After a few introductions, His Excellency was conducted to the carriage and four, driven by Mr. Denis Bunyan, and took his seat along with the Mayor and Mr. Gow, followed by the members of the Town and County Councils.

On arriving at the Market House, His Excellency was conducted to the Council Chamber, when the Mayor presented the following address:—

To His Excellency, the Hon. William Pearce Howland, C. B., Lieutenant Governor of the Province of Ontario:—

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY,

We, the Mayor and Corporation of the Town of Guelph, on behalf of our fellow-townsmen, avail ourselves of this, your Excellency's first official visit to our thriving town, to offer you a cordial and hearty welcome.

We to thank your Excellency for the kindly manner in which you have been pleased to accept our invitation to be present with us to-day, and we fully appreciate the interest taken by your Excellency in everything calculated to promote the best interests of the Province.

We trust, your Excellency's visit to the Central Exhibition, that the collection of Stock, Farm Produce, Horticultural productions, and the various manufactures there exhibited, will show your Excellency a most gratifying progress in the industry and skill of the inhabitants of this section of the Province of Ontario.

We would also assure your Excellency that the citizens of the Town of Guelph gratefully acknowledge the compliment you have paid them by honouring them with your presence, and we further hope that this visit of your Excellency to the Town of Guelph may be a pleasant one, which you will long remember with satisfaction.

We beg to tender you our sincere and heartfelt wishes for yours, Lady Howland and family's continued health and happiness, and most express the hope that your Excellency may long be spared to enjoy those honours which our gracious Sovereign has so worthily bestowed upon you.

The members of the Town and County Councils, the Officers and Directors of the Agricultural Society and several other citizens were then introduced to His Excellency, and after a few minutes conversation, he was again conducted to the carriage, the Rifle Company guarding the approach on each side. Along with him were seated the Mayor and James Laidlaw Esq., President of the Agricultural Society. When the carriage started His Excellency was again heartily cheered, which he graciously acknowledged.

The party then drove up Wyndham st., to the grounds, where His Excellency was received by the President and Directors of the Agricultural Society, and where he was presented with an address.

Thompson, Puslinch, pair of white geese. Mr. Charles Foster, East Flamboro, exhibited a fine pair of Rabbits, as did Mr. W. H. Thomas, of Brooklin.

ROOTS.

The show of roots was never before so large or of a quality so superior. There were about eighty baskets of the finest potatoes we ever saw at any previous exhibition. Turnips were well represented, there being about one hundred lots on view, all of which was larger than the most sanguine anticipated. When we walked through the rows of turnips in the show weighing nineteen pounds, we only state the truth. Generally speaking, the turnip crop in Wellington was considered a failure this year, and the potato bug, poor little stupid creature, was supposed to have almost devoured the potato, root and branch. Such is not the case we are happy to say, as these staples are larger and better than on any previous occasion.

We sometimes grumble without reason, and find fault where no cause for great anxiety exists. Mangolds were large and of good quality. Parsnips and carrots were nothing uncommon, but were clean and nice. Pumpkins were as large as ever. The globe mangolda, in our opinion, were superior to anything hitherto shown in Guelph. The cauliflowers were superb, and the cabbages, considering the season, a No. 1. Celery was well grown, but the radishes were small. Table turnips were about the average. There was a fine display of onions and tomatoes, which were evidently selected with great care.

SEWING MACHINES.

The Appleton Company exhibit a

machine that seems admirably adapted for the sewing in the manufacture of boots and shoes; also a knitting machine, which will make shirts, drawers &c., in fact everything of the kind required in a family, samples of the work performed are on exhibition.

The Webster Sewing Machine Company, Hamilton, exhibit 6 specimens of their manufacture which is a machine devoid of gears and same, simple and durable, and said to possess a novel and great shuttle motion. The mechanism is said to be something entirely new in sewing machines, and worthy of inspection by all interested in these useful family articles.

The Lockman Sewing Machine Company, Hamilton, exhibit 6 machines, comprising 5 half cases, 2 full cases, and 2 manufacturing machines (these latter are made at Fergus), took the 1st prize at Hamilton for the best family sewing machine. They also exhibit a very neat hand machine, which can readily be adjusted to the table of the ordinary family machine.

Mr. Lockman has invented a process by which beginners can be readily taught to operate the machine without reversing the motion, and moreover very greatly increases the power and speed thereof. The one power does not in the slightest interfere with the other, and the new invention must often prove a great rest to the foot when weary with the constant motion of the other power.

C. W. Williams & Co., Montreal, exhibit 5 machines, 3 of them are family, and 2 manufacturing machines; the former took the 1st prize at the Provincial Exhibition at Hamilton in family sewing machines, also the highest extra first prize for superior sewing in all ranges of work and highly commended for artistic workmanship for ease, which certainly is very beautiful, being an inland pearl design of Windsor Castle in two views on black walnut. This firm also took 2nd prize for manufacturing machine at Hamilton.

Guelph Sewing Machine Company exhibit 10 machines, 3 of which are full cabinets, inlaid in pearl, silver, and gold plated; also their celebrated Guelph reversible, which has taken the 1st prize at all the Provincial Shows for the last 3 years; the remainder of the machines exhibited are of the ordinary manufacture. The Queen was awarded the 1st prize at the Provincial in 1871, and at Ottawa in 1872.

The Guelph Company also exhibit the "Osborn" greatly improved, having no less than 4 patents secured in its construction. The novelties in this machine are that it possesses an adjustable treadle by which the position of the feet can be altered at pleasure of the operator; also a patent indicator placed on top of the machine for regulating tension both on the top and also on the shuttle, which gives every stitch precisely the same tension under whatever circumstances; also an improvement in the threading whereby all holes to be threaded are avoided except through the eye of the needle; also an improvement in attaching the needle to the needle bar, whereby the needle is always brought to the centre of the needle bar; also an improvement very convenient for adjusting the strength of the presser spring. Mr. Osborn has the honor of making these several improvements and inventions.

The Gardner Sewing Machine Company are light family and light manufacturing. This machine is claimed to be of the simplest character, combining strength, and fineness of finish, with a range of work that cannot be excelled. We saw some fine samples of the different grades of work from light mangle and tissue paper, through cloth, wood, best lead, calf skin, cowhide and two thickness of heavy leather belting; also patterns in quilting and fine sewing in leather by the same machine. This Company have also on exhibition a beautiful little model of the Gardner, called the "Governor General," and made by the foreman of the establishment and excites general astonishment and admiration amongst the thronging crowd.

MISCELLANEOUS.

J. M. Bond & Co., Guelph, make a fine display in the class of Hardware, consisting of a splendid assortment of saws, fire proof safe, refrigerator, iron mangle, grates, coffee mill, horse shoes, nails, morticing machine &c.

J. I. Stewart, Guelph, exhibits a splendid collection of monumental tombstones for which he obtains 1st and 2nd prizes. The first prize stone is made to the order of the late Lieutenant Governor Mr. Robert of three of his children. Mr. Stewart also exhibits an exceedingly handsome Peterhead (Scotland) granite pillar and pedestal, which evidences the great pitch to which the art of stone polishing has been brought. This monument attracted crowds of admirers.

John Crowe, Guelph, exhibits several patterns of iron railings, of neat and substantial designs; also a large variety of metal vases suitable for plants and flowers, also a quantity of superior iron castings.

John Haysman, Guelph, constitutes a large and valuable assortment of hoes, spades, shovels, draining tools, clothes wringers and patent mangle, both the latter very handy, useful family articles.

Wm. Stanley, Guelph, exhibits two superior cooking stoves, one with copper and the other with tin furniture, one half coal stove, 1 do for wood, 1 parlor coal stove, a set of stove furniture, and 4 iron cistern pumps.

Howard & Gray, Guelph, exhibit an assortment of machinery castings, which do infinite credit to the Foundry where they are turned out, and we congratulate this firm on the very superior character of their work exhibited.

The prizes for horse shoes are numerously contested with very superior exhibits by Caleb Chase, W. Hooper, W. Sallows, all of Guelph, Alex. Watson of Morriston, Thos. Richardson of Fergus, W. C. Howard of Elora, Mr. Strecker of Berlin, Thos. Tipling, Clinton, and Graham Williamson of Seaforth.

Worswick & Arms, Guelph, exhibit some really choice specimens of turning lathes. Tools for working in metal, machines for drilling metals, all of which evidence a high state of finish.

DARTY PRODUCE.

There are about 35 entries of Fresh Butter in baskets, and it must have given the Judges considerable difficulty in arriving at a decision satisfactory to themselves, as the samples shown evidence quality of a high order. 



The failure of the potato crop is exciting much attention in Britain. Lord Cathcart, President of the Royal Agricultural Society, has offered £100 for a prize essay on its prevention.

The *Tribune* is confident that the Greeley party will carry Pennsylvania by a majority of twenty-five thousand next week, unless the Government perpetrate gigantic frauds. It says that the Grantites have already raised a special corruption fund by which they are going to cheat to the extent of five thousand votes in Philadelphia, and that by running negroes temporarily over from the district of Columbia into the state of Pennsylvania, they hope to cheat to the extent of five thousand more.

SMALL-POX.—This loathsome disease has not yet totally disappeared from the neighborhood of Walkerton. A young man named George Forler, of the village of Neustadt, was suddenly taken sick with this horrible disease last week, and died within a few days.

The potato disease, so bad in Ireland this year, has appeared in several places in Canada, though in a mitigated form. A gentleman, who expresses himself as quite certain as to the efficiency of his recipe for curing diseased potatoes—a subject which is just now engaging much attention in the English press—sends us the following:—

"Take the potatoes up as quickly as possible, expose them to the sun for twelve days, or thereabouts, and the disease is completely stopped. They can then be kept for a length of time (say six months) when they can be converted into a starch, for food or for use in the laundry."

The recipe is worthy the attention of agriculturists.

Journalists are occasionally honored in England. Some time since, the chief of *The Times* went to the House of Lords, and it is now reported that the editor of the *Daily Telegraph*, a paper second only to the *Daily News* in radicalism, is to be made a baronet.

RATHER RISKY.—The Niagara Falls Gazette of Sept. 23th, says:—A most hazardous and perilous exploit was successfully undertaken on the river yesterday afternoon. Our well known druggist, E. E. Judging from the remarks which Barney subsequently delivered concerning the novelty and excitement of such a pleasure trip we are scarcely justified in claiming that the voyage will be readily classed among the desirable trips which strangers are expected to enjoy during a visit to our neighborhood.


The case of James Flynn is occasioning considerable comment in England. Flynn was condemned to be hanged for the murder of Johanna Naim, his mistress, but he died in prison. For several days he utterly refused to eat anything, and at last it was deemed advisable to force food down his throat with a stomach-pump. The prisoner strenuously objected to this, but was at last overpowered, and the prison surgeon set to work at him. The pump was fixed in a proper position, but Flynn wriggled about until his throat was so lacerated that it was evident that he would be gravely injured by any further attempt to provide him with nourishment. So he was permitted to rest in peace, and died a day or two afterwards, of starvation.

Surgeon told Dr. Cuyler recently that he never wrote a sermon, and would rather be hung than to do such a thing. He works up his points, draws on his bible knowledge, general information and good sense, and then preaches straight at them.



THIS MORNING'S DESPATCHES
Election Riots in Georgia.

Terrible Railway Accident in England.

Spanish Monastery Burned.

Macon, Ga., Oct. 2.—A serious riot occurred at the polls in this city between whites and negroes. One white man was killed and five or six negroes wounded, two of whom have since died. The whites claim that the whole affair was premeditated on the part of the negroes, and that it was their intention to take forcible possession of the polls. The negroes claim that they were driven from the polls by violence, and could get no chance to vote.

Madrid, Oct. 2.—A despatch from the Town of Escorial, 24 miles north-west of this City, announces that the celebrated Monastery of the Escorial was struck by lightning this evening. The building was quickly on fire, and so rapid was the devouring element that the dome and tower of the magnificent edifice have already fallen. The Royal Palace, with its splendid library of books and paintings, and rare and costly manuscripts, is now in flames. At the date of this despatch there is apparently little hope of saving from destruction the Mausoleum as well as the summer residence of the Spanish Kings. A brigade of engineers, fully equipped with materials for use in such emergencies, has left Madrid for the Escorial.

London, Oct. 2.—A terrible accident happened this morning to a passenger train from this city to Edinburgh. While running at a very rapid speed it came in collision, near Kirtle Bridge, with a freight train, causing the instant death of nine persons. Many others are injured, and it is feared several of them will die. But few details are received. All despatches agree in stating that the train was behind time, and was running at a furious rate to make it up. The scene of the disaster is not far from Carlisle, the capital of Cumberland County, and a train has been sent from the town to bring in the dead and wounded.

CONCERN.—On the motion for the third reading of the By-law for issuing debentures, at the County Council meeting, on Tuesday, Mr. Gibson of Garafra, voted nay instead of nay.

THEATRE OF ARTS.—Don't forget Horworth's tableaux of Erin to-night in the Drill Shed. They also present scenes in the late Franco-German war, and a splendid Comedy Company assists in the performance.

We have received a circular from Mr. Wm. McBride, Secretary of the Western Fair, stating that the Governor-General of Canada and the Right Governor have promised to visit London during one of the days of the Western Fair. The precise day is not mentioned, but it will be either on Wednesday or Thursday of next week.

OPEN LODGE MEETING.—The members of Beaver Temple, I. O. G. T., will hold an open meeting in their Hall, adjoining Thorp's Hotel, commencing at 7.30 this evening, when will be delivered addresses, music, recitations, dialogues, &c. The public are invited to attend. Admission free. A collection will be taken up to defray expenses. A pleasant time may be expected.

TEMPERANCE SOCIAL.—The meeting of last evening in the Good Templars' Hall was in all respects a grand success. About 300 sat down to tea, and were well satisfied with the variety and abundance of the substantial and dainties supplied. The Rev. Mr. Wood, who is a model chairman, presided, and by precept and example proved that in speech-making "brevity is the soul of wit," as well as the essence of propriety on all such occasions.
